This year the Esparto FFA had a very successful Yolo County Fair. We participated in many activities and represented Esparto well. We had exhibits in both livestock and Agriculture Mechanics and received honors in both. All students were able to sell their projects and came away successful.

In the livestock area we had projects in dairy calves, sheep and swine. Kaitlyn Sloan took Reserve Champion Dairy Market Calf and 2nd in novice showmanship. Mariesa Cramer exhibited two sheep, a Hampshire and a Crossbred, both did well in class. Mariesa also placed third in advanced sheep showmanship. Mariesa was invited to Master Showmanship on Friday evening where she exhibited all the species of large animals and won thirds place. Mireya Padilla exhibited a Colored Cross Bred Market Lamb and placed third in her class. Monica Quiroz placed fourth in her class and also did well in showmanship. In Market Hogs Hannah Adan showed a Duroc and placed second in her class. Jaelyn Dutton exhibited a Hampshire and placed fourth in her class, Mikayla Shera also had a Hampshire and placed second in her class. Tyler Zentner showed a Yorkshire hog and placed first in his class. Ana Vazquez showed a Chester White and placed second in her class. Kendra Zentner had a Crossbred hog and placed second in her class. All of the exhibitors helped earn the "Clean Stall Award," which Esparto has won for the past three years.


Esparto was also represented in the Agriculture Mechanics competition. Kendra Zentner exhibited the Most Outstanding Weld in the Arc Welding Contest. Victoria Jensen exhibited the Most Outstanding Rope Splice and the Most Outstanding Electrical Project.

Esparto dominated the Medium Woodworking project division. Morgan Findley's planter box placed first. Tyler Zentner's tile-topped table earning second. Samantha Dutton's Adirondack chair placed third. Jacob Jensen's Adirondack chair took fourth. In the Welding Division Danny Hackett placed second, Mario Alcaraz placed third, and Tyler Zentner placed fourth. In the Small Woodworking division Alexis Cook's clay pot holder took second. In the Electrical Project division Victoria Jensen placed first and Matt Kieny placed second. In the Metal Working division Garrett Magnuson's bird feeder/lantern hangers placed fifth. These students all worked hard this past year and represented Esparto well at the fair.

Esparto FFA had two students participate in the First Annual Ag Mechanics Project Auction. David Tague and Tyler Zentner both worked hard on their projects and their hard work paid off on Wednesday night when they auctioned them off after the opening night Fair Gala. The auction is designed to give Ag Mechanics students an avenue to earn money by selling their projects. We would like to thank all those who came out to participate in the auction. Tyler sold his tile topped table to Gayle McLevich and David sold his BBQ Smoker to Trico Welding.

Saturday rounded out the fair with the livestock auction. We would like to thank all of the buyers who came out and supported the auction. CAPAY VALLEY ALMOND FESTIVAL UPDATE

On August 8, a community vote was taken by members of organizations and groups in the Capay Valley to determine the date for the future Almond Festival. Almost unanimously, **the last Sunday in February** was the chosen date. Capay Valley Vision Board members, Alice Manas of Esparto and Vicki Murphy of Rumsey, tallied the votes and Sue Heitman of Capay facilitated the discussion. During the vote count, participants were asked to comment on the following question and their responses are included.

The Capay Valley has seen many types of planning and task force groups for the Almond Festival over the years. What are some options for an overall planning group for the Capay Valley Almond Festival that you believe would lead to its success in the future. Responses:

- "I am an advocate for a community-wide Almond Festival Planning Committee (AFPC). This group would have jurisdiction over votes (such as the date, etc.) It would be made up of individuals who are dedicated to making the event successful. It would be wonderful if there were people on the AFPC from each community but only if they were dedicated to making meetings and really into cooperating together. I do not see another 501c3 organization. This would be a waste of time but I also don't see the Chamber of Commerce having exclusive right over running the festival."
- "A collaborative community organization with representation from EVERY interested party-a representative must attend at least 70% of the meetings. Key decisions impacting outreach, sponsorships, etc. should be run through this committee."
- "A planning committee made up of participants to coordinate, advertise and fund the Almond Festival. At the present, the Chamber is doing the advertising and since they also collect the money from sponsors, they should fund the advertising and staffing."
- "The general format that has been used the past few years works. What could
 be clearer is who the chair is and the structure of the group. Those who are
 interested in particular committees should put their efforts predominately in
 that area."
- "I believe the Chamber is doing a good job overseeing the event. A planning committee is fine. Working with the Chamber would be fine. I do not believe we need bylaws, etc. Keep it simple."
- "I would love to see a planning group in which many groups are involved, meaning they actually attend meetings that have decision-making authority."
- "The Capay Valley Almond Festival should be run by (2) representatives of each of the sites."
- "Robert's Rules of order! Set meeting times and place. Operational guidelines set/defined. Should be in control (as a whole) for all things regarding Almond Fest"
- "I am new to the planning for the Almond Festival and would to help in any way needed."





News from Esparto Community Services District

In 1968 the Esparto Community Service District (ECSD) drilled for a new well at the corner of Omega and Grafton Streets,

naming it Well 4. Unfortunately, the well produced sand in quantities that made it unusable for drinking water.

