We continue to have a great start to the year. Students have settled into routines and are learning. We currently have 103 students on the roll. Our attendance, though, has been a bit low, at 69.4%. The NT Government has a big focus on school-aged young people being at school, which will help every young person to prepare for a successful adulthood. Our Aboriginal Education Officer (AEO), Cheryle, and Family Engagement Officer FEO), Stephanie, are working hard to support families to send their young person to school. Teachers are also making engaging programs, and students are happy in their classes! When a young person is consistently not coming to school, and teachers are unable to contact parents or carers, and the AEO or FEO are not able to help re-engage the child, then the child is reported to the Inclusion and Engagement Team, which will then become involved with the family.

We welcome Okta, who has commenced working in our front office, and Riley Bennett, who has commenced in a SESO position.

Next Friday, we have our School Council Annual General Meeting (AGM) from 10:00am, followed by an Ordinary Meeting, then a sausage sizzle. We look forward to seeing lots of parents and carers this day!

Educational Adjustment Plan (EAP) meetings have commenced. We really value working in partnership with you, our parents and carers, to design the best plan for each young person. Generally, students have three goals in their EAP. This year, as always, one of those goals will be around communication. Another goal will be in reading: all NT government schools to have a focus on reading this year. The third goal will relate to specific needs and aspirations for each young person. EAPs help shape the learning of each young person throughout the year. Parents and carers are encouraged to invite to these meetings, NDIS Coordinators of Support, speech pathologists, occupational therapists, and anyone else who works with your child. It is a valuable and rare opportunity for all these people to focus on your young person and determine the best EAP for them for the year.

In addition to this newsletter, there is a letter giving information about a group of police trainees and their trainers who will spend $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours at Acacia on 6th March. These trainees are learning how to interview vulnerable people and children. We have twice before had a visit from this group, and it was greatly enjoyed by everyone, students, staff and the trainers.

Dear Parents and Carers

At 8:30-1000am on Thursday 6th March, we will have a visit from 12 police officers and 2 trainers involved in an NT Police Investigative Interviewing Vulnerable Persons course. In this course, participants learn about memory retention and recall, the impact of trauma, legislation for procedures surrounding interviewing children and vulnerable people, questioning styles, cultural considerations, understanding neurodiverse people and how to communicate effectively, information from speech pathologists and protective behaviours.

Participants meet with students from another school in Alice Springs and interview children about a memory event from two weeks earlier, such as losing a toy or pet and finding it, or going on holidays.

Another aspect of the course is to introduce participants to young people from neurodiverse backgrounds. The aim is for all young people to feel safe and report crimes, and for officers to be confident to engage with neurodiverse young people.

At this visit, participants will be asked to build rapport, communicate and learn about the students' favourite activities, classes, sports, toys, etc., while also doing an activity the student has chosen in the playground. This may be as little as showing the participants areas or objects in the playground, playing with items or just sitting side by side. There is no memory event and no pressure towards the students in any way. If students do not want to communicate or to be involved, that is fine.

Acacia has twice before had a visit similar to this. Students really enjoyed the experience, and the officers found it very valuable. We just wished they could visit us more often! If you have any questions about the upcoming visit, please get in touch me on 8955 2222.
