First, I would like to thank the Green Township community for allowing me to serve as your Trustee in this thriving community.

I am excited to share the latest updates on projects and developments across Green Township. From new businesses to infrastructure improvements and expanded parks and trails, this year we saw strategic growth, investment, and community-focused planning.

The township is actively enhancing pedestrian infrastructure to improve the safety and quality of life in our community. New sidewalks were completed on Blue Rock Road, North Bend Road, and Colerain Avenue. This will allow pedestrian connectivity of neighborhoods and public spaces within our community. It is noteworthy that all of these projects were built either entirely or partially with grant funds.

Green Township welcomed several new and renovated businesses. The Kroger Marketplace in Dent celebrated a grand reopening with a significant investment of millions of dollars in its Harrison Avenue facility. Stumps Lanes and Cinful Eats celebrated the ribbon-cutting ceremony for their expanded facility. It features an expanded restaurant bar, outdoor seating, entertainment, and games. This year will unveil the opening of Legacy Living, a new senior living development scheduled to open in Summer 2025, offering high-quality residential care, independent living, and memory care. Additionally, the long-awaited Cooper's Hawk Winery and restaurant is set to open this year. The new 10,000 square foot Cooper's Hawk Winery and Restaurant is designed as an upscale casual venue, offering a full-service bar, private dining spaces, and a wine-tasting room in the style of Napa Valley.

Green Township remains a sought-after community to reside in southwest Ohio, thanks to its premier parks, excellent safety services, and proximity to local and regional attractions. One of our more notable developments is Trailside Village, a unique conservation-focused neighborhood featuring walking trails, a natural timber playground, and over 55 acres of protected green space—ideal for families and nature lovers alike. This year, the walking trail was extended by almost half a mile along the green space and park area. Trailside Village welcomed its

first residents in 2025 and allows diverse housing choices for all ages.

Green Township is renowned for its first-class parks, scenic walking trails, and exciting special events. This year, we will finalize the multi-year upgrade of Kuliga Park, which will include the construction of a new playground and a one-mile nature trail. This nearly half-million-dollar upgrade will be paid entirely through grant monies from the State of Ohio.

As the Green Township Trustees have said many times, Green Township's number one priority is the safety of our residents. The Green Township Police recently relocated to the new Green Township Police Headquarters, located at 6200 Harrison Avenue. The new facility aligns with modern security benchmarks and incorporates essential safety features to support officers and help recruit future law enforcement personnel. In addition, Green Township deployed its full complement of FLOCK cameras in 2025. The FLOCK cameras provide quick, automated alerts for wanted license plates, notifying law enforcement if there's a match to active alerts and flagged vehicles acting as "virtual patrol officers," aiding in the identification of Amber Alerts, outstanding warrants, suspects, or stolen vehicles.

The completion of the new facility and rollout of the FLOCK camera system mark a significant milestone in the township's mission to adapt to the evolving demands of 21st-century policing.

Green Township consistently ranks among the safest communities in the region, with crime rates significantly below state and national averages. Our active police and fire departments, along with robust community engagement programs, help sustain our long-standing tradition of excellence in public safety.

Green Township is more than just a place on the map—it's a place to grow, thrive, and feel at home. Whether you're just discovering our corner of Hamilton County or have lived here for generations, we welcome you to enjoy everything our community has to offer.

NEW ERA FOR SAFETY: POLICE DEPARTMENT HAS NEW HOME

Your Green Township Police Department officially moved into our new facility at 6200 Harrison Avenue in June.

This modern building was designed to better serve our community. It has updated workspaces for officers and staff, improved technology, and enhanced safety features. The building has a new lab for evidence processing and a safe room for individuals who need a secure place to go while waiting for a police officer.



Most importantly, the new facility allows us to continue delivering professional, responsive, and community-focused service to you.

The building will allow us to continue to meet the rapidly changing public safety challenges for the next 50 years. Thank you for your continued support as we begin this new chapter in serving our township.

