





## GT Crisis Center Offers Help During its First Holiday Season

*Those struggling during the holidays have 24/7 access to mental health resources.*

There is now a new resource for those in Northern Michigan silently struggling with stress, loneliness, or loss this holiday season as the Grand Traverse Mental Health Crisis and Access Center (Crisis Center) welcomes people 24/7.

According to research, 89% of U.S. adults report stress during the holidays, with 41% feeling an increase in stress (American Psychological Association), while 66% of people say they experience sadness or loneliness (National Alliance on Mental Illness).

"Travel, social obligations, finances, and the pressure to create a 'perfect' holiday can create a lot of stress and anxiety for people," said Terri Lacroix Kelty, Munson Healthcare Executive Director of Behavioral Health. "Strained relationships or loss of a loved one are often felt more deeply this time of year which is why we traditionally see an increase in mental health crisis."

Some studies cite this to be even more prevalent in the week following a holiday, indicating a 10-15% increase in behavioral health related Emergency Room visits. Many of the people who may have previously sought care in an ER, can now receive care at the Crisis Center, which is open 24/7 and also includes a Psychiatric Urgent Care open Monday-Friday, 8-5pm.

"We've seen a steady increase in visits since opening 24/7 in July and that trend seems to be rising as the holidays approach," said Micheal

Corby, Crisis Center Behavioral Health Director. "We want to encourage anyone experiencing a mental health crisis to come to The Center so we can either provide care directly or connect them with the level of care they need."

While an Emergency Department is the most appropriate setting if there is an immediate risk to life due to disorientation, aggression, or serious medical concern, The Crisis Center can serve people with acute behavioral health needs that are not immediately life-threatening, which can include:

- Imminent risk of harm to others (e.g., threats with a clear plan and intent).
- Escalating symptoms of depression, anxiety, or mania without immediate danger.
- Suicidal ideation with or without a plan and intent.
- Behavioral changes that are concerning but do not pose an immediate safety risk.
- Need for timely medication adjustments, crisis intervention, or short-term stabilization.

The Crisis Center wants to remind the community that they can help a friend, neighbor, family member, or loved one who may be struggling with their mental health by:

- Reaching Out with Compassion - A simple text, call, or invite can help someone feel less alone.

- Listening Without Judgment - Validate feelings with phrases like "That sounds really hard," or "I'm here for you."
- Offering Practical Help - Help with errands, childcare, or meal prep to reduce stress.
- Encouraging Self-Care - Suggest breaks, exercise, mindfulness, and healthy routines.
- Setting Realistic Expectations - Remind them it's okay if the holidays aren't "perfect."
- Supporting in Seeking Professional Help when symptoms seem severe or persistent.

Dear Mark,

Why are so many slots today being converted to coinless machines? Are you a fan of them? Beth R.

No aficionado in these shoes, Beth. I treasure the clanking sound of coins falling into the tray. I wonder about the rationale behind the switch to coinless machines. Casino operators of my acquaintance have long understood the value of "the sounds of winning," so much so that they install "loud drop bowls," those metal trays that catch the slugs in a payoff and give clangorous voice to someone's good fortune.

The song of these deeper pans implies that people are winning big. Hmm... well, personally, the fun factor of yanking a handle and the happy-finger scooping up of the loot somehow tends to obscure its meagerness. Today, approximately 20% of the 700,000 plus slots in North America are now coinless. Casinos' marketeers claim players want the coinless machines because they are weary of waiting for slot personnel to pay off their jackpots. They also reckon standing in the cashier's line with 30 pounds of winnings in a cup ain't any fun. Yeah, right. ...still, many of us find it downright blissful to have that problem.

In actuality, the backroom guys with the green eyeshades point out that casinos are cashing in big-time on the cashless machines. They reduce the labor bill to repair the jam-ups, fill hoppers, empty the machines of coins and bring them to the count room, and to count the players' winnings at the cashier's cage. In addition to the resultant higher slot machine uptime, these coinless electronic marvels can keep track of how much money is in play at any time.

And feel, like I do, for the cocktail waitress, Beth, exiled to the Nickel Hell section of the casino. Dollars to donuts her tips are down, with no nickels clattering into the tray. Definitely another column for another day.



Dear Mark,

While watching either the World Poker Tour or the World Series of Poker, on the screen they identify each player's chances of winning after they receive their first two cards. Do you know what software they use to figure those percentages out? I figure something like that would help my play. John H.

