## Who's Who at Trinity

#### **Diane Harrop**



I grew up in Ancaster back when it was village and we spent the days outside, out of our parent's hair. Luckily, I had one set of grandparents with a farm and another with a cottage so this small town girl learned to appreciate life on a tractor as well as on a dock.

I loved the independence of being at McMaster University and when my father was transferred to France with International Harvester, I also benefited from a year at Université de Grenoble, where I switched my degree from Honours English to French. France has been my second home ever since and I return to enjoy its beauty frequently.

After graduation I began teaching at a little eight-room school in Millbrook, where all the teachers wore many hats and willingly did whatever was needed to help out. I have always felt my best initiative was to create a Life Skills class so I could then send students out to co-

op positions. It helped many students stay in school and directed others to their career choices.

After my marriage ended, I threw my resumé to the wind and ended up in a school for the gifted in Oakville. I had never taught elementary students and was nervous, but they were so eager that I quickly learned to love them. Here I developed a grade 8 French course for those who had left immersion to go into the gifted program that would allow them to skip grade 9 if they passed the exam and go straight to grade 10 immersion. They worked hard and all of them went straight to grade 10. From there I moved on to a 7- OAC French Immersion school in Bronte. Somewhere along the line I took up Tae Kwondo, learned to quilt and joined a marching band before moving to Gravenhurst High as Department Head of Languages. Each of these very different schools was interesting, challenging and extremely rewarding to someone like me who can't sit still.

Gravenhurst is a wonderful town, full of possibility and people who love to get involved. One day when I was visiting Stratford, Ontario, I came across a display of quilts that were being auctioned to raise money to fight breast cancer. I took the idea home, bought fabric, cut up and bagged the pieces with instructions and then looked for sewers. They were easy to find and I ended up working with Carol Black from Trinity to coordinate our community breast cancer quilt. We continued to work together for the next couple of years until the project came to an end at the executive level. Ours were the only true community quilts ever submitted with dozens of Gravenhurst sewers, male and female, participating.



Another coup for Gravenhurst came when I was forwarded what seemed to be a random email from France. It had been written by a woman who was in possession of a WW1 quilt on which was clearly embroidered, "Town of Gravenhurst 1914"! Somehow, it had survived the war and had been kept safe by her great grandmother, grandmother and then her father. It was his deathbed wish that she repatriate it. This was the beginning of an exciting adventure that had me travel to France to meet Nicole and then work with some fabulous people at home to have the quilt preserved and displayed in our Town Offices. I was even interviewed by the CBC and the local Barrie TV station. The story still gives me goosebumps when I think how slim the chances were that we would learn of this quilt's existence. It's truly the proverbial needle in a haystack, (and it's our needle)!

Sometime around 2006 I became the Chair of the Muskoka Concert Association and spent the next several years negotiating with musicians and learning all the ins and outs of organizing concerts, never losing sight of the bottom line and what contributes to or hinders success. It was exciting, exhausting and quite a learning curve. Now, I enjoy putting on concerts at Trinity, a much more relaxed endeavour that also brings new people into our church.

Life is good when it's filled with friends and music. I have found a beautiful circle of great friends here, a true family that greet me with warm smiles every time I see them. And, whether it's in the audience of a concert or seated in the Horn section of a band or singing with the Elderberries or the Church choir, even stumbling over the ukulele strings, music plays in my heart and soul. Lucky me to have found everything good here in Trinity and Gravenhurst!


# **Prayer Requests**

In upcoming events the church will be celebrating National Truth and Reconciliation Day on **Sunday**, **September 28**. Lynda (Partridge) Nicholson will be attending the service as a guest speaker.

Lynda is a member of the Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation. She grew up in the child welfare system and spent her childhood in numerous non-Indigenous foster homes. At a later age she obtained an honours Bachelor of Social Work (Native Human Services), followed by a Masters of Social Work Degree. It was while obtaining her undergraduate degree that she found her birth family and reconnected to her Indigenous culture.

She will be speaking about The Sixties Scoop which saw thousands of Indigenous children taken from their families and placed in non-Indigenous homes, causing lasting impacts on identity and culture. Lynda will share her story and reflections on this important history.
