

Protect Yourself—Tips for Immigrants

For foreign-born U.S. citizens and all other immigrants, we recommend:



Gathering and safeguarding documents, including:

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	lave documents that show that you have lived in the US for 2 years. These records could be:
	School records for you or your children
] Pay stubs
	Leases/rental agreements
	Utility bills
	Tax returns (if proper ITIN or Social Security Number used)
	Mail dating back 2 years
2. lo	dentity documents like:
	Birth certificates for all family members
] Passports
	Naturalization certificate
	Certificate of citizenship
	Marriage certificates
	Divorce decrees
	Work permit (Employment Authorization Document)
	I-94 or stamped passport with date of entry
	Approval paperwork for visa, or other temporary stay
Make sure a trusted person who has legal status in the U.S. knows where the important documents are kept.	



If you are a parent of minor children, you should contact your child's:

- 1. **School:** Add a trustworthy family member or friend that has legal status in the U.S. as an emergency contact and pick-up for your child.
- 2. **Doctor:** Check with your child's doctor to see what documents need to be completed in case you are not available and your child needs medical treatment. Add a trusted family member or friend as a person that can bring them to the doctor.



If you are a lawful permanent resident, which means you have a green card:


- Seek legal advice before traveling outside of the U.S.
- Seek legal advice before applying for U.S. citizenship



If you are *not* a lawful permanent resident:

- Seek legal advice from an immigration attorney
- Call our intake line to see if you are eligible, for legal help or pro se (self-help)
 assistance. If you are eligible, our intake will schedule you for an appointment
 at one of our clinics.
- Review Know Your Rights videos or attend a Know Your Rights event sponsored by Advocates for Basic Legal Equality. immigration.ablelaw.org/know-your-rights