Specifically, what software do they use...? Haven't a clue. But, John, there is one slick program, Pokalyzer, they could be using, as could anyone with a home PC using Windows, to figure out those same percentages. Pokalyzer allows you to derive the exact odds for any Hold'em situation. You simply input up to 10 players' Hold'em starting hands (optionally, flop and turn cards can also be added), and out come the exact odds for each player. You specify the cards, John, and the Pokalyzer analyzes all possible remaining board card combinations for the true mathematical odds. Also, by using the Heads Up Analysis feature, you can see how any two cards perform against all other two-card combinations.

Other options are the "Hand Hits" analysis, showing which cards make which hands and how often; and the "Pokalyzer Quiz," a randomly generated poker quiz that will continually test your (improving) knowledge. Because it is randomly generated, no two quizzes are ever the same.

"Pokalyzer" retails for \$29.95 and is worth every penny of it. Their website is: <http://www.any2cards.com>. (No, I'm not on their payroll, don't even know anyone there. Maybe I should.)

Hope to see you, John, a cum laude graduate from using this program, at the final table.

## *The 3 Questions to Win at Life*

This is the third and final column of our 3-part series on the questions and answers that inform our lives.

### **The third question is: Where Am I Going?**

Have you ever felt lost or like you just couldn't find your direction? When we lose this guiding force, we suffer from increasing symptoms of anxiety, attention deficit, apathy and even despair. This column is about how we find our direction.

There is no short cut in creating the direction of our lives. I have spoken a lot about being intentional about life, and when it comes to knowing where we are going, we need to be able to hold both reality and imagination in our hands at the same time. The direction of your life is based in hope, but this is not wishful thinking. It takes a strategy.

Many of the most successful people in life practice what is called "future-self theory." They understand that their lives and their mental health improve significantly when they have a clear and grounded vision of who they are

becoming and where they are going. This includes important areas such as physical health, personal/emotional development and relationships. Many of us focus a lot on careers or financial goals, but this is only one part of a whole life.

Successful people also understand that even though they are intentionally creating and designing their future, there is no way from our limited, Earthly perspective to truly be able to predict exactly what the future will hold. People who are winning at life instead emphasize being flexible and being able to course-correct their direction as they go. This grounds them in reality and increases their resilience.

Here are a few practical applications of this process:

1. Ask: "What's one thing my future self will thank me for?"
2. Set micro-goals tied to meaning, not pressure (especially time pressure)
3. Embrace Hope: Think of the future intentionally.

From a mental health perspective, having an intentional direction gives the mind stability. A grounded vision for our life guides us in our choices, relationships and identities, and this is how we win at life.

## *Santa Can Help with Anxiety*

It is so hard when you watch a child struggle with anxiety. As parents and caregivers, you just want to fix it. You want the anxiety to go away. Children with anxiety often have meltdowns for no apparent reason. They have crying fits or anger outbursts and parents are just at a loss as to how to help these children.

How to help a child who struggles with anxiety can be a real struggle for parents. Holidays can make anxiety worse because of change in schedules. As well as having extra things to go and do, and the general busyness of the season.

Things to be aware of for your child who struggles with anxiety. For starters, be aware of their triggers. What triggers their anxiety? Is a certain person or group of people? Be aware of this. Was there a traumatic event that happened around the holidays? Like a death or some sort of abuse. Is it going out in large crowds like a big busy store? Observe your child and their reactions and ask questions. Also, do not dismiss them when they say "nothing" or "I don't know." Just because they do not know does not mean there is not something going on.

Do not pressure your child to hug and kiss everyone they come in contact with. Respect their boundaries. If they do not want to hug or kiss someone then do not pressure them and do not let others pressure them either. Ask if they want to hug or kiss someone. If they say no, then

leave them alone about it.

Now, to help the child with anxiety in your life. Let Santa help! Yes, Santa can help with anxiety. How may you ask?

One of the things that I and many other child therapists suggest for children with anxiety or other emotional issues is making them a "cool down kit."

Well, this is how Santa can help! Santa can bring items for their "cool down kit." These things could be quiet activities that help a child relax and calm themselves. Things that can help your child relax in a few minutes to get their emotions back in check.

### **Ideas for a "cool down kit":**

Puzzles, art supplies, books, music, play dough, a journal, a special stuffed animal, bubble bath, lotion, and other such items. When picking items think about the five senses.

As a parent you can help your child put their kit together after Santa brings these items and help your child learn when to use them. Keep them in a special place so that your child has easy access to them when they need them. For example, next to their bed. Help your child learn to use them when they are having a hard time. The best way to do this is to practice having regular down time or quiet time so they can understand

using these items to help them.

