2025 IN REVIEW MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Anchorage Senior Activity Center had an incredibly positive year in 2025. We are also continuing to drive change across programs and annual celebrations. We received gifts from donors, memberships, community leaders from the Gala fundraiser, and a major endowment gift of over \$500,000.

In 2025, we honored our volunteers, members, and community with a wide variety of programs and social events. We enjoyed Social Hours, a Senior Prom, honored our Veterans with an annual luncheon and celebrated cultural events. We brought back our holiday luncheon and many other programs.

We reported 1,257 members in 2025. Of those there are 486 lifetime members. We continue to expand our reach into the community to increase the membership.

The Rasmuson Foundation honored the Senior Center with a \$50,000 gift, with a portion supporting our Executive Director's three-month Sabbatical to refresh and reflect on what is next for the Senior Center as a self-introspective exercise. After working here for 12 years and overseeing the renovation of the Center, it was a much-appreciated gift for all of us.

We are especially thankful to the Municipality of Anchorage's Health Department for co-hosting the quarterly health fairs. We are already seeing positive results as members and community seniors have benefited from testing and vaccinations.

We continue to host culturally rich events, thanks to our I Am Anchorage Committee, chaired by Elsa Sargento. We enjoy filling the ballroom with dancers and community members who attend in appreciation of the cultural dancers who represent their various countries' traditions through dance, costumes, and food. Our Medicare, Medicaid, and Senior Benefits departments save Alaskan seniors nearly \$266,000 annually in health care costs. We appreciate having trained staff to assist our seniors; their experience and training have a major impact on the lives of many in our community.

We are proud to report that we received a \$239,000 grant from the State of Alaska to support our ongoing

Senior Meal Program, which continues to expand to meet the needs of seniors. Last year, we served more than 22,000 meals. We are grateful to our State Legislators and those of us who went to Juneau to seek support.

Also in 2025, ASAC received a State of Alaska grant of \$98,000 to implement a series of 12 educational safety presentations, including many topics that impact seniors. We enlisted SafeLogic Alaska, a professional team of safety experts, to design the programs and deliver information on a variety of safety topics, ranging from how to prevent slips, trips, and falls to how to respond should there be a volcanic eruption. We also distributed emergency kit backpacks filled to the brim with essentials for home in case of an emergency.

In addition to the Senior Meal Program, we commend our chefs and kitchen staff for their dedication to the Kids Corp meals that we serve daily to preschoolers in the community. We provide about 140 freshly prepared meals daily, along with 240 for preschoolers. The Kids Corp Program is federally funded annually.

Our Fitness Department saves lives annually. Fitness classes have expanded to meet the needs of more members. We have 250 fitness members and offer a wide variety of classes.

The June 2025 Garden Gala, our Eighth Annual event netted \$208,000 for the Anchorage Senior Activity Center. We seated over 300 guests, totaling 36 table sales. During the event, we also received a \$25,000 gift from the family of Rita Sholton, in her memory. She was a dear friend who loved the Center. We also received other major gifts ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in support of ASAC.

I want to thank each of you for your support, and especially our dedicated staff. I'd like to dedicate the year in honor of Celine Kaplan, with the support of Stephanie Rose, for overseeing the Center while I was on sabbatical leave.

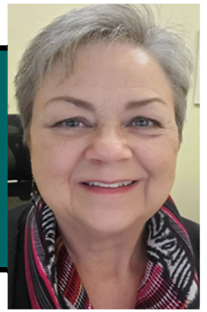

Anchorage Senior Activity Center Annual Report for 2025, prepared by Denise Dent

The Medicare Information Office at the Anchorage Senior Activity Center underwent several changes throughout 2025. One change saw us doing more remote counseling, in addition to in-person, Zoom, and phone counseling. One of our counselors, Denise Dent, is working remotely from Arkansas, but returns several months throughout the year and was here from October 15 to December 7 for the Open Enrollment Period for Part D. Nila Morgan is still working part-time – except during the Open Enrollment Period for Part D, when she worked full-time.

We responded to 859 contacts during 2025.

We helped 129 individuals during the fall Part D Open Enrollment Period, including providing off-site counseling to beneficiaries in Girdwood. These efforts saved Alaskans a total of \$265,933.87.

We presented Medicare Information at several events:

Presented at the bi-weekly social hours.

- Hosted information tables at multiple health fairs.
- Provided a presentation regarding Medicare Part D Open Enrollment for Mountain City Church seniors.
- Provided a presentation regarding Medicare Part D Open Enrollment for Chugach View senior residence.
- Provided a presentation for Mat Valley Credit Union – Medicare Preparation class.

Additionally, we posted 27 Medicare informational & fraud awareness posts on social media.

We continue to maintain our agreement with the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) for assistance with interpreting services.

We provided 12 monthly articles for the ASAC newsletter, the Senior Borealis.

We networked with other agencies & businesses that provide senior services, such as the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC). We participated in the Older Person Action Group (OPAG) monthly breakfasts and “Brown Bag” lunch events. ASAC hosted the OPAG breakfast in July.