With full approval and support of the ECSD Board, General Manager Mel Smith (GM) is using new technology to bring Well 4 into production. Well 4 has the capacity to produce several hundred gallons of water a minute for the community of Esparto. We anticipate the cost of retrofitting Well 4 will be kept well under the cost of drilling a test well. It will be a much needed addition to our water production capacity saving the district several hundred thousand dollars. You may have seen what seems to be excess water running into the ditches near the corner of Grafton & Omega Streets prior to September 1, but this is normal and required when flushing a well that was first drilled over 40 years ago.

Directors Colleen Fescenmeyer (Vice-Chair), Steven Knightly, Trish Roath, Anna Girk and Melissa Jordan (Chair) are very pleased to share some of this past year's major efforts of GM Mel Smith and your ECSD staff: Utility Operators, Jason Findley and Mike Hays and Office Assistant, Michelle Huitt.

Restore/Restory Project

A People's History of the Cache Creek Nature Preserve

The UC Davis Art of Regional Change program has teamed up with the Cache Creek Conservancy to produce a "people's history" of the Cache Creek Nature Preserve. The project, called Restore/Restory, has brought UC Davis students, scholars and artists together with Yolo County residents over the course of one year to share stories, views, traditions, and relationships to Cache Creek and the region we call home.

The result is a rich, story-based website filled with community interviews, photo collages, maps, and timelines as well as a site-based audio tour of the Nature Preserve. The audio tour features diverse voices at different places on the grounds and can be taken on the project website or using audio devices provided at the Nature Preserve. Esparto High School News From the Desk of the Principal, Aida Buelna

New to Esparto High School this year will be a Superintendent/Principal. The School Board in the spring eliminated the high school principal position due to a drop in high school enrollment and a loss of state revenue. This upcoming school year I shall be overseeing the high school along with my duties as Superintendent. To assist with this job, we have hired a vice principal, Mr. Diego Ochoa. Contrary to rumors floating in the community:

WE ARE NOT CLOSING THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Several years back the State changed how it allocated funds to schools for student attendance. The State of California changed to reflect a loss of revenue to the school districts whenever a student was not in attendance. What this means is that if a student does not attend school, regardless of the reason, illness, medical appointments, etc., the district does not collect revenue. The Education Code requires that we specify the reason for an absence, excused or unexcused for reasons of Truancy; however, the excused absences no longer provide revenue to the School Districts.

We ask that you ensure that your students attend school on a daily basis as their absence does affect their performance in the classroom. When students are not present they cannot participate in the class discussions or ask questions if there is something they did not understand. Saturday Academy will be offered at least once a month for students who have been absent and need extra assistance.

The student handbook is very specific about the Dress Code. We ask that all parents and students review this area of the handbook and adhere to the code. A health and safety issue is footwear. Students are asked to refrain from wearing "flip flops" or backless shoes during the school day, as these may cause a safety issue.

Your support in this area is greatly appreciated and would support the entire staff at the high school, in that we would be able to focus on what is of utmost importance, your student's education!

In this paragraph I will focus on areas that highlight the positive things that our youth are involved in, the success of the students academically and acknowledge students that are making a difference.



AFFORDABLE, ACCESSIBLE HOUSING INCREASINGLY OUT OF REACH FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

People living with disabilities face a significant problem - the lack of affordable, accessible housing. Approximately 54 million Americans have at least one disability, constituting the largest minority group in the nation. And people with disabilities often spend a disproportionate share of their income to secure housing that is both safe and suitably accessible. Federal guidelines define housing as "affordable" if total costs, including rent/mortgage, utilities, insurance and taxes, don't exceed 30 percent of a renter's or homeowner's household income. Individuals currently eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) in California receive \$854.40 per month, while couples receive \$1,444.20. Under the 30 percent housing affordability guidelines, an individual living solely on SSI should pay no more than \$256.32 per month for housing and a couple no more than \$433.26. With this in mind, affordable housing is nearly impossible for people with disabilities to find and thousands and thousands of names are on waiting lists throughout the state.

Affordability is just one problem. Accessibility also is a challenge. Several California communities are trying to address the lack of accessibility by, among other things, adopting the state's Universal Design Model Ordinance. The intent of the ordinance is to increase opportunities for persons with temporary, developing or permanent disabilities to "age in place."

Trying to decipher the maze of information and resources can be overwhelming, and that's where independent living centers (ILCs) come into play. ILCs provide a number of services to people living with disabilities, including educating them about housing options as well as assisting them in negotiating rents and with landlords.

According to experts in the industry, education is the key to making a difference. Individuals need to be made aware of programs and agencies that are working with lenders, housing authorities and service providers in creating innovative housing options, such as "smart-home" technology, within their locale. Experts also believe it's imperative for people with disabilities to talk to elected leaders about their real-life experiences and the need for policies that improve affordability and accessibility.

"We are committed to supporting people living with disabilities in getting their voices heard," said Elsa Quezada, Chair of the California State Independent Living Council. "By providing people with timely and pertinent information, training and education, we can arm them with the tools they need to live independently and not take "no" for an answer."





DJ came out amazingly strong in the Pole Bending.