In April, township officials and members of the police department were joined by nearly 100 residents to officially dedicate the new



police headquarters. Attendees heard an inspiring message from Trustee Chairman Triffon Callos who noted that the dedication of the station was a capstone in the Township's efforts to modernize our police operations.

Special features of the station include its central location. Special thanks to our design and construction team who worked closely with Lowes and neighborhood residents to ensure construction impacts were minimized.

HOW TO AVOID THESE COMMON AND COSTLY SCAMS

Green Township is fortunate to be a safe and vibrant community. However, like many areas across the country, we are not immune to scams that target honest people. Criminals look for ways to trick victims into giving away their money or personal information. Staying alert is your best defense.

Here are some common scams we've seen and how you can protect yourself:

1. Phone and Email Scams

Scammers may call or email pretending to be from the IRS, a utility company, or even law enforcement. They often use threats, such as arrest or service disconnection, to pressure you into paying immediately. Remember: legitimate agencies will never demand payment over the phone or through gift cards.

2. Online Marketplace Scams

Be cautious when buying or selling items online. If a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Always meet in a safe, public place.

3. Romance Scams

Some scammers prey on people's emotions. They build trust

through online relationships and then ask for money, often with urgent stories about medical emergencies or travel problems. Be wary of anyone you've never met in person asking for financial help.

4. Tech Support Scams

A pop-up on your computer or a phone call claiming your device has a virus is almost always fraudulent. Do not give strangers remote access to your computer or banking information.

How You Can Stay Safe

- Never share personal or financial information over the phone or online unless you are certain of who you are dealing with.
- Take your time—scammers rely on urgency to push people into bad decisions.
- Verify suspicious requests by contacting the company or agency directly through a trusted phone number or website.

IMPORTANT FIRE, EMS UPDATES

Learn CPR, save a life!

Thanks to our residents who have learned Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and how to use Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs), lives are being saved.

Survival starts with you, our residents. For the four minutes on average that it takes our paramedics to arrive, a stopped heart that isn't receiving CPR loses critical opportunities to restart. In 2024, Green Township cardiac arrest patients who received early CPR, and ultimately advanced life support interventions by our paramedics, saw 63% of them having their heartbeat being restored. In 2015, that value was 32%.

Multiple factors play a role in this jump in successful outcomes:

- 1. Early bystander CPR
- 2. Technology has improved. Each of our five ambulances has a Lucas device which does perfect, uninterrupted CPR. The piston-driven mechanism compresses the patient's chest at the perfect rate and depth.
- Education has also seen critical advancements.
 Today, our paramedics can

call a receiving hospital to ask that their cardiac catheterization team be activated. This level of trust that doctors and hospital administrators have placed in our paramedics is saving lives. Once the patient's heartbeat is restored, often a blocked cardiac

artery is opened in the cardiac catheterization lab.

4. AEDs in public places is a huge advancement. Look for them soon in Green Township parks. They allow for early intervention.


Emergency Calls on the Rise

In a typical 24-hour shift our crews receive 26 emergency calls. They range from:

• Person fell, suffers little or no injuries, and reports they only need help up from the floor. We send two responders in an ambulance.

- Person has chest pains. We send the 3-person fire truck to assist the ambulance crew.
- Building fire. Most of our 22 on-duty personnel respond.

We appreciate your support in keeping our staffing levels sufficient. This allows us to independently staff both the fire truck and the ambulance in all four of our firehouses. Providing this high caliber service has resulted in our receiving the Mission Lifeline EMS Gold Award from the American Heart Association for the 10th consecutive year.



New Equipment

In 2026 we look forward to a new ambulance at the Covedale firehouse, a new pumper at the Mack firehouse, and a new ladder truck at the Dent firehouse. These will replace a 2012 ambulance, a 2003 pumper, and a 2014 ladder truck, all at zero cost to our residents thanks to Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds.

