Get into the holiday spirit and support your local visual and performing artists. Hope to see you there!



#### **News from Esparto Unified School District**

As the year winds to a close we are completing our first full semester of the Benchmark Assessments that are tied to the California State Standards for which all students are held accountable. I'm positive you have heard the grumblings from your children about the benchmark assessments, as I've heard them in the hallways of the high school. But, let me assure you that these assessments are validating that our students are learning and retaining the State Standards.

This last summer teachers from the K-8 school and the High School worked to develop assessments that are tied to the State Standards and would be assessed every 4 to 8 weeks depending on the subject and readiness of the students. This month we conclude the 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> assessment and have seen tremendous growth in students acquiring the State Standards in English, Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Science. We feel confident that come spring when the State sends out the California State Standards tests, our students will perform at the highest levels, validating what we have always known: we have "bright" students!

The following is a brief article I wrote last year and want to have it reprinted as it lends itself as to why we did what we did this summer with benchmark assessments and with our own teachers writing these assessments.

#### **Effective Classroom Assessment**

In previous articles I've shared with you the results of the California Standards Tests and how well our schools are doing. Over the last four years we have made growth on the Academic Performance Index (API) district-wide, and at the K-8 school. However, we have not yet met the California benchmark of 800 on the Academic Performance Index (API), thus our teachers and students continue to move to improve on this assessment. Assessment is not new to the field of education, we have used assessment to determine student placement in English Language Arts, Mathematics and different school programs. What is new, is that all schools and students are now being held to statewide standards and we are judged by how well we perform based on this once a year assessment.

In Esparto, we are moving to a more active role of assessing students, rather than waiting for the spring to find out how well students are performing on grade level standards. The shift in assessment has moved schools to make the shift on how to plan, instruct and evaluate their students. "Over the past few years, educational research has targeted the most effective ways to improve student achievement. One significant area of research is in effective classroom assessment practices." (Effective Classroom Assessment, 2009) When teachers utilize assessments to modify instruction based on how students meet or do not meet the standards being taught, this becomes a powerful tool for both the teachers and students. "Student achievement improves when assessment is seen as both an instructional tool during the learning process, as well as an accountability tool to determine if learning has occurred (Stiggins, 2003). Please be sure to ask teachers how well your son/daughter is performing on the benchmark assessments.


#### Activities at On Fire Fellowship

#### Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is a week-long celebration held in the United States and Canada, but also celebrated in the African Diaspora. The celebration honors African heritage in African Canadian and African-American culture, and is observed from December 26 to January 1 of each year, culminating in a feast and giftgiving. It is ideologically comprised of seven core principles (*Nguzo Saba*): Unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith. Its intent is to convey in a cultural message what is best to be human and to be African. It has come to be a meaningful holiday for African Americans. The holiday reflects the dignity of the human person socially culturally.

It was created by Maulana Karenga, and was first celebrated in 1966-67. Dr. Karenga is Professor and Chair of Africana Studies at California State University, Long Beach.

#### Hanukkah

Hanukkah, also known as the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday commemorating the rededication of the Holy Temple (the Second Temple) in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt of the 2nd century BC. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights and days, starting on the 25th day of Kislev according to the Hebrew calendar, which may occur at any time from late November to late December in the Gregorian calendar.

The festival is observed by the kindling of the lights of a unique candelabrum, the nine-branched Menorah or Hanukiah, one additional light on each night of the holiday, progressing to eight on the final night. The typical Menorah consists of eight branches with an additional raised branch. The extra light is called a *shamash* and is given a distinct location, usually above or below the rest.

#### **Independent Living Centers Ensure Veterans are Served**

California's 29 Independent Living Centers (ILCs) serve as disability experts to veterans and their families while working hard to ensure they never hear "that's not our service." ILCs provide a full range of independent living services to veterans, including assistance with housing and housing modifications; peer support; benefits counseling; assistance with independent living; and outreach within the community to connect with veterans while creating awareness around the issues they face and accessible services.

California is home to nearly 2 million veterans. Today, numerous veterans return home with a functional limitation after serving in the armed forces and are faced with navigating through uncharted waters to find services. This becomes particularly difficult when they don't know about the resources available to them, which is where ILCs can play a significant role.

Veterans from recent conflicts are facing homelessness much more rapidly than any previous theatre of war, burning through their benefits very quickly and finding themselves on the streets sooner. With the help of ILC, they experience a supportive environment where they get assistance in getting much needed services, such as talking to a benefits expert to mitigate loss of benefits or gain access to durable medical equipment until the benefit is authorized. In essence, we point them in the right direction and help them along the way.

The Disability Services and Legal Center (DSLC), which focuses on assisting veterans in several ways. They are seeing many veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injuries who, on the surface seem fine, but sometimes are challenged to just get through a day. According to DSLC Executive Director Adam Brown, "Veterans often don't see themselves as needing services and, if they do, believe the only services available to them are through the Veterans Administration. We show them what's available and work with them to create an independent living plan that helps them articulate their goals and how to achieve them through multiple resources."

As with other ILCs throughout California, both ILRC and DSLC want veterans to know that the ILCs have staff who understand what veterans have been through and that they are not alone. As a community-based service, they are one of the most cost-effective and welcoming options for veterans and people with functional limitations.

