

First Reading: *Isaiah 58:7-10*

In the work of justice, light shall break through darkness.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 112:4-9*

The just person will be a light in the darkness.

Second Reading: *1 Corinthians 2:1-5*

Paul shows that he came to Corinth preaching Christ crucified.

Gospel Reading: *Matthew 5:13-16*

Jesus teaches that his disciples are to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Following upon the teaching of the [Beatitudes](#), Jesus uses the now familiar metaphors of salt and light to describe the life of discipleship. We take salt and light for granted in our society, but these commodities were more precious in ancient cultures. Just as now, salt was used in Jesus' time for flavoring, as a preservative, and as a healing agent. Similarly, the widespread use of electricity in the modern world makes us less aware of the value and importance of light in our lives.



Still, our familiarity with this passage from Matthew's Gospel speaks well to the abiding power of the imagery that Jesus presented. Jesus' call to be salt for the earth and light for the world powerfully states our mission as Church and as Christians. Our commitment to social justice flows from the exhortation that Jesus gives us in today's Gospel. Some of the activities that this commitment leads us to are given more concrete expression as the Corporal and Spiritual [Works of Mercy](#). When we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, console those who mourn, and so on, we show ourselves to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. When we do these things with the community of faith, the Church, we are indeed acting as "a city set on a mountain" that cannot be hidden!

SUPPORTING OUR UNHOUSED PARISHIONERS

Our Parish has multiple ministries that support the homeless or unhoused members of our downtown community. In addition to Bread & Blessing, and St. Benedict Labre Ministries, and the St. Vincent de Paul group, and the Parish Office staff daily feeds a number of unhoused individuals.

When people panhandle (come up to you asking for money), while it might seem a charitable thing to do, it can also be a way of enabling inappropriate behavior. For those who use the money they collect for alcohol or other drugs, It is actually contributing to their ill health. The best thing to do is to let the person know that you cannot give them money. On Sundays, just direct them to the Basement Parish Hall where they can receive a satisfying lunch at no charge from 8:30am-11:30am. On weekdays, direct them to the Parish Office during our office hours.

Catholic Charities is seeking caring and safety-conscious volunteer drivers for our Senior Transportation Program, which provides free, reliable rides to adults 60+ in the Albuquerque and Rio Rancho metro areas.

Many seniors lack transportation to medical appointments, grocery stores, banking and other essential errands. Our program bridges this gap, allowing older adults to remain independent and confident while getting where they need to go. By volunteering or helping us spread the word, you'll be empowering seniors to maintain their independence and quality of life.

Together, we can make a meaningful difference in the lives of seniors who need us most. Thank you for considering this important service and for all you do to strengthen our community.

Eucharistic Prayer II

For many a churchgoer, the “shorter is better” principle has made Eucharistic Prayer II the preferred heart of many a Mass. Impatient worshipers who finish singing the “Holy,” and hear the words, “You are indeed Holy, O Lord, the fount of all holiness,” know that it won’t be long till the Great Amen. The Catholic Church uses ten different Eucharistic Prayers, but Prayer II remains most popular for its direct approach and brevity. For hundreds of years, our church offered only one Eucharistic Prayer, which earned the name “Roman Canon,” since it was the “canon” or the one way of doing things. One of the most dramatic reforms of Vatican II (1962–1965) was to rename it Eucharistic Prayer I, and to add on several more prayers never before heard in Roman Catholic Churches. The first of these “new” prayers, Prayer II, is actually a rewrite of a very old one. The original version is in a document called the Apostolic Tradition, formerly attributed to Hippolytus, a priest, exile, antipope, martyr, and saint. There’s hope for all of us!) The text, dating from about the third century, records a Eucharistic Prayer for any bishop who wondered how it was done. The expectation was that a bishop should be able to pray spontaneously, without a written text, but it supplied one in case the bishop needed help. The Apostolic Tradition thus became a forerunner of liturgical magazines that offer helpful suggestions to parishes. The version of this prayer that we use today makes a few changes. For example, the original third century prayer did not include a “Holy.” We added one to lend uniformity to all our Eucharistic Prayers. That caused the insertion of a new transitional phrase, the one we hear before the story of the Last Supper begins. For clarity, we also rewrote the intercessions at the end of the prayer, which pray for the church, the deceased and the living, while praising the glory of Mary and the saints. Prayer II offers us much more than brevity. It offers antiquity. To pray it is to repeat prayers that have been part of our tradition from the very beginning. It introduces us to the communion that is ours in faith, with Christ, and with our ancestors.
