Capay Valley Vision Feedback:

The Energyshed Oversight committee held its first meeting in November. At this time, they began sorting out the elements of the USDA grant and how they might meet those requirements. This grant, funded through the Rumsey Improvement Association, looks at two main focuses for the entire Valley. The first focus is on energy conservation information and referral for the small communities of the Valley. The second focus is on the development of a co-op model for energy production for the farms of the Valley. If you are interested in being included in the information regarding Energyshed, join the conversation by logging onto the website at energyshed.ning.com!

The Capay Valley Vision Board has signed a contract with ENGAGE, the California College of the Arts, and Train Station owner, Maria McVarish, to host a variety of students beginning in January exploring options for the Train Station in Esparto. These students will be interviewing local residents and historians to attempt to build architectural, historical and potentially artistic models for the future of the Train Station. Sue Heitman of Capay Valley Vision will be the host for the project and may be calling you soon to help set up appointments.

The Mercy Housing project is proceeding with ground breaking expected in March of 2012. They recently received approval from the Planning Commission to divide the property, which extends west to east on the corner of Yolo Ave. and Woodland Ave., into four parcels. The corner property will still remain DMX zoned for commercial use and is not the focus of Mercy's building or development. They will begin to build on the next parcel, labeled Parcel 2 in the County filings. The immediate project will construct 40 units for rental. Contact Jeff Riley at Mercy Housing or Eric Parfrey of Yolo County for further information.

The CEMEX wind turbine will be constructed. This single wind turbine had previously been appealed by environmental groups. With much discussion at the Yolo County Board level, it was passed and will be constructed at a different location on the CEMEX property. The Yolo County Board members will be closely watching this project as wind turbines and their effect on the wildlife habitat is an ongoing issue of concern. There is a lack of data in relation to certain species and wind turbines, particularly on bats.

Hurrah for *Junk, Funk and Finery*! This new NON-PROFIT retail store in Esparto has provided a service to all in the Valley. They accept all donations (including setting up pick up times at your request) and then sell these goods back into the community. After the Tarlesson family fire in Guinda, they opened their doors and let everyone pick clothing and goods to replace lost items. This was made possible by the support of the Rolston family's donation to New Season Community Development Corp., the owner of the *Junk, Funk and Finery*. Please continue to give and shop locally. All donations are eligible for a tax donation.

Yocha Dehe Fire Department Names New Fire Chief

National Search for New Leader of Internationally Accredited Department Leads to Local Candidate

The Fire Commission of the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation has selected Gary Fredericksen as the new chief of the Yocha Dehe Fire Department (YDFD). Mr. Fredericksen, currently a Division Chief for the West Sacramento Fire Department, will assume leadership of YDFD on January 3, 2012.

"Our nationwide search brought us an amazing group of qualified candidates and from among them, the person who stood out as the best choice to lead our internationally accredited department was right here in our own backyard," said James Kinter, Chairman of the Yocha Dehe Fire Commission and Tribal Council Member. "Gary Fredericksen is professionally well-rounded, with more than 25 years of line, administrative and leadership experience in fire and emergency services. Plus, he understands the unique challenges of fire and emergency services in our region. This is a perfect combination."

At YDFD, Mr. Fredericksen will command a department with 32 uniformed personnel, three full-time administrative employees, and a full complement of fire suppression, emergency response and rescue equipment. In his present role as Division Chief in charge of Operation and Administration for the West Sacramento Fire Department, Mr. Fredericksen oversees an \$11.5 million budget with 60 line and seven administrative personnel.

"I am excited and humbled to become the chief of the first Native American fire department to achieve international accreditation," said Mr. Fredericksen. "The Yocha Dehe Fire Department is manned with exemplary staff. I look forward to continuing the high quality, professional service this department already delivers as we explore ways to expand the services we provide to the communities of the Capay Valley and Yolo County."

Fredericksen will be taking over for retiring Fire Chief Michael B. Chandler. Chandler was hired by the Yocha Dehe Tribal Council in 2004 with one clear goal: to build a department for the entire community, designed to work hand-in-hand with existing resources to provide the best fire and emergency services possible. In 2010, YDFD became the first tribal fire department in the United States to earn Accredited Agency status through the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI).

"I am incredibly proud of the team the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation has built at its Fire Department," said Chandler. "The professionalism and commitment to first class fire protection and safety for our entire community starts with the Tribal Council and is at the core of everything the department does. Gary Fredericksen has the skills, background and dedication this department needs in a leader as it moves forward. He will be a great chief for a great department."

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

Citizen of the Year Award Goes to Jane Stallings

The Citizen of the Year Award was presented to Jane Stallings and, posthumously, to her husband, David Markham by the Western Yolo Grange at the annual Children's Christmas Play in Guinda on December 10.

