
# Happy New Year from Capay Valley Vision



### **Drought Housing Relocation Funds Approved**

The California Department of Housing & Community Development has awarded \$150,000 to Yolo County to provide relocation assistance to Yolo County residents without access to potable water as a result of the drought.

This award, from the Community Development Block Program, is part of the Drought Housing Relocation Assistance Program which was established under the governor's drought state of emergency to assist eligible households, renters and homeowners in relocating and receiving rental assistance for 12 months in the assessments and also complete the four mathematics assessments. The students event they lack reasonable access to potable water as a result of the drought. The program also provides assistance with security deposits, last month's rent and a one-time moving cost allowance.

The Yolo County Office of Emergency Services (OES), which is responsible for the planning, preparation and coordination of large-scale emergencies throughout the county, will have oversight of the program as they also manage groundwater/dry well issues. Yolo County Housing, however, will carry out the program since they have provided quality affordable housing and community development services for 65 years.

"Most Yolo County residents living in the unincorporated areas rely heavily on wells for their water needs, and some of those wells are drying up," said Yolo County OES Coordinator Dana Carey. "This funding allows us to offer water assistance during a time when the drought has seriously impacted our communities."

Experts agree that the drought will not end in California with one wet winter. Even with the projection of an El Niño winter, the number of dry wells and residents seeking assistance is anticipated to increase throughout 2016 and beyond. I hope that you all had a restful, joyful and eventful winter break.





## **Rural Libraries Receives Increased Broadband Service**

This past November, Yolo County's library branches in Esparto, Knights Landing and Yolo increased broadband service to one gigabyte, thus increasing the Internet speed at these locations.

The Yolo County Library obtained funds for these improvements through the State Library's partnership with the Corporation for Education Network Initiatives in California (CENIC). CENIC, along with Governor Brown and the legislature's "Lighting Up Libraries" initiative, has allowed for the deployment of improved, lower cost broadband services to public libraries across the state, now including rural libraries within Yolo County.

By supporting the critical and long-term connectivity needs of Yolo County's residents, users will be able to more easily access the Internet to job search, find local government or healthcare resources and engage in online education.


"I've noticed a lot more people at the library with their laptops," said Maria Sandoval, staff at Yolo County's Esparto Regional Library. "Customers can now open programs to do homework or use the Internet to find information much more quickly."

With the remaining funds from CENIC, the library was able to purchase additional equipment which will increase broadband services to 10 gigabytes by July 2016 at both the Arthur F. Turner Community Library in West Sacramento and the Mary L. Stephens Davis Branch Library.

"More than 120,000 people accessed the Internet at these two branches in 2014," said Yolo County Librarian Patty Wong. "Customers are not only visiting our libraries to borrow materials, but to also access the Internet."

The Yolo County Library continues to support the community and provide access to information and services. These changes are possible through support and partnerships with the community, Yolo County Library branches and the Friends of the Library. # **Rainfall Totals for 2015**

2015 looks to be closing out as the third driest calendar year in 127 years of record-keeping here at Taber's Corner. Over ten inches of rain fell last December; since then we have received just 7.35 inches. 2013 was the driest ever with only fourplus inches. Our average annual total is 22.64, so the short-fall in the present drought is tremendous.

It has been great to hear about the rainfall amounts in the foothills of the Mother Lode and to see the snow falling in the Sierra Nevada. Unfortunately, here in the Capay Valley, we are still waiting for El Nino to bring us the gift of moisture. (See chart to the right. These totals were taken at Taber's Corner in the Capay Valley.)

# Yolo County Receives USDA Grant to Increase Local Foods in School Cafeterias



The Yolo County Agriculture Department's farm to school program is one of 74 projects, spanning 39 states, receiving support this year from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm to School Program to better connect school cafeterias and students with local farmers and ranchers. Yolo County's project received a \$93,500 grant which will impact 35,000 students in five Yolo County School districts, including Woodland, Esparto, Davis, West Sacramento and River Delta.

"Farm to school programs work – for schools, for producers and for communities," said USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack. "By serving nutritious and locally grown foods, engaging students in hands-on lessons, and involving parents and community members, these programs provide children with a holistic experience that sets them up for a lifetime of healthy eating. With early results from our Farm to School Census indicating schools across the nation invested nearly \$600 million in local products, farm to school also provides a significant and reliable market for local farmers and ranchers."

The Yolo County Agriculture Department has a three year history of farm to school activities focusing on making the connection between local farms and school cafeterias. With this grant, Yolo County will continue to work jointly with each school district, as well as the UC Davis Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education Program, with the four major goals of:

- Helping farmers acquire the required third party food safety Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) certification;
- 2. Providing funding directly to school districts;
- 3. Analyzing crop usage in school cafeterias;
- 4. And providing schools and farmers with a 'forager' to make the personal connection between the two.

"Schools and farms don't always speak the same language," said Yolo County Agricultural Commissioner John Young. "Having a 'forager' available as a 'translator' for schools and institutional buyers makes all the difference in terms of local procurement for schools."

Additionally, this grant will help a number of local farms get their third party Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) food safety certification.

"Food safety standards are becoming stricter and farms frequently struggle to keep up with the requirements," said Yolo County Agriculture Department Project Director Kristy Lyn Levings. "This grant provides training and writing services directly to farms seeking their GAP certification which makes them eligible to do business with schools and other institutional buyers."






