he first Easter must have been confusing to the Apostles.



TO WALK AS ONE

After all the reflection, preparation, and prayer, Easter is finally here! We revel in the glory of the day, the promise of new life and the joy of victory! Each year this day renews the whole church, giving us a new sense of purpose and direction. Lent has strengthened our intentions and our goal was made clear by our prayers. Let the holy anthem rise!

Your mind may be playing tricks, but this is not one of them! Many years ago, it was the custom to hide the paschal candle after Ascension Day. That was often explained as a sign that Jesus had ascended to the Father and thus the time of remembering his postresurrection life had ended. Easter plodded on, though, for ten more days until Pentecost. Normally, in those days, the candle was moved to a hidden location, often the sacristy, near the small baptismal font. With the reform of the liturgy and the calender in the 1960's, however, that changed. Today, the Paschal Candle, symbol of Christ's light and life, stays in the main worship area throughout the whole Easter season. Then, it is

moved from the main body of the Church, situated near the font if possible. Increasingly, since baptismal fonts are now visible and prominent, always accessible, the candle too is far from hidden. In the middle ages, the candle in large cathedrals was truly stupendous in size as towns tried to outdo each other in the brightness of Christ's light. The candle at Salisbury Cathedral is said to have been thirtysix feet tall! Today, liturgical directives suggest that parishes have the most worthy candle they can afford (some people actually melt down candles to make their own), and although some companies provide a spring-loaded candle tube, an authentic candle is clearly preferred.

With the vision and practice of faith, we will know the power of God that one day will raise us up.



In previous Bulletins I have mentioned that Our Lady of Hope Parish in Ipswich will enter into Collaboration with Saint Paul Parish in Hamilton/ Wenham. This Collaboration

will take effect on June 1, 2023.

As of this date, there will be One Pastor for two Parishes. This means that there will be only One active, full time Priest for the two Parishes. There may be a retired Priest to be of assistance, but he will not be considered full time. Thus, all future scheduling of Masses and other events will be determined based on One active Priest for both Parishes. All changes will be determined by the New Pastor and the Parish Staffs and Councils.

Who the New Pastor will be, I do not know. Cardinal Sean is the one who appoints new Pastors. When I am informed, you will be informed.

In preparation for the Collaborative and new Pastor, I have resigned as Pastor, as requested by the Cardinal, as of June 1, 2023. I have also asked the Cardinal to allow me to retire as of June 1st. Where I will go is still to be determined.

As we get closer to June 1st I will keep you informed of the future.

What Is Easter?



he Easter Vigil is the "Moth er of All Vigils." Easter Sun day, then, is the greatest of all Sundays, and Easter Time is the most important of all liturgica times. Easter is the celebration of the Lord's Resurrection from the the Lord's Resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascen-sion to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday of Easter to Pen-tecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death, expressed most fully in the great resound-ing cry of the Christian, Alleluial All faith flows from faith in the Resurrection: "It Christ has not been raised, then empty [too] is our preaching: empty, too, is your our preaching; empty, too, is your faith" (1 Cor 15:14).

"What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind: perhaps, or of some other kind; ... So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised pow-erful. It is sown a natural body; it "Easter is the celebration of the Lord's Resurrection from the dead, culminating his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church."






