Fr Ben writes...

On September 14th, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Cross a day not merely of remembrance, but of profound proclamation. We do not venerate the wood of the Cross as relic alone, but as the living sign of Christ's victory over sin and death. It is the paradox at the heart of our faith: that suffering becomes glory, and death becomes life.

For those of us who serve as priests in the Society of the Holy Cross (SSC), this feast holds particular resonance. Our name is a daily reminder that our priesthood is shaped by the Cross. We wear the small gold lapel cross inscribed with "In this sign, conquer", not as ornament but as vocation. It is the Cross that calls us, forms us, and sends us.

Founded in 1855 amid the fervour of the Anglo-Catholic revival, the Society was born out of a desire to renew the spiritual life of the clergy and to defend the faith of the Church. The Cross was and remains our rallying point. In our Rule of Life, we are reminded that priestly ministry must be cruciform: marked by sacrifice, humility, and unwavering hope.

On Holy Cross Day, we recall St. Helena's discovery of the True Cross but more than historical memory, this feast is a summons. It invites us to re-centre our lives and ministries around the Cross not as burden, but as blessing. As St Paul writes, "We preach Christ crucified... the power of God and the wisdom of God".

May this feast renew in all of us a deeper commitment to live and serve beneath the shadow of the Cross. For in its sign, we do not merely conquer; we are transformed.

Please pray for your Priests.

Dave Wren's 'Shearing' Raises £1200

St Michael's regular worshipper David Wren kept his word and went ahead with his sponsored 'short back and sides and a clean shave' on 17 August at local barbers Harv's in South Street. He raised an amazing £1200 for three charities from churches in the two parishes.

Dave hadn't cut his hair or beard in five years since the Covid-19 lockdowns in 2020. He grew a ponytail a lot more than a foot long tied by a rubber band. "All the barbers were closed, and I started to think why should I bother to trim my hair since I wasn't going anywhere," Dave said. "Also, I wanted to be the oldest git in Lancing to have a ponytail."

The man with the shears was proprietor Harvey Baker, 80, who has been a barber in the village for nearly 40 years. He started with Dave's ponytail, cutting it off with a few snips. And he then gave Dave a 'number 2' cut leaving a mere quarter of an inch (6mm) of hair on the head. It's just possible David is now the oldest man in Lancing with a fashionable buzz cut.

Asked how he felt after the shearing, David said: "Well, I can feel a draught on my head." Any regrets? "No! I wanted to help three charities I believe in. And once I committed to the cut and shaving, I was going to do it. At it says in St James, 'Faith without deeds is dead'."

The three charities that stand to receive a £400 donation each are: The Children's Society (which fights for kids' rights among other things); Turning Tides (which provides homeless services for adults in West Sussex; and DePaul UK (a charity for the homeless).

Dave has attended St Michael's for the past 32 years. He said: "My eight-month-old granddaughter was always frightened by the sight of me with my hair and beard. Now I think she'll be a lot happier next I see her!"

And what of the detached ponytail? Harvey gave Dave a 'doggy-bag' for that. Precisely what Dave will do with it remains uncertain. He may donate or sell it to a human hair extensions company. Well done, Dave!

St Mary's Patronal Evensong Ame Gisby

It was a glorious evening on Sunday 17 August for the evensong, in celebration of St Mary's Patronal Festival. There was a good attendance and the congregation was entranced by the choir's beautiful harmonies. The choir was in the south transept and unseen from the nave, but the church was full of beautiful voices echoing throughout the whole church. It was prayer in song that seemed to rise to heaven and was truly amazing.

The guest preacher was The Rt Revd Nicholas Reade, retired Bishop of Blackburn, who in earlier years had been the Archdeacon of Lewes and Hastings, but had never been to St Mary's before. He was most complimentary about the choir and thought it was one of the best Evensongs he'd experienced and would definitely visit the church again. Thanks must go to Aedan for his musical direction and expertise.

After the Evensong everyone headed down, through the graveyard, to the field below to watch the Sompting Village Morris men and women perform their traditional dances in the evening sunshine. The Sompting Village Morris had an infinity with St Mary's as the church was depicted on their SVM badge. There was also free beer, wine and soft drinks for everyone sponsored by Titch Hill Winery and ably served by Katie and Becca. A lovely way to splendid a summer's evening.

Blue plaque for Sompting resident

A computer pioneer and former Sompting resident who helped shape the future of technology has been honoured with a blue plaque.

Beryl May Dent was born on 10 May 1900 in Chippenham, Wiltshire. Following her education at Warminster County School where her father was Headteacher, Beryl had a spell of employment at the Royal Aircraft Establishment in Hampshire in 1918 before she moved on to study at the University of Bristol, initially taking a BA and then an Honours course, gaining a BSc in Applied Mathematics with First Class Honours in 1923. She studied alongside only one other student, future Nobel prize winner Paul Dirac.

After a year studying at Newnham College, Cambridge, she returned to Bristol and gained another MSc in 1927 for her work on crystal structure. Although women specialising in Mathematics in the 1920s faced limited job prospects, Beryl earned a Research Assistant role at the University of Bristol, eventually publishing six papers. In 1929 that Beryl moved to Manchester to fulfil the position of Technical Librarian within the Scientific Research Department at Metropolitan-Vickers in Trafford Park. This new scientific career required a high level of technical skill, and Beryl reported in 1933 that the Library held nearly 6000 engineering volumes, pamphlets and patent specifications.

Beryl became very active in the newly founded Association of Special Libraries and Information Bureaux (ASLIB), developing

networks with other specialised Librarians, serving on Committees and making conference presentations. Alongside this full-time job, Beryl continued to publish papers, including her 1935 paper on solving points in a linear equation. Because of her advanced knowledge of higher mathematics, she was also asked to check the mathematics in papers for publication by engineers at Metropolitan-Vickers. In 1946 Metropolitan-Vickers created a new computational section and Beryl earned a promotion to be its section leader. She also joined the Women's Engineering Society and published papers on the application of digital computers to electrical design.

Beryl's work in this field accelerated and she wrote programmes with Brian Birtwhistle for the Ferranti Mark 1 computer at the University of Manchester. This was the world's first commercially available general-purpose computer. Beryl continued to publish papers throughout the 1950s furthering her pioneering work in computer application design. She retired from Metropolitan-Vickers in 1960.

Beyond her work, Beryl was school manager at St Matthew's Church of England Primary School, Stretford between 1956 and 1962. In 1962, Beryl moved with her mother and sister to 1 Cokeham Road, Sompting. She was an active member of the church community serving as Electoral Roll Officer and Treasurer of Lancing and Sompting Churches Fraternal.

Beryl died on 9 August 1977 and her ashes were interred at Worthing Crematorium. A commemorative brass plaque in memory of Beryl sits on the Bishop's Chair in St Mary's.

The blue plaque, located at St Antony's Heritage Centre, Trafford Park. Manchester close to where the Metropolitan-Vickers factory stood, commemorates the pioneering and accomplished work Beryl achieved over her long career. Through her ground breaking and dedicated study of quantum theory physics and computer design, Beryl furthered work in this field and paved the way for female scientists of the future.
