Yocha DeHe Nation Votes to Assist the Local Community Funds the Valley Voice & Other Essential Local Services

Serving Madison, Esparto, Capay,

The elected Tribal Council of the Yocha Dehe Nation has stepped forward to assist its neighboring communities. At a recent Council meeting, the Tribal officials voted to continue the "gap funds" needed for the *Valley Voice* newspaper. At the same time, they also provided the necessary financial support to maintain certain essential emergency services that serve the most-inneed in the Esparto-Capay Valley Region. These services include operation of the Food Bank and Clothes/Coat Closet, provision of emergency and walk-in support for families with unmet needs, resource and referral assistance, professional counseling for children (including those traumatized and/or uninsured), counseling for families in crisis, and support to host the Collaborative of Service Partners (a united group of agencies that bring additional services into our local region). The generosity was confirmed in an emergency action taken by the Tribal Council in March, action that gave over \$100,000 to fund these services and to preserve local resources that "are essential to helping our neighbors and our communities."

The Tribe, in essence, has stepped forward to backfill funds taken by the Board of Supervisors in these difficult economic times. In years past, the services mentioned above were supported through "Mitigation Funds" given to the County through the Tribe-County Agreement. The Advisory Committee for Tribal Matters (ACTM) members always rated these "essential services" at the top of the list for funding, ensuring a reliable communication mechanism (the *Valley Voice*), and certain basic services (Food Bank, Clothes Closet, counseling, resource assistance, etc.) fo people of the Madison-Esparto-Capay Valley Region. The ACTM group still exists and has many of the area's finest residents sitting as members, but the Board of Supervisors has granted them no portion of the fees paid by the Tribe to do good work in the western rural part of the County. The Tribe considered the loss of services and the potential loss of the paper, and chose without hesitation to support the community to maintain these efforts.

The funds for the *Valley Voice* are sufficient to assure publication for an entire year, with free delivery to all residents and no increases in the local support necessary to match equally the award of Tribal funds. The amount provided by the Tribal Council was over \$16,600. The paper is the only local publication in the Capay Valley Region. It is a dependable communication tool and has other local partners that work diligently to support its continued publication. Other partners include the Esparto Unified School District, RISE Inc., the Chamber of Commerce, and the advertisers that pay to be included donors. The newspaper is dedicated to sharing news of local interest, and is governed by a "Committee of Local Citizens." The Tribe's actions also provided the funding necessary to continue local human services important to school children, the hungry, families in crisis, the uninsured, and folks without extensive resources. In this work the Tribe also has partners. Countryside Community Church collaborates to support the Food Bank and Clothes Closet. RISE Inc. is the umbrella organizational home for the counseling, resource and referral, emergency and crisis assistance, and hosts service partners providing programs for the needy in the community. RISE Inc. is the fiscal agent for these efforts, and the Tribe contributed over \$90,000 to fill the gaps so the services can continue.

The Tribal Council is comprised of the elected officials of the Yocha Dehe Nation and acts as the governing body of the Tribal community. Thank you for this support for our communities!



School Climate Surveys:

Upon review of the information given in the school climate surveys, let me share some of the results with the community:

- 1. A total of 157 surveys were returned district-wide.
- When reviewing responses for the questions, let me share a few of the questions and the results:

A. This school sets high standards for academic performance for all students:

- High school—69% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
- Middle school—64% of the parents Agree or Strongly agree
- Elementary school—97% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
- B. This school fosters an appreciation of student diversity and respect for each other:
 - High school—69% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
 - Middle School—71% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
 - Elementary School—93% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree

C. Most of the adults at this school believe that every student can be a success.

- High school—49% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
- Middle School—59% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree
- Elementary School—88% of the parents Agree or Strongly Agree

Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation Introduces New Community Fund Application Guidelines

The Yocha Dehe Community Fund, a philanthropic institution of the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation, today announced new guidelines for grant applicants, effective immediately. They are available online at www.yochadehe.org.

The new guidelines provide clear direction for applicants and specific information about the Fund's goals and giving categories. The process of grant application is also clarified, providing a streamlined process for both applicants and the Fund alike.

