





#### **Capay Valley Vision Feedback**

**Recreation District**: Good news for our community! The Yolo County Board of Supervisors approved the creation of a parks and recreation district as part of MERCSA. In addition, they approved seeking a State grant for up to 5 million dollars for the creation of ball fields, soccer field, swimming pool, recreation center, basketball courts and walking paths for community use in Esparto. If funded, this project only needs community support for the maintenance of these facilities. More good news! The Esparto Unified School District unanimously voted to allow MERCSA to utilize their 7-acre parcel near the high school for the building of these facilities. That means, if funded, there will be an agreement in place similar to the Esparto library where EUSD still owns the land, but the community, and of course, the students will have access to ball fields, a swimming pool and recreation center. This grant is part of a voter initiative passed several years ago that pays for the creation of new parks and park facilities throughout California. The grant must be submitted by March 1 to meet the first round of funding. Big kudos and thanks go to Trini Campbell with WYORCA for leading the effort; Regina Espinosa of Yolo County and Tim Brock of EUSD for going the extra mile and all of the committee members who have donated so much of their time and energy to make this dream come true for our children and families in the Valley. Capay Valley Vision; New Seasons Community Development Corporation: Knights of Columbus: ECAC: Junior Spartans: WORCA: Esparto PTA; Madison Community Advisory Committee; Esparto Little League; Capay Valley AYSO; RISE, Inc; Capay Valley Rotary; Esparto Unified School District; and MERCSA are all supporters of this project. We are still seeking support from other organizations that are working on recreation needs in our community. If you are interested and have not been contacted, please let Trini Campbell of WYORCA know at trini@riverdogfarm.com. **Streetscape:** Esparto Citizens Advisory Committee gathered feedback from many in Esparto about the work on Yolo Ave. As was stated last month, good news and bad news. The street paint and realignment work is continuing and the result will be 11-foot lanes; back-end diagonal parking in some areas and crosswalks on every corner. The stamp print for the crosswalks will not be able to be completed until the dry weather returns. The bad news is we lost a turn lane on Grafton, the signage is confusing and the paving is messy. The locals appointed as volunteers on the Streetscape Task Force will be taking the concerns forward to the next task force meeting when it is scheduled. CalTrans has the final say and their foremost concern is safety.

#### News from Esparto Unified School District Submitted by Aida Buelna, Superintendent



#### **State Budget:**

This month marks the third year that the District must make budget cuts if we are to create a balanced budget. The current proposed budget by the Governor would impose approximately a \$227,000 cut to our District budget. The District office has reviewed possible budget reductions with the School Board at its regularly scheduled school board meetings. This has been a very trying experience for everyone involved as we continue to review what we can do as a District to meet these cuts and continue to provide a quality educational program to the students of the Esparto Unified School District. Our allocation from the State for per pupil budget has gone from \$6,793 in the current year to \$5,546 with an additional \$225 cut for next year's school budget, making our per pupil allocation \$5321.

#### **School Climate Surveys:**

I would like to take the opportunity to thank all the parents who submitted the School Climate Surveys. I shall be working on creating a quantifiable value for each question, tabulating the responses and assigning an average for each question. The numerical value shall range from 4 being high to 1 being low. The information we generate will assist us in better serving the needs of your children. The results will be presented to the Board of Trustees and published in the next Valley Voice. Thank you for your assistance.

#### California Standards Test:

Please join me in congratulating Esparto Elementary School students for meeting their API/AYP benchmarks on last year's state testing. All students performed at the benchmark levels required. A special thanks to all of the staff at the elementary school for the work they have done to assist students in learning the grade level standards.

#### Esparto Unified School District Receives Check from PG&E

During the February 3, 2010 Board Meeting, PG&E presented Esparto Unified School District with an Energy Conservation Rebate Check in the amount of \$11,081. This check was presented to the district for including various energy savings features in the design of the new Multi-Purpose facility at Esparto Middle School. The District design team, headed by Dwayne Evans, Architect, designed the new Multi-Purpose room to include energy saving features in compliance with Title IX energy conservation goals. Based upon achieving these goals, PG&E presented the District with incentive funding for achieving energy efficiency in both the facility design and equipment installed.

#### Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation Provides \$100,000 in Emergency Relief to Cheyenne River Sioux Reservation in South Dakota

Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation has provided \$100,000 to assist the Cheyenne River Sioux with disaster relief efforts. Severe winter storms have caused critical damage on the Northern Plains reservation, leaving Cheyenne River tribal members without electricity, heat and running water for more than a week in some cases.

"This is a time for our nation to come to the assistance of another tribe in desperate need. Our Tribal Council was deeply moved by the profound damage the Cheyenne River Sioux people are suffering in these winter storms," said Yocha Dehe Tribal Chairman Marshall McKay. "We took immediate action after receiving the press release declaring disaster on the South Dakota reservation, and we hope that further government assistance will reach them with speed and efficiency."

The January 22nd ice storm that hit the Dakotas, hit the Cheyenne River reservation especially hard, knocking down nearly 3,000 power lines that provided electricity to the tribe. Thousands of already impoverished residents were without electricity or heat for nearly a week, with wind chill factors well below zero. The loss of electricity crippled the aging water system, and knocked out all running water on the reservation.

Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation is committed to standing together with other tribal and non-tribal governments to face challenges that impact Native people everywhere. "We stand in kinship with the San Manual Band of Mission Indians and the Tribal Alliance of Sovereign Indian Nations in our commitment to help our Cheyenne River brothers and sisters come out of this crisis swiftly and safely," said Chairman McKay. The Yocha Dehe Tribal Council called Cheyenne River Chairman Joe Brings Plenty directly to notify him that their support was on its way.

The Yocha Dehe Community Fund was one of the first to be established by a Native American tribe in California and is a recognized leader in local charitable giving.

#### **Building Amnesty Program**

Through the Yolo County Building Amnesty Program, between March 1 and June 1, 2010, owners of property in the unincorporated areas of Yolo County will have the opportunity to apply for building permits through the Yolo County Planning & Public Works Department for buildings, additions, remodels, electrical, plumbing and mechanical work that was not completed with the benefit of permits and the associated inspections. The benefits of obtaining building permits through the Building Amnesty Program include:

- Double building permit penalty fee waived
- Use of the building code that was in effect at the time of construction (typically less restrictive)
- No civil penalties assessed for site development work without permits
- Removal of deed recorded Violation for Non-Compliance on property file
- Assignment of Yolo County Planning & Public Works staff to assist with the application process.

Property owners who secure retroactive permits through this program must still comply with all provisions of Yolo County development regulations, i.e. floodplain, building and fire codes, zoning and improvement standards, and health regulations for septic and well designs. This program is only available for uses allowed within the zoning classification for the parcel. For example, an auto repair shop built illegally in a residential neighborhood would not be able to obtain zoning approvals through this process.
