This Sunday's Reading

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 37: 12-14

God will open the graves and restore the people of Israel.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 130: 1-8 With the Lord is forgiveness and mercy.

SECOND READING: Romans 8: 8-11 The Spirit of God dwells in you. GOSPEL READING: John 11: 1-45 Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead.

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING: Our Gospel on this day, the fifth Sunday of Lent, is again taken from the Gospel according to John. The reading from John continues the break from Cycle A's focus on the Gospel of Matthew. Today's Gospel reading recounts another sign, or miracle, found in John's Gospel, the raising of Lazarus. As our catechumens move closer to the celebration of their Baptisms at the Triduum, today's reading invites us to reflect upon what it means to call Jesus the Resurrection and the life.

The context for the story of the raising of Lazarus is the Jewish leaders' growing animosity toward Jesus. Jesus has been in Jerusalem, taking part in the feast of the Dedication which we have come to know as Hanukkah. The people have been pressing him to declare plainly whether he is the Messiah. Jesus tells them to look to his works, which testify to his coming from God. Many do not believe Jesus, however, and some try to stone him for blasphemy. Into this scene of confrontation, Mary and Martha, the sisters of Lazarus, send word to Jesus that his friend is ill. Jesus is said to love Mary, Martha, and Lazarus, but he delays his journey for two days. The delay heightens the drama and shows Jesus' obedience to God, who is to be glorified through Lazarus's resurrection. When Jesus finally declares that he will journey to Bethany, his disciples fear for his life. Thomas declares that he and the other disciples should prepare to die with Jesus.

The scene described at Bethany is a sad one. Martha meets Jesus weeping and saying that if Jesus had been there, Lazarus would not have died. Yet she remains confident

that God will do whatever Jesus asks. Martha affirms her belief that there will be a resurrection of the dead in the last days. Then Martha's sister, Mary, comes to Jesus with the same confidence, saying that Jesus could have cured Lazarus. Jesus asks to be brought to Lazarus's tomb where he prays and calls Lazarus out from the tomb.

At this sign, many come to believe in Jesus, but others take word of the miracle to the Jewish authorities, who begin their plans for Jesus' death.

Set against the backdrop of Jesus' impending death, many elements of the raising of Lazarus foreshadow the good news of Jesus' own Resurrection. Jesus, facing the conflict with the Jewish authorities, acts in complete obedience to God. In raising Lazarus, Jesus shows his power over death so that when Jesus dies, those who believe in him might remember that and take hope. Just as Jesus calls for the stone to be rolled away from Lazarus's tomb, so too will the disciples find the stone rolled away from Jesus' tomb.

With our catechumens preparing for their Baptism at Easter, the Gospel today calls us to reflect on Baptism as a dying and rising with Jesus. In Baptism we die to sin's power over us, rising as children of God. In Baptism we join ourselves with Christ, who conquered death once and for all so that we who believe in him may have eternal life. With Martha and Mary, we are called to profess our belief that Jesus is indeed the Resurrection and the life.

Lent is the time for saying <u>No</u>. <u>No</u> to the spiritual asphyxia born of the pollution caused by indifference, by thinking that other people's lives are not my concern, and by every attempt to trivialize life, especially the lives of those whose flesh is burdened by so much superficiality.

Lent means saying \underline{No} to the toxic pollution of empty and meaningless words, of harsh and hasty criticism, of simplistic analyses that fail to grasp the complexity of problems, especially the problems of those who suffer the most.

Lent is the time to say <u>No</u> to the asphyxia of a prayer that soothes our conscience, of an almsgiving that leaves us self-satisfied, of a fasting that makes us feel good.

Lent is the time to say <u>No</u> to the asphyxia born of relationships that exclude, that try to find God while avoiding the wounds of Christ present in the wounds of his brothers and sisters: in a word, all those forms of spirituality that reduce the faith to a ghetto culture, a culture of exclusion.