Earlier this March, the Tribe took emergency action when Yolo County budget shortfalls threatened to cut critical community services in the area and close down the *Valley Voice*, the only local newspaper. With \$100,000 in Community Fund grants the Tribe has filled the budget gap, supporting local agencies and assured the continued publication of the *Valley Voice* for the next year.

"Giving back to our community, to our neighbors, is integral to the culture of the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation," said Tribal Chairman Marshall McKay. "The Community Fund is the tangible expression of our tribal values."

The Yocha Dehe Community Fund is dedicated to creating a healthy community through engaged philanthropy, deep community knowledge and awareness, and active leadership. Over the past decade, the Fund has provided nearly \$18 million in financial support to nonprofit organizations and service providers in Sacramento and Yolo counties. Grants have also been made to organizations supporting the Fund's goals in education, community health, arts and culture, the environment, community development and social services.

The Yocha Dehe Community Fund was one of the first to be established by a Native American tribe in California and the Tribe is a recognized leader in local California and Native Country charitable giving.

Esparto High School Participates in the Every 15 Minutes Program

Aldo Valeriano never thought that by being in a simple car race, he would end up in jail for manslaughter; and Aaron Rome thought a senior "skip day" would be a fine way to spend a spring day having a few beers. All that came crashing to a halt, when during the race they "killed" a fellow student and a teacher in this mock event for teen driving under the influence.

That was the scenario for a wake-up call program called *Every 15 Minutes* that played out at Esparto High School on Thursday, March 18 at 11:30 a.m. After six months of planning, the school was shocked into a reality check during a two day program that included a mock vehicle collision that involved four students and one teacher. At the request of Seniors Jaime Campos and Brittany Bauthier, the school set up the program to drive home to students the reality of what can happen from drinking and driving.

The Every 15 Minutes Program, presented with a grant from the Office of Traffic Safety, pulls together local law enforcement agencies, fire departments and ambulance providers to stage a realistic vehicle collision. That is part of the first day; another is removing a student every 15 minutes from the student body.

Every 15 minutes, the grim reaper and a sheriff's deputy, entered the school, read out the name of the most recently deceased and removed that student. During passing periods and mid-morning break those that had "died" stood vigilance over their tombstones in the campus quad.

At the end of the day, all participants were bused to a retreat at Yocha Dehe Fire Station for an overnight session of letter writing to their parents, discussions on decision-making, and having time to reflect on the impact that their death would have on family, friends and the future.

On Friday, the school gathered again to attend a memorial service for those who had "passed" the previous day. Heartfelt letters from the students and their parents were read as a casket served as a visual reminder of fatal decisions.

"We broke with the traditional *Every 15 Minute Program*," said Bob Cassel, ROP instructor at Esparto High and faculty advisor for this event. "Our students were active participants at all levels of this program, our Fire Technology students operated as a fire department and performed the vehicle extrications that were needed, our Emergency Medical Response class provided patient care, and our Floriculture class created the casket piece and funeral arrangements. We hope that by involving them instead of making them observers they got a better feeling of the loss, anguish and emotions that the community feels at a time like this," said Cassel.

Another break from the standard *Every 15 Minutes Program* was the inclusion of street racing into the scenario. "Kids are street racing more and more today," said Jaime Campos, "and we wanted them to know that they are responsible for their actions, people can die even if they aren't drunk."

According the Phil Gruidl, of the California Highway Patrol, a committee member on this program, both Rome and Valeriano would get equal penalties under the law if this event had actually taken place. "Even though Aldo wasn't involved in the wreck, and he was sober, he would be eligible for Vehicular Manslaughter chargers right along with the fellow who was driving the car involved in the wreck," said Gruidl.

Student reaction to the program showed the range of emotions that grip a small community after a tragedy. Senior Jaime Campos said, "Students realized what can truly happen with drinking and driving. I was the student coordinator for Every 15 Minutes. I organized the program with meetings, preparation, and communications," said Campos. Senior Brittany Bauthier says, "Personally, it made me realize the consequences of drinking and driving. The experience helped me appreciate people better. I was the assistant student coordinator, and involved in the crash scene. I was the passenger of the car with the *drunk* driver. I was taken to the hospital and later pronounced *dead*."

