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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



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Honored as 180th Face on the Barroom Floor

Russells provide blueprint for successful marriage, making our community a better place

For 54 years, Rick and Carol Russell have been united in marriage. It's the perfect example of how opposites can attract and succeed – when each spouse gives the other space to do their own thing.

The Omaha super couple was roasted at the Omaha Press Club on Dec. 5, as they were honored as the 180th Face on the Barroom Floor. The ongoing theme of the evening was how they work so well together to make our community a better place.

Rick, who has been a key executive in the family business, Millard Lumber Inc., for more than 50 years, said, "We work good as a couple – not 24/7."

Carol said, "We've been married 54 years, because I stayed out of the lumber business. I schmooze well. Rick is off to the side." The Russells cancel each other's vote in some elections, but they also stand side-by-side at multiple events nearly every week.

Dr. Laura Jana served as emcee for the event. She made it clear that the Russells were too nice to roast. "As a pediatrician, I never want to make fun of anyone," she said. "Nice is rarely funny."

Nancy Williams, managing partner, Block 27 Consulting and founder/former CEO of No More Empty Pots, began her roast by saying she would not be as soft on the Russells as Dr. Jana. "I can be irreverent, and I can use a lot of expletives," she said. "My favorite expletive is the F-bomb."

Williams didn't dig into her expletive bag, but rather opted to give her observations of being with the Russells. She tossed out several terms to describe Carol – animated, super connector, supportive, encouraging, doting grandmother.

She called Rick "a man of few words," adding "he is one of the most attentive spouses I've ever seen....I've never seen them share disparaging comments about each other."

As an African-American, Williams praised the Russells for their strong belief in racial equity and justice for all. With more people like the Russells, Williams said, "Omaha might be ready to move the needle" in its racial relations.

playing Pac-Man."

Rowe described how he and Russell attended a conference to hear a man named Bernie Marcus discuss his ideas for the future of the lumber business. Rowe said Rick's reaction to the presentation was, "There is no way this is going to work. It's too dark, too junky."

Turned out, Bernie Marcus's idea was to create a company called Home Depot. An initial small investment would have been worth tens of millions of dollars today. Rowe needed Russell, "I'd call that a miss."

Rowe shared that Rick Russell has a passion for photography and even has a photograph on display at Gallery 1516, an Omaha art gallery. Russell likes photographing birds, such as sandhill cranes and great horned owls. His first owl encounter was in the 1970s when the northern spotted owl restricted logging in the Pacific Northwest.

Rowe said it's not uncommon for Russell to exclaim around 2:30 or 3 p.m., "The bald eagles are flying out at Chalco. I've got to go."

Rowe also had commentary directed at Carol Russell, saying, "She's been on more boards than we've ever had in stock at the lumber yard... with all her experience with 'nonprofits,' Carol should consider joining the Millard Lumber board."

The roast concluded with family insights from the three Russell children – Joel Russell, Sara Boyd and Mark Russell.

Boyd, who is founder of Ascend Advisory, a company that aims to help others reach their full potential, called herself "the middle child – the most well-adjusted." Boyd is former president of the Omaha Community Foundation.

She remarked, "I'm so funny, that my son just got up and went to the bathroom" right before she began her roast.

Calling her mother "a social butterfly," Boyd said she thought it was a routine part of childhood "to have to stuff envelopes for Girls, Inc."

The temperature in the room started to rise with the third roaster of the evening – Don Rowe, a member of the Omaha City Council and a longtime associate at Millard Lumber.

Rowe detailed how Millard Lumber purchased Hoppe Lumber in Lincoln in 1987. The merger resulted in frequent business meetings between Rick Russell and John Hoppe Jr. Their fathers were both in the lumber business and were good friends. John and Rick traveled to many out-of-town industry events. The trips, Rowe said, were "more about drinking Scotch whisky and

of Millard Lumber. He noted that it's not uncommon for his parents to attend evening functions six or seven nights a week with all their community activities.

"Rick's idea of a vacation," Joel said, "is when Mom schedules a surgery...then he doesn't have to go out six or seven nights a week."

Joel corrected Rowe's earlier comment that Rick likes to leave work early around 2:30 or 3 p.m. for special meetings or to tend to his photography hobby. "It's more like 11 a.m.," he said.