Help your child discover their triggers and recognize their emotions and when they may be heading for a meltdown. Then direct your child to using their kit to help them calm down. With some time and practice it will help your child be able to keep their emotions in check better.

The purpose of a "cool down kit" is to help your child learn how to calm themselves down when they get overly upset and anxious. The kit can also help when a child is just having a bad day all together and just need to relax after a long day.

This can work for all ages of children and teens, just modify it for your child's needs!

Teaching your child self-care and how to control their emotions are some of the best gifts you can give them!

## Giving Gripe

I'm giving you fair warning. This one is a gripe. Recently, we had a specified "Giving Tuesday" that is the centerpiece of my gripe. I lost count of how many emails I received soliciting my donation. And not just soliciting, but in many cases, demanding, and urging me to hurry up. Some were scolding me for being already too close to the deadline. They acted as though I had some obligation in the matter. I didn't and don't have any obligation to give money to any charity whatsoever, unless I have previously agreed to do so.

Email subject lines like "Before 11:59 p.m.!" did not get a favorable response from me. Reflecting on how that experience went down, I find that I am very grumpy at the attitude I discerned coming from those reaching out for contributions. They acted as though they were in charge and I was supposed to spring to attention, salute, and obey them.

Boy, do they have that wrong! A gift is from the generosity of the giver. Those receiving the gift are properly grateful for the gift. It is improper for them to behave as though they were entitled to the gift.

It reminds me of a call I had a few years ago from a student attending a university that I had attended, and that I have made donations to when I am able. We had a lovely chat and I agreed to support the school with a gift of \$50. Then, she told me to be sure to send the money by the deadline date. "Deadline?" I asked. "What deadline is that? Do you mean that if I

don't send the money by then, you don't want it?" Of course, that wasn't what was meant. At issue for her was that the fundraising campaign had an ending date. It was actually her deadline for securing gifts. But, it was said to me in a manner that implied I had a deadline.

Where I am going with this is that many organizations seeking funding seem to have lost their minds and their good manners and are acting as though they are entitled to our generosity, and they get to set the rules about our giving.

Well, no, they are not entitled to our gifts, and they don't get to direct our giving. We get to choose whether we will give, what we will give, when we will give, and to whom we will give.

Not only have the Giving Tuesday folks been rude and demanding. There's another practice that is extremely annoying. Let's say you make a gift to a cause you value and in a few days you receive their response, which is a generic Thank You accompanied by a request for more. That is followed up with many requests from the same organization over the next several weeks or months. Good grief! How much of the gift you gave is being spent on postage rather than on the worthy cause you were trying to support? That's enough to convince some of us to stop donating to such organizations altogether.

Here's one more piece to my gripe. Some years ago, I received a request from a national organization whose cause I found worthy, to just mail solicitation materials to a couple

dozen addresses in my neighborhood. My contribution would be the postage and the actual trip to the Post Office. Yeah, that seemed like something I was willing to do. About a week after I did the mailing, I got a phone call from the organization pressing me to go out into the neighborhood and canvass all the residents to check on whether they had sent in a donation, and to try to collect money from any who had not yet responded. Now, I had not signed up for that and I said as much. The caller then attempted to shame me into doing this extra work and to take responsibility for the money – going so far as to press me to make up for whatever the mailing did not produce. Not a chance! I was pretty angry, and you can believe I have never again been willing to do anything of the sort for any organization, and I have never again donated to that particular organization. I mean – HOW DARE THEY?

It has long been a practice for members of my family to figure out, near the end of the year, what funds are available to donate to charities we consider worthy. Frankly, when those charities come back to us with "reminders" that they are looking for more. Some even go so far as to send what amount to dunning letters "Did you forget your renewal gift?". Whoa!

Again, I say: HOW DARE THEY?

Well, that's what I've been thinking about.

## Citizenship Corner

Answers to last issue's questions

1) What is the oath of office the President must swear or affirm during inauguration?

*A. In the final sentence of Article II, Section 1: I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.*

2) What oath do all federal workers have to take?

*A. I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the \_\_\_\_\_.*

3) What is the oath of enlistment American enlisted military personnel take?

*A. I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; and that I will obey the orders of the President of the United States and the orders of the officers appointed over me, according to regulations and the Uniform Code of Military Justice. So help me God.*

4) Are all legislators and jurists constitutionally bound to an oath of office?

*A. Yes, Article VI, paragraph 3 states: The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.*



let's take a cue from Tom and Sarah, and from the countless others who have shown us that every day is an opportunity to love, to change, to inspire, and to mentor.


