#### Woodland Healthcare Foundation Kicks Off ER Campaign With \$250,000 from the Rumsey Band of Wintun Indians

The Woodland Healthcare Foundation has launched a \$1.5 million campaign - When Every Second Counts - to enhance Yolo County's busiest and most comprehensive emergency department. Marshall McKay, Chairman of the Rumsey Band of Wintun Indians, kicked off the campaign with a \$250,000 check presented to Kevin Vaziri, President of Woodland Healthcare, and Mark Engstrom, a foundation board member of the Woodland Healthcare Foundation and chairman of the capital campaign.

"With the growing population in Woodland and surrounding areas, this expansion and modernization is much needed and we were happy to take the first step toward helping them reach their donation goal, "said McKay. "Woodland Memorial is our local emergency center so we are especially committed to helping maintain and improve this hospital."

The Woodland Healthcare Emergency Department has nearly 2,000 patient visits a month. Emergency department enhancements include a new "rapid response" triage area, advanced diagnostic and radiological equipment, high tech innovations for patient monitoring, an electronic medical records system, an automated medication dispensing system, an upgraded nursing station, and expanded registration and waiting areas.

"This generous donation from the Rumsey Band of Wintun Indians is a tremendous start to our campaign and a wonderful commitment to our community," said Vaziri. "We want to improve our role as a valuable resource in Yolo County and we need the help of local residents and businesses to make an investment in the long-term health of our entire community."

With the help of advanced funds, the initial phase of the project has been completed, resulting in a decrease in average patient wait times to less than 30 minutes in the emergency department. The project's second phase is scheduled to begin this fall, with completion by the summer of 2008.


The emergency department enhancements are part of a master plan that includes the construction of new medical office buildings in Davis and Woodland, expanding the hospital and introducing new advanced diagnostic imaging services.



Additionally, New Season Community Development Corp. has gathered \$300,000 in funds for items such as plantings, awnings, streetlights, etc. The next steps are to move forward with implementation.

Capay Valley Vision and Yolo County had a good meeting with the Esparto Community Services District. They are considering taking up the maintenance of plantings for downtown Esparto. The CSD is another great resource for our community as partners in downtown improvements.

Dan Burden and team came to Esparto to report back on all of our conversations. His full report will be published in August but in the meantime, we hope to have an executive summary in the CVV office in the next couple of weeks. Please stop by and view it anytime.

Much of the agricultural work and Capay Valley Grown efforts have been under Chelsea's steady hand and she will be missed. #### Cache Creek Watershed Stakeholders Group (CCWSG) Update

The Stakeholder's Group had its shortest meeting ever at the beautiful Taber Ranch facility in Capay on July 12<sup>th</sup>. We met with the Capay Valley Vision Ag Task Force as part of a thank you celebration for Chelsea Becker. Here are the updates:

- We were pleased to hear that Tanya Meyer of the Yolo County Resources Conservation District will continue to serve as the Capay Valley's Watershed Coordinator through December of this year, as a result of an extension on the grant that funds her position.
- ♦ The plans for the Will Baker Native Plant Garden were submitted to the Yolo County Department of Parks, Planning and Public Works. The Department will submit the plans to the State soon.
- ◆ Tanya is still recruiting landowners in the Rumsey area for tamarisk treatment for this summer. Please contact Tanya at 662-2037 x 114 immediately if you or someone you know in the Rumsey area is interested in invasive weed control along the creek or its tributaries.
- ♦ The next meeting of the Stakeholder's Group will be Thursday, Sept. 13<sup>th</sup>, 6-8 PM in the Guinda Grange Hall. We will have a presentation on local birds of prey by the California Raptor Center, located at UC Davis, and it will include a couple of live birds to view up close! The Raptor Center is dedicated to the rehabilitation of injured and orphaned raptors. It receives over 250 injured or ill raptors each year and is able to release over 60% of these birds. The Center provides hands-on training in the care and management of birds of prey and provides educational programs to the general public and the university community. This should be a fun and informative event for the entire family. After the presentation by the Raptor Center, we'll have a discussion on how to organize the Stakeholder's Group for the future. As usual, our meetings are a potluck, so bring some food to share. We hope to see you there!