The roast concluded with youngest son, Mark, who is Millard Lumber's sales market manager for the Lincoln area. Mark's antics as a child showed his parents "what parenting really meant and made my dad grow bald."

He learned all about what it means to volunteer, or as he calls it "volun-told." One benefit, Mark said, was when his mother would volunteer at Prevent Blindness, it meant he could go to Family Fun Center.

With eyes tearing and voice cracking, Mark wrapped up the roast by saying, "My parents mean so much to me. Love you guys."

Face on the Barroom Floor artist, Jeff Koterba, depicted Rick and Carol Russell as builders -- not only with lumber, but as builders and visionaries for the community. They touch lives -- not only in Millard, but in Omaha and beyond.

The family's foundation is Millard Lumber, and the Russells are pictured next to the company's iconic logo while holding blueprints and yardsticks. They're also surrounded by stacks of lumber labeled "Faith, family, and community."

Two forklifts are carrying stacks of lumber, moving here and there, yet coming together for a common cause. Koterba said, "It's all about their strong foundation to help others."

Rather than try to list the countless organizations which have benefitted from the volunteer and philanthropic efforts of the Russells, Koterba portrayed a heart filled with donations. He also included a wallet from Warren Buffett, which Carol Russell used to raise \$270,000 for Girls, Inc.

In the distance, Koterba shows Estes Park, a preferred vacation spot for the Russell family, plus a mountain range with two flags representing their favorite schools -- Nebraska and Creighton.

Omaha's newest volleyball team to address Feb. 5 Noon Forum

League One Volleyball's (LOVB) goal is to build volleyball into the next major American sports league. Suzie Fritz, coach of the Omaha team in the new league, and players Jaali Winters and Jordan Larson will speak at the Feb. 5 Noon Forum.

League One will be the second professional volleyball team in Omaha. The Supernovas

of the Pro Volleyball Federation (PVF) debuted in Omaha a year ago and won the league championship. Both the Supernovas and League One Omaha began practicing a few weeks ago for their January season openers.

Suzie Fritz, an NCAA veteran, has a storied career. She was most recently the associate head coach at Arkansas after 25 years as head coach of Kansas State. In her nearly 30 years as a volleyball coach, she led nationally ranked teams to 18 NCAA tournament appearances, with her players including 18 All-American selections, 29 All-Region selections, and 60 All SEC/Big12 selections.

Over the past decade, she also coached three AVCA Midwest Freshman of the Year and two Big 12 Freshman of the Year recipients. She also served as a coach for the USA Women's Collegiate program, appointed to a coaching role with the USA A2 team in 2006, again in 2009 as a head coach. In 2023, she also served as a talent evaluator for the USA Women's Open Tryout. In 2023, Fritz's team represented the United States at the World University Games in Kazan, Russia.

Winters, an outside hitter from Ankeny, Iowa, is a four-time All-American from Creighton University, where she remains the program's most decorated athlete ever. She is the first player in the past 20 years to be named two-time Big East Championship MVP and still holds more than 80 BlueJay volleyball records. Her international experi-

ence includes competing on the U.S. Volleyball Collegiate National Team in 2017 and playing professionally with multiple clubs in Spain, Greece and France after graduating from Creighton.

Larson, a Hooper, Nebraska product and Premier Nebraska alumna, is one of the most decorated American volleyball players in history. She made her mark on Cornhusker volleyball as a three-time All American and 2006 NCAA champion, earning the nickname "Governor" due to her popularity in the state.

Most recently she has been an assistant coach at Nebraska.

Larson joined the U.S. Women's National Team in

2009 and has led the U.S. to four Olympic medals, including the team's first-ever gold at Tokyo 2020, where she earned MVP and Best Outside Hitter honors. At Paris 2024, she helped the U.S. claim silver, becoming the first American indoor athlete to win four Olympic medals.

Larson won gold at the FIVB World Championship (2014), Volleyball Nations League (2018, 2019, 2021), and the Club World Championship (2015, 2016). She has played in Puerto Rico, Russia, Turkey and Italy and with Athletes Unlimited during her 15-year pro career.