Additional Maintenance & Services

Daylight savings time ends on Sunday, Nov. 2. Changing your clocks in fall and spring is a great time to also change the batteries in your smoke detectors, and to be sure your carbon monoxide detector is working properly. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas that sees higher concentrations in malfunctioning gas appliances such as furnaces or hot water heaters. If the need exists, we are happy to send a crew member to your home to assist you in a safe battery change, or to confirm proper operation of the detector.

WHAT IS A JEDD?

A Joint Economic Development District (JEDD) is a special-purpose district that is created by a contract between a combination of a municipal corporation and a Township. The JEDDs in Green Township are in cooperation with the City of Cheviot. JEDDs allow for the levying of a district-wide income tax in the JEDD district. JEDDs can help pay for certain services — police, fire, maintenance, etc. — by imposing an income tax on non-residential property owners within the JEDD district. The terms of the JEDDs vary but basically calls for a 90/10 or 80/20 split between Green Township and the City of Cheviot.

A Joint Economic Development District (JEDD) is a powerful tool because it generates revenue to pay for the costs of infrastructure improvements and services by Green Township.

Currently, seven JEDDs have been created within Green Township. The JEDDs are Tri Health/Western Ridge Complex (Good Samaritan), Christ/Children's Hospital Office Complex, Mercy Hospital West, Harrison Greene on Harrison Ave, UDF on North Bend Rd, McAlister's on Harrison Ave., and the Hampton Inn on Harrison Ave. An eighth District will commence on January 1st of next year at the new Cooper's Hawk Restaurant site.

The funds received by these JEDDs will be substantial over their

AN UPDATE FROM YOUR PUBLIC SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Your Public Services Department is responsible for maintaining 524 residential streets, totaling 117 centerline miles. Every year we have streets that undergo rehabilitation. In 2025 the following streets were slated for rehab at a total cost of \$1,566,812. Together they add up to 2.709 lane miles:

- Blue Pine Drive
- Bridge Point Pass
- Cherrybend Drive
- Iron Bridge Way
- Tressel Wood Drive
- Valleyway Court
- Bicentennial Park Hike/Bike Trail

As with all road construction projects there will be some inconvenience and shorts delays but with your patience and understanding, we can keep these to a minimum and keep everyone safe. Thank you for driving SLOWLY and SAFELY through all construction zones.

Nuisances and PMCs

The Public Services Department is responsible for reducing nuisance properties and Property Maintenance Code (PMC) violations in Green Township.

Nuisance issues typically are high grass and weeds, garbage, junk, debris, and yard waste. Property maintenance violations generally refer to building conditions like missing shutters, paint, roof, doors, and windows, as well as fencing, sheds, and other accessory structures. While most nuisances are addressed by the home or property owner, sometimes the Township will arrange for the issue to be corrected with the cost assessed to the property owner. Residents with PMCs either receive a citation or, as a last resort, are referred to Hamilton County Housing Court. The majority are addressed by the property owners prior to any penalty.

2025 Projects

North Bend Road Improvements

We worked with Hamilton County Engineers to make improvements to North Bend Road:

- Turn lanes added at the intersections of North Bend and Reemelin and at Diehl Roads
- Paving and the installation of sidewalks along North Bend from Westwood Northern Boulevard to Kleeman Road.

A SORTA Grant provided partial funding for this project.

Blue Rock Road Sidewalks

Our commitment to safe access to parks, schools, and businesses led to sidewalks installed on Blue Rock from Seiler Drive to 2810 Blue Rock. Doing so connected the neighborhoods of Seiler and Wheatcroft Drives to Blue Rock Park and Colerain Avenue. A SORTA Grant provided partial funding for this project.

Coming in 2026

In cooperation with ODOT and Hamilton County Engineers, we're in the planning/development stage to improve two intersections in 2026.

- The addition of a right turn lane from Westbourne Drive west onto Werk Road. This will help alleviate the stacking of cars on Westbourne Drive for southbound motorists.
- Construction of a roundabout to promote the continuous flow of traffic through Hutchinson and Ebenezer Roads.

Up to 70% of the cost for these projects will come from OKI/ Federal Grant monies.
