Fr Ben writes...

By the time you read this, Christmas will already no doubt feel like a distant memory, Epiphany will be drawing to a close, and the Church will be quietly, steering us towards Lent. Like it or not, the desert looms.

Lent has a rather unfair reputation. For some it conjures images of grim faces, joyless self-denial, and the sort of resolutions that are abandoned by the Second Sunday. But Lent, at its heart, is not about spiritual misery. It is about honesty, attentiveness, and re-centring our lives on Jesus – and that, while demanding, is ultimately life-giving.

Traditionally, we think of Lent in terms of giving something up. There is real value in that, especially if what we forego genuinely matters to us and serves a spiritual purpose. Going without something we enjoy can sharpen our awareness of Christ's forty days in the wilderness, his temptations, his vulnerability, and his trust in the Father. Lent also invites us to do something extra. This is often where the deepest growth happens. Perhaps this might be attending a weekday Mass – allowing the rhythm of prayer and Scripture to shape the week. You might consider joining the Lent Course, or coming along to the Stations of the Cross, where we walk prayerfully with Christ through the final hours of his earthly life.

Lent is also a fitting time to think about the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). For most this will be daunting. If you have never made a confession before – Lent offers a gentle invitation to find out more. It is not a test to be passed, but a gift to be received.

Whatever shape your Lent takes, I encourage you to set aside some dedicated time each day for prayer using Lenten themes, Scripture, or a simple prayer of quiet attentiveness. Consistency over quantity.

Above all, Lent prepares us to relive, in heart and mind, the saving events of Holy Week, not as distant history, but as something that still speaks powerfully into our own lives and our world today. If we allow ourselves to engage deeply with Christ's passion, then our Easter joy will not be forced or superficial, but genuine and hard-won.

Let us encourage one another to keep a good Lent – faithful rather than flashy, honest rather than heroic – trusting that God will do far more with our small offerings than we could ever imagine.

Looking towards Lent

We're not far away from the beginning of Lent. This is a key part of the churches year, with a focus on sin, forgiveness, prayerfulness, preparation, self-denial, and giving (either financially or of your time). Yet, in many ways, it can be a very joyful time of year too.

We start on 18 February with Ash Wednesday as we reminded to 'repent and believe in the Gospel', the ashes being a reminder both of our sin, but also that we will die one day: 'from dust we came and to dust we shall return'. The service is sombre, but also peaceful and reflective. Our Ash Wednesday services will be 11 am at St James' and 7.30pm at St Michael's

Each Friday evening during Lent there are Stations of the Cross at 7.30pm. A short yet powerful service, which takes us through Jesus' journey to the cross. Each week there will be a different set of reflections, poems or meditations used. Our Lent lunches start on Thursday 19 February in St Michael's Hall, and provide a simple lunch of soup, bread and cheese, with a chance to donate to this year's charity: Mothers' Union. This will be every Thursday in Lent, and we'll do the Lent course during the lunch at 12.30. This year begins a series looking at each of the Gospels over the next four years, starting with Matthew. We'll take in Jesus' birth, his calling of disciples, his authority as a teacher, his miracles, and his upcoming passion.

The hope is that through participation in our Lenten services, lunches and course, each and every one of us will engage fully in

the season. Our services will lead us into deeper prayer and preparation; our lunches encourage self-denial and giving; our Lent Course allows us to get back to the basics of the faith and remind us of what's important. Please do join us during this important time in the Church's year.

World Day of Prayer

On the first Friday in March the Day of Prayer begins on the international dateline, in Samoa. Early in the morning, Christian women begin praying for our world. As the earth rotates, a great wave of prayer begins to build. It sweeps across the Pacific, touching Fiji and New Zealand, rolling on through Asia: Japan, the Philippines, Korea, and Bangladesh. The countries of Africa, and the Middle East are next. The wave reaches the shores of Europe as the day dawns there. Across the Atlantic, it moves onwards, the Caribbean, the Americas, and on to the Pacific again until the sun finally sets over American Samoa where the final service takes place. A worldwide circle of prayer is complete.

This year St Michael and All Angels will host the World Day of Prayer service for Lancing and Sompting on Friday 6 March at 10.30 am, prepared by an ecumenical group of Christian women from Nigeria. The service they have prepared reflects on the theme, "I will give you rest."

The World Day of Prayer is an international, women-led, ecumenical movement that shares the hopes, concerns, and prayers of women from around the globe. Each year, women from a different country craft a service, sharing their unique spiritual journey and culture. For 2026, the women of Nigeria have created a service that speaks to our need for peace and solace, drawing on their faith and experiences in a world filled with struggles and anxieties. The service shares the stories of four Nigerian women who inspire us to work towards a world without injustice, insecurity, marginalisation, religious persecution, poverty and despair.

We give thanks to the Christian women of Nigeria for this service and pray that their stories will encourage and inspire women through the world to unite as one people in both prayer and praise.