Directors meet 1st Tuesday of each month, 7p.m., at the Library-- all members welcome!

- The new, interim Yolo County Librarian, Roger Pearson, was on hand at the July 10 Board meeting. Roger discussed the Davis Library strategy for keeping their branch library open for extra hours-- Tax Measure P will be on the fall ballot, to increase the parcel tax by \$46 per year, or 12.5 cents per day. (How would Capay Valley folks view this approach to keeping the Esparto Library open?? Maybe, check out the FERL Open Hours campaign, below, instead.) Funds from Measure P will also purchase new books, renovate the existing library, increase the story collection for story time, and increase the number of computers. We are fortunate to have the Rumsey Rancheria to help us with both new computers and extra clerical help at ERL
- FERL Treasurer Al Emrick reports that Membership is up this month to 174, short of the 200+ membership of past years, but a gain of 3 members from last month. Incoming funds are lagging expenditures by \$8,769.64 so far this year, however our Vanguard Money Market fund currently has a balance of \$7,918.38. He asked the FERL funds manager, Larry Stark, to transfer \$5000 into the checking account.
- Al would appreciate help for FERL book sales at the monthly (1st Saturday) Esparto Farmers' Market. (If you can give Al a hand, please call him at 787-3858.) He especially needs assistance in transporting materials from the FERL storage container before and after the markets.
- Larry Stark of LINSCO/Private Ledger was also on hand at the July Board meeting. Larry gave the quarterly report on our endowment fund, currently at \$233, 597. (The By-Laws do not allow FERL to use endowment funds for current operating expenses. These are reserved solely for "expansion of the Library facilities" and only after 2/3 vote of the membership.) The investment strategy has allowed our endowment to grow at an annualized rate of 8.2% since inception (approx. 5 yrs, through the market down-turn years early in this millennium), however it is up 6.6% to date in this calendar year. The fund is approximately tracking (and slightly leading, currently) the Standard & Poor 500 Index.
- We also were pleased to have our website manager, Lynn Morgan, as a visitor. Lynn has recently moved back to the Capay Valley from Alaska, with her family. You can read the latest FERL news at this website, http:ferl.org, on the Library computers or your own. Lynn has put a lot of effort into management of our website over the years--she deserves a vote of thanks from all FERL members and Library patrons--Thanks a lot, Lynn!
- FERL continues to look for a chairperson for the **Harvest Dinner** in November. Please contact Jon Durst (787-3100) if you can help with this lively and enjoyable Fall community event.





#### A Local Walk Celebrates August as **National Breastfeeding Awareness Month!**

In celebration of August as Breastfeeding Awareness Month, breastfeeding advocates are organizing over 60 Breastfeeding Awareness Walks in at least 29 counties throughout California on August 7, 2007. Cottonwood St. in Woodland and continue to Cline Park where a small reception will be held to honor those breastfeeding mothers participating in the walk.

The theme for the Breastfeeding Awareness Walk, "First Step to a Healthy Life", emphasizes breastfeeding as an obesity prevention strategy. Recent studies have documented the role of breastfeeding in preventing childhood obesity. The greatest protection is seen when breastfeeding is used exclusively (no formula or solid foods) and continues for at least the first 6 months

"One of the top priorities of the Yolo County Health Department is the prevention of overweight and obesity," states Dr. Bette Hinton, Yolo County Health Officer/Director. "We are fortunate to have this opportunity to promote breastfeeding as a healthy choice for mothers and babies, as well as raise awareness for such a widespread problem." 

We have added a new social science/PE teacher, as well as a new math teacher, a half time art teacher and a new science teacher.

