Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle C August 24, 2025 Next Sunday's Readings

First Reading; Isaiah 66:18-21

Nations of every language shall come to see my glory.

Responsorial Psalm; *Psalm 117:1-2* Praise the Lord, all you nations.

Second Reading; *Hebrews 12:5-7,11-13* Whom the Lord loves, he disciplines.

Gospel Reading; Luke 13:22-30

People will come from north and south, east and west, and take their place in the Kingdom of God.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel reading is the third of three parables in chapter 13 that deal with the theme of the unexpected reversals brought by the Kingdom of God. The other two parables are about the tiny mustard seed that grows into a large tree and the small amount of yeast that makes a large batch of dough rise. All three are about the few and the many and the Kingdom of God.

As this parable opens, Luke reminds us that Jesus is making his way to Jerusalem. This journey, this exodus as Luke refers to it, makes up the entire middle of the Gospel. He is teaching as he goes. A question from the crowd gives Jesus the chance to make a prophetic statement. Luke uses this question device a number of times in his Gospel. A few weeks ago, the question "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" led to the parable of the Good Samaritan. The question about will only a few be saved uses typical Christian language about salvation but also expresses the Jewish concern about whether everyone who calls himself a Jew is actually faithful to the covenant. This was a concern of the Pharisees.

Jesus answers that they must strive in the time remaining to enter through the narrow door because many will be trying to get in but won't be strong enough. He then moves to a parable about another door. (The translation says "gate" then "door," but the same Greek word is used.) Once all those entering the master's house are in and he locks the door, there will be no way for others to get in. Those left outside may knock, but the master will say he doesn't know them. Unlike the Gospel reading from a few weeks ago where Jesus was teaching about prayer, and we were told to knock and the door would be opened, in this parable, the master will not open and say he does not know us. Those who do not make it through the narrow door will be cast out to where there is wailing and grinding of teeth. The image of the door is replaced in the final verses of the parable with the image of the heavenly banquet.

In the end, many will be saved, but many who thought they would be saved will not be saved. The parable is a prophetic warning to repentance in order to enter the kingdom.

Orans

Orans is a Latin word meaning "praying." It also defines the formal posture assumed by a priest whenever he prays during Mass. Any time he directly addresses God, the priest stands with his hands slightly raised and outstretched. This gesture can be traced to stories of Moses (Exodus 9:29) and descriptions of prayer in the Psalms (28:2; 63:4,134:2). It resembles the gesture of a small child ready to hug or asking to be lifted up. Tertullian, the second-century father of the Church from North Africa, said that extending hands in prayer bears witness to the Cross of Christ. Depictions of early Christians in the orans position can be found in the catacombs. The gesture has had an honored place in the history of the Roman liturgy. The precise position admits some variation. After the council of Trent, priests were instructed to raise their hands no higher nor wider than the shoulder, palms facing each other and the fingers of each hand joined. Some still follow that former rubric, even though it is no longer in force. Some stand with arms spread completely outstretched to the sides, while others choose a mid-position. Some stand with arms lifted up high, palms facing out, in a gesture that says in another context, "Don't shoot!" but here implies a reverent surrender to God in prayer. The priest is to assume a recognizable prayer posture. In this way he, the assembly, and God all know what is going on during the most solemn parts of the Mass. Some communities have found it helpful for the assembly to assume the orans position when it prays together, for example, at the Lord's Prayer.

Although many Catholics may join hands at that time, they could stand with arms outstretched, palms upraised. Some will find this posture helpful at private prayer. A member of the armed forces assumes a specific posture when addressing a superior. You hold the telephone a certain way if you expect the person you called to hear. Christians traditionally stand in the orans position when we address God.

My dear brother priests,

As we are all aware, the situation in Gaza has reached a crisis point as people there are suffering from bombings, constant relocation, lack of medical support, and starvation. Given these facts, I ask that you take up a special collection for our brothers and sisters in Gaza who are in such great need. Please announce this collection for the next three Sundays, August 17, 24 and 31. Then, I ask that you send the money collected for this critical cause as soon as possible to Julie Anne Sanchez at the Pastoral Center. This collection is being urged by our own concern for those in Gaza and by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

The donations will be sent by the archdiocese directly to the Catholic Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA) and to Catholic Relief Services (CRS). Eash will receive half of what is donated. CNEWA is providing vital emergency humanitarian relief and medical and psychological care for the sick, malnourished and wounded in Gaza. CRS is working through local Church partners to provide food, shelter, cash assistance, hygiene supplies and care for people's emotional well-being. Please explain to our parishioners that their donations will be sent by the archdiocese directly to these two Catholic agencies, thus assuring that the aid will get to those in need in Gaza.

Please continue to remember those in Gaza in the Prayers of the Faithful at all weekend and daily Masses. Thank you very much for your immediate response as our local Church here in the southwest does what it can to assist our brothers and sisters in Gaza.