Jane & David retired and moved to the Capay Valley 10 years ago. Jane has had an illustrious career in educational research. She was a school teacher with four small children when she became a single mom. She was able to go to Stanford University to complete her PhD in Child Development. David was a true partner to her and provided computer skills and data analysis for many of her research projects. She became the first woman dean at Texas A&M, as well as the president of the National Teaching Research Organization. David also earned a PhD. His career spanned teaching at San Jose State to work on the space shuttle with the MITRE (a technique for analyzing cryptographic protocols). He was a member of several bands and had performed in "Tuba Christmas" for over 25 years at various venues, including in Sacramento.

David and Jane's retirement was filled with continued involvement with educational research. Between 2002 and 2006 they worked for the World Bank & traveled to Morocco, Tunisia, Ghana, Brazil and India.

David served on the Board of the Wayfarers Christian Mission in Woodland for over six years. He was a member of the Capay Valley Chorus and Capay Valley Science Club. Jane serves on the Esparto Unified School District Board of Trustees, where she takes an active interest in the education of all students in the schools. She and David were active participants in the Western Yolo Grange, Society of Friends, Rumsey Club, Hoes Down, and the Friends of the Esparto Regional Library. Capay Valley Schoolhouse

The Capay Valley Schoolhouse's Independent Study program has been meeting in Esparto throughout the school year. This is our second year offering alternative education to students of Capay Valley and we have grown to include two high school students.

Students who wish to work independently at home choose Capay Valley Schoolhouse, administered through Heritage Peak Charter School, for teacher support and group projects. We are a public school (no tuition) with full accreditation, offering home school support and on-site classes. Our families get to choose their own curriculum and electives that are paid for by the school with individual student budgets.

During the fall semester, our K-6 program offered morning circle with a focus on poetry and social communication. We played a variety of math skills games. We read together Three Cups of Tea, a young readers edition, by Greg Morgenstern, applying reading to studies in geography, history, science, and several writing assignments.

Heritage Peak Charter offers high school students that choose a different path the opportunity to maintain access to a four-year college while engaging in school in the manner that is effective for them. The high school students in our program have the option of taking classes in Vacaville, or online, both with tutoring available. Classes are offered at UC approved college prep level. Independent study offers these students greater flexibility and many students also take concurrent community college classes so that when they graduate they already have some units of college credit.

News from Esparto Unified School District Submitted by Aida Buelna, Superintendent

On November 15, 2011 the Yolo County Committee on School
District Organization (County Committee) met to discuss the California Voting
Rights Act (CVRA) and at-large election systems. On November 16, 2011 the District received correspondence from the County Superintendent, Dr. Jorge Ayala, sharing that "We recommend that you review the information you have received and consider a decision to move to trustee area elections; the County Committee is concerned about your district's vulnerability."

The California Legislature enacted the California Voting Rights Act in 2001. (See California Elections Code 14025-14032). This legislation makes all at-large election systems in California for cities, school districts and special districts vulnerable to legal attack, largely on proof of racially polarized voting, regardless of whether a majority district can be formed, and under the interpretation adopted by plaintiffs in other pending "CVRA" cases, without regard to the electoral success of minority candidates or the need to prove actual racial injury exists.

The CVRA purports to alter several requirements that plaintiffs would have to prove under the Federal Voting Rights Act, thereby making it easier to challenge atlarge election systems.

The first suit under the CVRA was filed against the City of Modesto in 2004. Modesto challenged the racial constitutionality of the CVRA on the basis that, by using race as the sole criterion of liability, the CVRA contains a suspect racial classification that California was required to justify under equal protection strict scrutiny standards. The trial court struck down the statue but the California Court of Appeal reversed (*Sanchez v. City of Modesto* (2006) 145 Cal. App 4th 660).

The City of Modesto ultimately settled the litigation, but not before paying plaintiffs \$3 million dollars in plaintiff attorney fees (the prevailing party [other than a public agency] is entitled to an award of their attorneys' fees and cost under the CVRA) and another \$1.7 million to its own attorneys.

Similarly, the Hanford Joint Union High School District was sued under the CVRA and after adopting trustee areas and establishing by-trustee area elections (and requesting and receiving the same waiver from the State Board of Education that will be presented to the Board), paid plaintiffs in that lawsuit the sum of \$110,000 pursuant to a settlement agreement. Most recently, the Madera Unified School District has been sued under the CVRA and their November 2008 governing board member election was enjoined by the court. The Plaintiffs in that case demanded \$1.8 million in attorney fees from that District.

