Leadership Model

Chairperson, Mike Lieber, reported an update to the congregation about what One Board has been studying. Here are some highlights from that report:

Members of One Board are: Sam Benham, Chris Burris, Ron Burris, Mike Shafer, Steve Barnett, Tyler Clendenin, Mike Shaner, Cindy Wilkins, Joe Moody, Alicia Niceswanger, and Judy Norris, Mike Lieber (chair)

- The Board is studying all the repairs needed on both of our buildings that are aging. Specifically, they are looking at how to make our furnace in the main building safe.
- The Board is considering raising the rental fees for Crossroads to be more in line with the going rates of other facilities of similar size. They are also studying the use of the building, how to build that use in the community, and keeping costs down for its upkeep.
- Subcommittees are working to monitor each of our buildings and the needs for their upkeep.
- The year began with a balanced budget based on past giving and anticipated expenses. However, our giving has not kept up with the monthly budget, which is an ongoing concern of the Board.
- The Board increased Anna King's hours to encourage the development of our youth programs.
- Mike will continue to bring the congregation updates as needed.

Grief Recovery



Grief can be paralyzing, crippling our life after loss. It can also be a recurring memory or thought that stops us where we are, for a moment, for hours or even for days. There is no right or wrong way to grieve, but it is a necessary journey in forging a path forward after loss of a loved one, loss of employment, loss of feeling safe, and many other ways in which we experience harm or unwanted change.

Through research conducted by Kent State University, The Grief Recovery Method approach to helping grievers deal with the pain of emotional loss in any relationship is effective and evidence-based, the only grief support program with that distinction. First Church will offer this opportunity in the Fall/Winter to our congregation and to our community. Each of the eight sessions will be 2-hours in duration. A maximum of 15 people will be accepted. Purchase of a textbook is required (scholarships available), and can be ordered through Walmart, Thriftbooks, ChristianbookStore or Amazon (least to most expensive vendors). HOPE Letters



HOPE Letters is an Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections (ODRC)-supported mentorship through correspondence ministry that is faith-based and focused on supporting reentry. HOPE Letters writers offer encouragement, guidance, and restorative relationships with men and women incarcerated in Ohio's prisons. Our goal for all HOPE Letters groups is to be a welcoming community for those who have returned home after an incarceration experience.

Report from Sam Benham, Alternate Lay Delegate, Representing FUMC at the 2026 West Ohio Annual Conference

Greetings sisters and brothers in Christ.

I represented FUMC as its lay delegate at the 2026 West Ohio Annual Conference, which ran from May 27-30 at Capital University in Bexley. I attended as an alternate for our regular delegate, Mike Lieber, who will hopefully be able to attend next year. I attended with Pastor Nikki and Judy Hug, one of our certified lay ministers. In years past, FUMC has sent two lay delegates—last year Clarence McCoy and Steve Williams—but, this year, we only sent one because we may send one for each pastor we have. This maintains a balance of clergy and lay representatives at the gathering.

The theme of this conference was “Abundant Grace,” and focused on Matthew 14:13-21, the feeding of the five thousand. In Bishop Hee-Soo Jung’s opening sermon, he contrasted the table of Jesus, which produced overwhelming grace that created good results with the death of John the Baptist that directly precedes these verses in Mathew. This execution was put into effect around the table of King Herod, the result of a display of power, manipulation, and violence. Herod’s table, though filled with sumptuous foods, did not satisfy and did not lead to good outcomes. It is the table of the world. As followers of Christ and United Methodists, the Bishop called us to reject the pursuit of worldly power and instead reflect and spread Christ’s abundant grace through our lives and actions.

A delegation of Methodist clergy and lay leaders from South Korea attended as special guests, reflecting the unique bond between Ohio and South Korea. The earliest Methodist missionaries to Korea were from Ohio—William Scranton and his mother, Mary Scranton. The two are recognized as founding members of the Methodist Church in Korea. It was a special treat to worship with them. We also celebrated a significant milestone. This is the 70th year anniversary of UMC’s ordination of women clergy and the 30th year anniversary of the creation of deacons, who are clergy with a slightly difference focus and mission than ordained elders. An Episcopal bishop, Shay Craig of North Dakota, delivered a sermon commemorating the occasion, noting the parallels to the abundant grace theme, with each event resulting in the disbursement of pastoral authority from a centralized power structure. To that end, we recognized, commissioned, and ordained several new elders, deacons, and certified lay ministers, most of whom were women.

Most of the conference was filled with receiving reports from various conference committees. On the conference level, the budget seems to have largely stabilized, buoyed by good investment returns. One area of concern identified was that 14% of churches in the conference have not paid any apportionments in the last year. Exciting news was shared that the Wesley Retreat and Camp property, located near Bellefontaine, is, for the first time in a while, sponsoring camps for kids across the conference. One of our business items was to amend the conference’s bylaws to account for the governance and operation of the camp. We also heard about exciting developments in missions and ministry across the conference. The Bishop and his staff laid out goals connected to a five-prong vision statement: building relationships, shared mission, discipleship, multiplication, and emerging leaders. In other business, the conference approved recommendations for equitably compensating pastors of different statuses and approved matters related to clergy pensions and health insurance coverage. The conference also approved a resolution to support the civil rights of transgender individuals, in response to concerns of the applicability of proposed government legislation that may impact the ability of transgender clergy to preach. Conferees also approved a plan to create a task force focusing on rehabilitating clergy who are recovering from substance abuse. Some of these were debated, particularly about wording, intent, and grammar, but all six business items were passed overwhelmingly by the conference. After listening to the arguments, I voted for each of the six items.

Report from Sam *(continued)*

One of the big initiatives that will come to a head next year is whether West and East Ohio conferences will combine their operations and territories into the new Ohio Conference. We currently share Bishop Jung but retain separate administrative committees and functions. This will be an item of heavy discussion throughout the year, especially at the conference level.