From Brown's perspective, "We want people to understand that having a disability doesn't put you into one big classification of people who can't do anything. It means having issues that can make things more difficult, but we are here to help veterans transition through those difficult issues. These resources help veterans see the world of possibilities and opportunities for rehabilitation, treatment, employment and many more services and resources of which they might not be aware.





#### Be On The Safe Side This Season: Top 10 Tips for Safer Holidays

With the hustle and bustle of the holidays, it seems that there is never enough time to get everything done. It is important—to make sure that safety does not get left off the list. During the holiday season, fires cause more than \$18 million in property damage and holiday decorating injuries send more than 13,000 to the emergency room. Help keep your family safe this season with these quick, simple steps:

#### Water, water, water your tree

Dry trees pose a fire risk – make a fresh cut on the base before putting your tree into a sturdy stand, and water frequently.

#### Check your lights, check them twice

Inspect all of your electric lights and decorations for damage or wear. Cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections may pose a fire or shock hazard.

#### Plan your fire escape

Use the holidays as a good time to practice a fire escape plan with your loved ones. Identify at least two exits from every room in the house.

#### Sleep safe: Install carbon monoxide alarms

Be sure that at least one carbon monoxide alarm is installed on each floor of your home, and always close to sleeping areas.

#### Be flame aware

Always blow out unattended candles and teach your children to stay away from lit candles or fireplaces.

#### Give wrapping paper a second life

Don't burn used wrapping paper as it may cause intense flash fires. Consider recycling or repurposing it instead.

#### **Check extension cords**

Do not connect more than three miniature light strings together. Be sure to check the rating on your extension cords and do not plug in more than the recommended wattage.

#### Vour tree clear

Your tree should be positioned at least three feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources. It should also not block any doorways or exits.

#### Decorate with a safe eye

Cords should not be run under carpets or tacked-up with metal nails or staples. Small decorations can be choking hazards so keep them out of the reach of toddlers.

#### Look for UL

The UL mark on a product means samples of that product have been tested to the highest safety standards. Make sure to look for it to help keep your holidays safe.

#### Food Bank of Yolo County Holiday Distribution Holiday Food Distribution Program 2012

The Food Bank of Yolo County's (FBYC) goal is to distribute 3,000 meals in 2012, half in November and half in December. To achieve this, FBYC will distribute directly from its warehouse and partner with agencies in Esparto, Winters, and West Sacramento to make food available to the community.

The Holiday Food Distribution is open to anyone in Yolo County in need of food assistance this holiday season. Families and individuals can sign up with FBYC directly to receive one holiday meal at a location convenient to them. Please note that holiday meals are one per household and can only be distributed for one holiday meal (November or December).

#### How it will work?

Beginning October 22, Yolo County residents in need of holiday food assistance can contact FBYC directly to sign up for a holiday meal by calling (530) 668-0648. They will be asked to provide their name, address, and number in their family. Based on their geographic location, they will be assigned a distribution point and asked to pick up a voucher at that location. **Vouchers** 

FBYC will create a voucher for each participant. Vouchers will include date, distribution location, pick-up time (listed in 30-minute intervals), and voucher number. All participants are required to pick up their voucher at the distribution location assigned to them the week prior to distribution. \*Please note participants will be required to show ID when picking up their voucher and holiday meal.

#### Voucher Distribution Days in December:

December 17-21, 2012

Participants will return with their voucher on the day of the distribution. All pre-registered participants with vouchers are guaranteed a holiday meal on the day of the distribution.



#### **Yolo County Helps with Hazardous Waste During the Holidays**

The Yolo County Planning & Public Works, Division of Integrated Waste Management will continue to hold weekly collection of household hazardous waste at the Yolo County Central Landfill, located at 44090 County Road 28H in Woodland, every Friday and Saturday, 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. through the winter holiday season, with the exception of Friday, November 23. The landfill, however, will be open for non-hazardous waste on November 23, but closed December 25 and January 1.

Beyond the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program, the landfill accepts hazardous waste from businesses in Yolo County, including items which are corrosive, reactive, toxic or ignitable. Businesses in the areas of construction, printing, equipment or vehicle maintenance, furniture refinishing and farms/ranches that create hazardous waste are encouraged to utilize this program. Business hazardous waste is accepted by appointment only and there is a fee for disposal. For more information about this program or to schedule an appointment, call (800) 207-8222.

Materials that will be accepted from the public and businesses include: batteries; fluorescent bulbs or tubes; used motor oil and filters; cleaning supplies; lighter fluid; antifreeze; aerosols; garden pesticides and herbicides; latex or oil based paints; solvents; poisons; electrical switches/relays; pilot light sensors; mercury thermostats, old medications and containerized syringes.

Yolo County also provides a reuse program which is open to the public during the same hours as the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program. The reuse program makes household cleaning supplies, lawn, garden and automotive products, and household paint available to residents at no charge. Often, these products are dropped off at the household hazardous facility simply because they are no longer needed. Items provided through the reuse program have original labels and are nearly full.

Household hazardous waste events are sponsored by the Yolo County Department of Planning & Public Works, Division of Integrated Waste Management.