Love and Piety Marked Fr. Robert Sullivan's Life

Remembered by his Jesuit brothers for his simple piety, his funeral Mass was held at St. Ignatius Hall at Garden Villas North in Florissant, on Saturday, March 18. Burial will follow at 9:30am on Monday, March 20, 2023, in Calvary Cemetery, St. Louis.

Robert L. Sullivan was born in Denver on November 1, 1936, to Louis and Mary Harrington Sullivan. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his sister Sr. Ann Sullivan, S.L. He is survived by several second cousins and his brothers in the Society of Jesus.

After graduating from Regis High School in Denver, he entered the Jesuit novitiate in Florissant, Missouri, on August 8, 1954, and pronounced first vows on August 15, 1956. After two years of Juniorate studies, he

earned a bachelor's degree and a Master of Philosophy degree at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Alabama.

He was ordained to the priesthood on May 27, 1967, at Immaculate Conception Cathedral in Denver and received a Licentiate in Sacred Theology from Saint Louis University shortly after.

Father Sullivan received his first apostolic assignment in 1962, teaching

Latin and typing, while coaching swimming and golf at St. Louis University High School.

Father Sullivan served in a pastoral ministry in Honduras from 1968 to 1982. "Padre Roberto," as the people called him, was known for his love for the people he served. His years as a missionary in Honduras shaped the remainder of his Jesuit life.


After returning to the United States, he was missioned to St. Francis Xavier Parish in Kansas City, Mo., as associate pastor for the spring of 1983, and then to Mt. Carmel Parish in Pueblo, Colorado, as pastor from 1983 to 1987.

From 1987 to 1997, Fr. Sullivan served as the pastoral assistant to the provincial for the former Missouri Province. After a brief sabbatical, he served as pastor of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Colorado Springs, Colo., until 2004.

For a few months, Fr. Sullivan was a parochial vicar at St. Mary's Cathedral and a hospital chaplain at St. Francis Hospital, both in Colorado Springs. He gave up chaplaincy in 2004 and remained a pastoral minister at the Cathedral until 2008.

SHARING SUCCESS

Most people in Turkana, Kenya, raise livestock, and a few are farmers. But the hot and dry climate makes this work difficult—and climate



change is making it even harder. Rebecca and Lotiang participated in a Catholic Relief Services program that installed a water well and taught them new farming techniques. They can support their family with their crops and are teaching others in their community what they learned. How can you use your skills and knowledge to help others?

He returned to education in 2008, serving in campus ministry at Regis Jesuit High School in Aurora, Colo., for eight years.

His final pastoral assignment was at Immaculate Conception Parish in Albuquerque, where he served from 2016 to 2021.

Father Sullivan moved to the

Jesuit Hall Community in Saint Louis, where he began a ministry of prayer for the Church and the Society of Jesus, often spending hours in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

We remember with gratitude all that God has done through Fr. Sullivan's life of service to God and God's people.

To Sexual Abuse Claimants within the Archdiocese of Santa Fe,

With this open letter, I wish to express my profound regret and sorrow over the tragic and inexcusable harm done to you by clergy sexual abuse. As Archbishop of Santa Fe, I apologize to each of you and to all those who have been harmed by sexual abuse perpetrated by Roman Catholic Clergy in this archdiocese. The Archdiocese takes responsibility for the abuse. I am ashamed of what happened to you and even more so that it happened within the auspices of the Catholic Church. There are no words that can convey how sorry I am and how committed this archdiocese is to keep children and young people safe.

I also wish to affirm that none of you are to blame for the abuse perpetrated upon you. Sadly, it is not unusual for those victimized by clergy sexual abuse to carry guilt for the abuse they received. This guilt is often encouraged by the perpetrator and is entirely unfounded. You were completely innocent and did nothing to deserve, encourage or sustain the hideous crime of sexual abuse of a minor.

It is my fervent hope that the Chapter 11 process that is concluding now will bring you all some measure of justice. I pray that this moment will be yet another step in the healing process and that you will find the peace and well-being that is your God-given right.
