The French-speaking community of NL is:

The history of French-speaking Newfoundlanders and Labradorians is little known, but rich and ancient. It dates back to the time of European exploration of North America and has evolved over the centuries despite many challenges. Here's a glimpse of that history:

The beginnings (16th - 18th centuries)

- Basque, Breton and Norman fishermen: From the 16th century onwards, French fishermen frequented the coasts of Newfoundland, particularly for cod fishing. They came mainly from Brittany, Normandy and the Basque country.
- Limited settlement: Unlike other regions of Atlantic Canada, the French did not establish major permanent settlements in Newfoundland, but did set up seasonal posts, notably on the "French Shore" to the northwest of the island.

Conflicts and treaties (17th-19th centuries)

- Franco-British conflicts: Rivalries between France and England had a direct impact on the French presence in Newfoundland.
- Treaty of Utrecht (1713): This treaty puts an end to the War of Spanish Succession. France cedes Newfoundland to Great Britain, but French fishermen retain certain fishing rights on the French Shore.
- **Treaty of Paris (1763):** Confirms British supremacy. French fishing rights are maintained, but closely monitored.

Francophone presence in the 19th century

- Despite the constraints, a few French-speaking communities sprang up, often the result of interbreeding between French fishermen and local populations, including the Mi'kmaq.
- The most enduring settlement was Cap Saint-Georges, on the Port-au-Port peninsula (western Newfoundland), still one of the province's Frenchspeaking strongholds today.

M Decline and anglicization (20th century)


- The pressure of anglicization, geographic isolation and lack of government support led to a decline in the French language.
- Until the mid-20th century, there were no official French-language schools and few public services in French.
- Francophonie becomes increasingly marginalized.

Cultural and activist renaissance (1970s to present)

- In the 1970s, Francophones begin to assert their linguistic and cultural rights.
- Creation of the Fédération des francophones de Terre-Neuve et du Labrador (FFTNL) in 1973.
- Francophone schools opened, notably in Cap-Saint-Georges, Labrador City, Happy Valley-Goose Bay and Saint-Jean (St. John's).
- French is recognized as a minority language with certain rights.

Francophones today

- The Francophone population is estimated at around 2,000 to 3,000, with around 20,000 people claiming some knowledge of French.
- Main Francophone communities:
 - Péninsule de Port-au-Port and area
 - o Saint-Jean
 - Labrador (Labrador City)
- Despite their small numbers, Francophones have an active community and cultural life (media, festivals, schools, associations).




iof TNL's French-speaking community:

- South Placentia: former French capital from 1662 to 1713: Canada Park - Castle Hill and Colony of Avalon
- Capital St. John's Newfoundland: Colonial Building - multicultural francophone community -Le centre "des Grands Vents" (shows - French classes - French community support services francophone schools) - NL's francophone music scene
- Ouest Conche: French Shore Interpretation
 Center (settlement of whaling families as early as the 16th century)
- Ouest Port-au-Port: bread ovens Acadian families settled here (18th century) - Musicians and storytellers present.
- Labrador Labrador city: presence of families who came from Quebec to work in the mines -Southern Labrador - expedition route 51