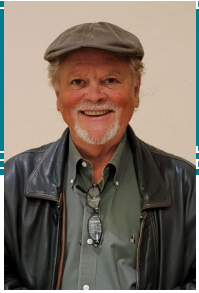
We also participated in community events such as National Consumer Protection Week and National Medicare Fraud Prevention Week.

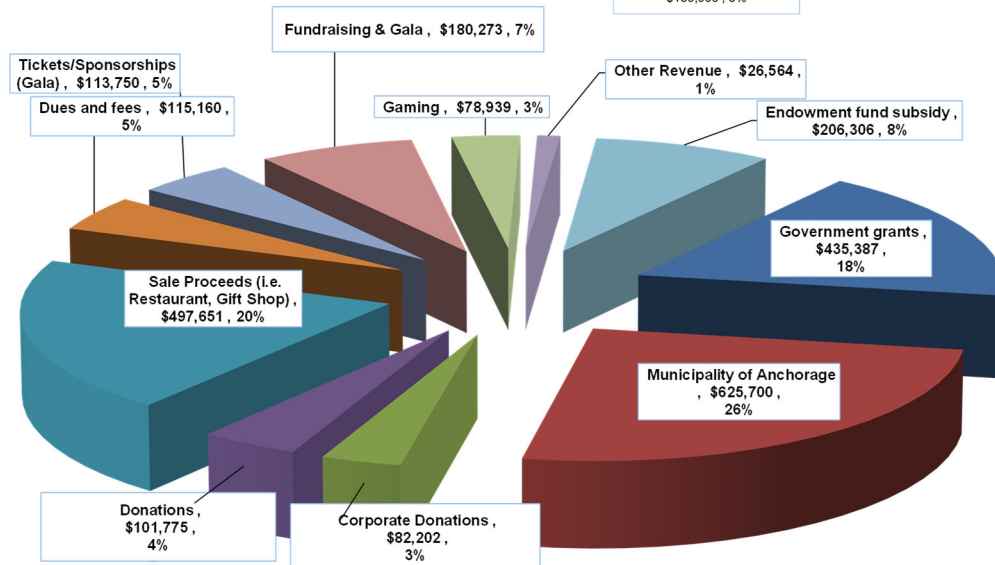

The Fitness Department remained committed to providing accessible, supportive, and engaging wellness opportunities for our members throughout 2025. While the year presented challenges related to staffing for fitness classes and consultations in the Weight Room, participation and engagement continued to reflect the strength and dedication of our fitness community.

Membership remained steady, with the department serving approximately 250 unique members throughout the year. Our membership model continues to prioritize accessibility, with approximately 75–80% of members enrolled at the standard \$40/month rate and 20–25% utilizing the sliding scale rate of \$15/month. This structure ensures that fitness programming remains available to individuals of all income levels and reinforces our commitment to equitable wellness opportunities.

A notable highlight this year was the continued growth in annual fitness memberships, with over 35 members committing to a full year of fitness, in return they receive 2 months free for a full year of fitness. This reflects a strong level of trust in our programming and a willingness among members to invest in their long-term health and wellness. In addition to annual memberships, many participants opted for multi-month payment options, further demonstrating consistency in attendance and engagement.

Our hybrid programming model remained an essential component of accessibility. Zoom pre-

recorded classes continued to provide flexibility for members who prefer to participate from home, while in-person classes fostered connection, accountability, and community engagement within the Center. This dual approach allows us to meet members where they are and support a wide range of needs and abilities.

Programming continued to focus on the core pillars of strength, balance, mobility, and fall prevention, which remain essential to supporting independence and quality of life for our aging population. These foundational elements guide class offerings and ensure that participants receive safe, effective, and purposeful exercise opportunities.

In addition to regular programming, ongoing discussions with the Fitness Committee and planning efforts focused on maximizing the use of our available spaces, including Studio 1, Studio 2, and the Fitness Weight Room. These conversations are helping shape future strategies for expanding programming and increasing overall participation.

Behind the scenes, time and attention were also dedicated to operational and facility-related needs, including ongoing monitoring and advocacy related to fitness spaces. These efforts, while less visible, are critical to maintaining a safe and functional environment for both members and instructors.

The annual Fitness Birthday Fundraiser remained a meaningful highlight of the year, raising over \$3,000 in support of the department. Contributions ranged from small individual gifts to larger donations, including strong participation through online giving platforms. These funds directly support programming, equipment, and continued accessibility for our members.

Overall, 2025 was a year of resilience, adaptability, and continued commitment to our mission. Despite challenges, the Fitness Department maintained strong participation, supported a diverse membership base, and continued to provide valuable wellness opportunities for our community.

As we move into 2026, our focus remains on strengthening instructor recruitment and retention, expanding program offerings, and continuing to evolve in response to the needs of our members. We remain dedicated to fostering a welcoming, inclusive, and effective fitness environment that supports lifelong health and wellness.