The program was paid for by a grant from the Office of Traffic Safety and donations from a number of local businesses and individuals. Emergency responders from Madison and Esparto Fire Department, AMR, Reach Helicopter, Yolo County Sheriff's Office and Coroner's Office all donated time and resources to make this as realistic an event as possible.

NEWSLETTER GETTING TO KNOW YOUR METER & HOW MUCH WATER YOU USE

The average per month water usage for a family dwelling is 1000 cubic feet (7480 gallons) per month. To convert gallons to cubic feet: there are 7.48 gallons of water in every 1 cubic foot.

RESIDENTIAL

A reading on a bill from one month to the next should be 10 or less. That is the average. For instance, if in February your meter reading was 00023.00 and in March your reading on the meter was 00030.00 it would show usage of 7 (700 cubic feet) on your bill for March because this is the difference between the two numbers. This would be an average or less than average usage. There will probably be no extra charges for water on your bill.

COMMERCIAL

There will be a basic charge for service with no water use and charges for every 100 cubic feet used.



This is what a meter looks like in the box. See the 000,000.03 on this meter. This meter is reading 3 cubic feet or 22.4 gallons of water used. This would show as 0 on the bill if it had been installed with a reading of 000,000.00.

The thing to remember is the meters are read by radio. If the meter doesn't look like it has been read, it is because each box does not need to be individually opened to read it.

Cost has not yet been mentioned. The usages and the costs that must be accounted in a Metered Rate type of system (Billing System Cost Recovery) are still being analyzed and calculated. The same flat rate will be charged until the data has been gathered and this will be used to determine what the base rate will be.

Understanding Autism

First 5 Yolo's Tips for Parents and Caregivers on Identifying Early Warning Signs

Currently, one in 110 children in the United States has autism according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Autism is a developmental disability that occurs when the brain has trouble functioning properly. It affects a child's ability to speak, learn and communicate with others. At this time, there is no cure for autism, but kids who are screened and diagnosed at a young age and who visit a doctor regularly for treatment show significant improvement in learning and communication skills.

In recognition of April being Autism Awareness Month, First 5 Yolo wants parents and caregivers to be aware of the following early signs of autism to help families identify a need for early intervention and treatment: **Early Warning Signs:** Not all children develop at the same rate, so some may need further evaluation and special services to help them grow up healthy. Autism, in particular, can be difficult to diagnose because it affects each child differently. Parents can watch for the following signs and see a health care provider for further screenings:

- Does not coo or smile by 6 months old
- Has trouble sitting, standing up or reaching for objects by 1 year old
- Does not say simple words like "mama" or "dada" by 1 year old
- Does not turn his or her head to follow sounds or voices
- Does not point at objects to show interest such as an airplane flying overhead or does not look at objects when another person points at them
- Does not react to loud noises
- Repeats certain behaviors or actions over and over, including some that are harmful like banging his or her head
- Repeats or echoes words or phrases said to him or her or repeats words or phrases in place of normal language (echolalia)
- Makes little or no eye contact and wants to be alone or appears to be unaware when other people talk to him or her yet responds to other sounds
- Has trouble relating to others or is not interested in other people at all
- Has trouble expressing his or her needs using typical words or motions
- Has trouble understanding other people's feelings or talking about his or her own feelings
- Prefers not to be held or cuddled, or only when he or she wants to
- Has trouble adapting to changes in routine
- Has unusual reactions to the way things smell, taste, look, feel or sound
- Does not play games like peek-a-boo or "pretend" games
- Exhibits loss of skills he or she once had such as speech or social skills **Early Intervention and Treatment:** By getting help at an early age when the brain is still developing, parents can help children reduce the effects of autism by the time they start kindergarten. Some of the treatments include speech therapy, diet and therapies focused on improving relationships.
