First Reading; Zephaniah 2:3, 3:12-13

Gospel Reading; Matthew 5:1-12a

Jesus teaches what it means to be happy.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's reading is the beginning of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, which is found in Matthew's Gospel. The form of the Beatitudes found here is not unique to Jesus. Beatitudes are found in the Old Testament, in the psalms, and in wisdom literature, for example. They are a way to teach about who will find favor with God.

We quickly note in this reading that the people whom Jesus calls "blessed" and "happy" are not people we think of as blessed or happy... the poor in spirit, the meek, the persecuted. This Gospel is one of reversals. Jesus' blueprint for happiness reflects little of what the world might call happiness.

"Blessed" is sometimes translated as *happy*, *fortunate*, or *favored*. In other words, Jesus is saying that divine favor is upon those who are poor, those who mourn, those who are persecuted. This news might have been welcome—and surprising—to the crowds who heard Jesus that day.

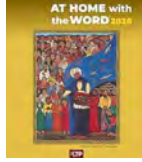
The Beatitudes can be understood as a framework for Christian living. Our vocation as Christians is not to be first in this world, but rather to be first in the eyes of God. By referring to the good things that the faithful will experience, Matthew reminds us that those who act in the manner described in the Beatitudes will find their reward with God.

SUPPORTING OUR UNHOUSED PARISHIONERS

Our Parish has multiple ministries that support the homeless or unhoused members of our downtown community. In addition to Bread & Blessing, and St. Benedict Labre Ministries, and the St. Vincent de Paul group, and the Parish Office staff daily feeds a number of unhoused individuals.

When people panhandle (come up to you asking for money), while it might seem a charitable thing to do, it can also be a way of enabling inappropriate behavior. For those who use the money they collect for alcohol or others drugs, It is actually contributing to their ill health. The best thing to do is to let the person know that you cannot give them money. On Sundays, just direct them to the Basement Parish Hall where they can receive a satisfying lunch at no charge from 8:30am-11:30am. On weekdays, direct them to the Parish Office during our office hours.

Catholic Charities is seeking caring and safety-conscious volunteer drivers for our Senior Transportation Program, which provides free, reliable rides to adults 60+ in the Albuquerque and Rio Rancho metro areas.

Many seniors lack transportation to medical appointments, grocery stores, banking and other essential errands. Our program bridges this gap, allowing older adults to remain independent and confident while getting where they need to go. By volunteering or helping us spread the word, you'll be empowering seniors to maintain their independence and quality of life.

Eucharistic Prayer III

The heart of the Mass is the Eucharistic Prayer. We have a variety of prayers to choose from, but they all begin with the Preface dialogue ("The Lord be with you. . . . Lift up your hearts") and end with the Great Amen. The assembly sings several acclamations: the Holy, the Memorial Acclamation, and the Great Amen. But the rest of the prayer is verbalized by the priest. Even though the priest alone speaks the words out loud, all in the assembly join their hearts together in prayer with him.

For many centuries, the Roman Church used only one such prayer, which we now call Eucharistic Prayer I. Immediately after the Second Vatican Council, we added three more prayers to the repertoire. More have followed since. Of those first three new prayers, II and IV were based on texts from the first few centuries after Christ. However, Eucharistic Prayer III was a new composition based on the old forms.

Eucharistic Prayer III has no Preface of its own between the opening dialogue and the Holy. Nearly one hundred different Prefaces may be used to open the prayer. After the Holy is sung, Prayer III starts with the words "You are indeed holy, O Lord, and all you have created rightly gives you praise." The entire opening of the prayer—the Preface, the Holy, and these first lines—all give praise to God. The rest of the prayer follows a traditional outline. We pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the bread and wine. We remember the mighty deeds of God, especially the events of the Last Supper. We sing the mystery of our faith. We offer our gift to God. We pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit over the assembly. We pray intercessions for the Church's ministers, for the living and the dead. We conclude the prayer with a doxology and Amen. We often use Eucharistic Prayer III on Sundays and on feasts, especially because the interchangeable Prefaces can identify the significance of the day of celebration.