Several new programs have been instituted at the middle school for the 2007-2008 school year. Every morning, all students will be concentrating on intense vocabulary strategies that will address language acquisition skills across the curriculum. An intense program. has been implemented for this school year addressing students' needs in the area of learning through reading. Simply, we will be addressing those students who show the greatest need in the area of reading for understanding, decoding and applying written words in learning.

This year, EMS has switched to a semester system that aligns with the high school grading calendar. Several progress reports including a quarterly grading report will be sent home as a means to help parents better understand their child's progress. Each quarter, students will be given a battery of tests in an attempt to monitor their progress. For a lack of a better term, these tests will be quarterly finals and will count towards the students' quarter grades.

Finally, several new things are happening that will be fun and educational for our students. Currently, committees of parents are raising money for the sixth grade science camp at Woodleaf. The Woodleaf program. is fully accredited and focuses student learning on the environment and science. It simply puts the classroom learning into focus for each student and brings to life the things learned in the sixth grade science class. More information will be set home to all parents through the parent newsletter as well as this paper in the near future.

#### **Fluorescent Bulb Recycling**

Starting at the end of July, Ace Hardware in Davis, True Value Hardware and Pacific Ace Hardware in Winters, and Sears in Woodland will begin accepting fluorescent light bulbs and tubes from Yolo County residents for recycling.

This recycling opportunity is made possible by a California Integrated Waste Management Board hazardous waste grant received by Yolo County. These four retail stores in Yolo County have agreed to collect fluorescents from residents in a Take-It-Back partnership and as part of the partnership, the county pays for the disposal of the fluorescents while the retail stores provide staff to collect tubes and the storage space for the boxes of burned out fluorescent tubes. Fluorescents will continue to be accepted as long as grant money remains to pay for the boxes.

The California Department of Toxic Substance Control banned the disposal of fluorescent light bulb in the trash beginning in February 2006. Fluorescents bulbs and tubes contain mercury gas, and when broken, the gas is released in the air. Up until now, the only way to properly dispose of fluorescents bulbs and tubes was to bring them to the monthly household hazardous waste (HHW) drop-off days at the landfill. The landfill will continue to accept fluorescents at their monthly HHW events, but these new drop-off centers provide Yolo County residents an additional avenue for recycling fluorescents. Other HHW, such as paints, propane cylinders and pesticides, still need to be disposed of during a HHW drop-off day at the landfill. The next HHW drop-off days will be August 10 and 11, 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

If you want to bring fluorescent light bulbs in for recycling, please be sure to handle the fluorescents with care. Fluorescents bulbs and tubes (no longer than 4 ft. in length) should be brought to the front desk of the store where a clerk will direct you to the proper recycling location. .



#### Yolo Landfill Accepting Latex Paint

Effective immediately, the Yolo County Central Landfill will begin accepting latex paint on a daily basis. Previously, latex paint has only been accepted during periodically scheduled household hazardous waste (HHW) events. During each of those events, latex paint made up approximately 40% of the total collection of 30,000 to 70,000 pounds of HHW.

This new daily service, funded though use fees collected for garbage disposal at the landfill, is available to Yolo County residents at no charge. It costs about 50 cents per pound to accept, handle and recycle latex paint. In order for latex paint to be accepted it must be in a sealed container and clearly identifiable as latex paint, i.e. original labels or containers. All the latex paint received will be recycled into new latex paint. By making this service available on a daily basis, it is the hope that illegal dumping of paint in the county will be reduced.

Latex paint for recycling will be accepted at the Yolo County landfill during regular business hours, Monday through Saturday, 6:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and Sundays, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

In order for the Yolo County Central Landfill to accept latex paint customers are reminded of the following conditions:

- Yolo County residential customers only (no businesses, no out-of-county) (businesses that fall into the Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator status can schedule and bring paint to the Friday HHW day.
- ONLY latex paint.
- Paint cans must be inspected at the scalehouse to make sure that the cans are sealed, not leaking, and easily identifiable as latex paint (i.e. manufacturer's label).