It is imperative that the Esparto Unified School District adopt a by-trustee area election to avoid the threat of lawsuits under the California Voting Rights Act of 2001. The District currently utilizes an at-large election process to elect its governing board members. The District's failure to successfully adopt and implement trustee areas and a by-trustee area election process leaves it vulnerable to such litigation in which the District would be exposed to potentially having to pay significant attorney fees to plaintiffs, which would pose an undue hardship and extreme detriment to the District and its students.

On December 13, 2011 the Esparto Unified School District heard information on the CVRA and will be taking action on January 10, 2012 as to the direction for future school board member elections in the Esparto Unified School District

Several public hearings will be taking place to provide the public an opportunity to give input into this process. The District will be working with the County Election Office to draw several maps that will outline the "by trustee" areas from which future school board members will be elected. Once these maps are drawn they will be placed on the District Website and shared at the following public hearings:

- Tuesday, December 27, 2011 at 6:00 p.m. Marsh Hall, EHS
- Wednesday, December 28, 2011 at 6:00 p.m. Grange Hall, Guinda, CA
- Tuesday, January 10, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. Marsh Hall, EHS

Volunteers are trained using IRS-developed materials, and must take a certification exam each year to qualify to prepare taxes. 

Guinda Family Are Victims of Fire

On Sunday, December 4, a multi-purpose room at the Tarlesson's family farm in Guinda, California burned to the ground. Most of the children's clothing and hundreds of bibles and school books that had been stored in preparation for shipment to their native country of Liberia were destroyed. So was the truck they used to transport their organic produce to market.

Roosevelt, the family patriarch, credits divine intervention for saving their family home, when strong winds diverted the flames from the main house.

All 16 of the Tarlessons are members of the Western Yolo Grange, where their smiles, native dancing and spirituality is greatly appreciated. They have shared their talents with all of us, entertaining at several of our conventions and events, and helping raise money for many Grange causes. In October, they took home the Samuel L. Williams Trophy for youth participation at our State Convention.

Their family story is a remarkable journey from the jungles of Liberia, where they escaped a violent civil war to travel to America where they started a farm.

Now, they need our help. They need to rebuild the room that was used as a dressing room and study by the children, and to replace the bibles and school books, their produce truck, and eventually the building itself. They are looking for a temporary trailer home or office that can be used, as winter approaches.

The Tarlesson family would like to thank the many individuals, churches and organizations that have been so helpful and concerned since the fire in their outbuilding on December 4. Some of the groups are who have helped include the Western Yolo Grange and the California State Grange; Guinda Community Church; Countryside Community Church; Capay Valley Christian Fellowship; Calvary Baptist Church of Woodland. Most profound gratitude goes to the Capay Valley Fire Department, not only for their prompt rescue, but also for their generous donations.

The outbuilding in which were stored clothing, also housed the laundry room, shower, and a commode. There was a storage room that contained many thousands of educational materials that were gathered to send to their home country of Liberia and an attached chicken coop –truly a multipurpose building. The truck which was used to transport organic African and Asian vegetables to market was destroyed.

The community has been so generous in their response. All the clothes that can currently be used, since there is so little room for storage, have already been received. A dumpster has been brought in to clean up the mess. Building supplies and monetary donations to help defer the cost of clean-up and rebuilding are what are needed now. 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Cache Creek Conservancy, Sacramento Tree Foundation and Center for Land-Based Learning Plant Trees at Yolo County's Cache Creek Nature Preserve

On December 14 the Cache Creek Conservancy, the Sacramento Tree Foundation and the Center for Land-Based Learning partnered to plant 200 native trees and shrubs on the grounds of Yolo County's Cache Creek Nature Preserve. Follow up instruction on tree identification, monitoring techniques and how to use handheld GPS devices will be provided in February.

"This collaborative project illustrates the potential for local students to play a central role in positive work for the environment, while learning about career opportunities," said Yolo County Supervisor Duane Chamberlain.

The Cache Creek Conservancy, a non-profit corporation dedicated to the restoration of the lower Cache Creek corridor, manages the Cache Creek Nature Preserve which is owned by Yolo County. The conservancy coordinated the tree planting and maintains all plantings for a period of three years.

The Sacramento Tree Foundation, whose mission is to grow healthy, livable communities in the Sacramento region by building the best regional urban forest in the nation, provided the native trees and shrubs and assisted with the planting, including instructional demonstrations. The foundation will assist with the educational program in February.

The Center for Land-Based Learning is dedicated to creating the next generation of farmers and teaching youth about the importance of agriculture and watershed conservation. The center's SLEWS (Student and Landowner Education and Watershed Stewardship) program teaches high school students about habitat restoration and protection while working on active projects. By including students in habitat restoration, SLEWS addresses the need for healthier land and more wildlife habitat, and instills conservation and stewardship values in high school students.
