Police Chief Schmaderer to be next Face on Barroom Floor

With his Hollywood looks and macho personality, Omaha Police Chief Todd Schmaderer gives our city an impressive flair in the law enforcement world. It wouldn't be a huge stretch to compare his character to the role of Frank Reagan, the New York City police commissioner played by Tom Selleck in the popular TV show "Blue Bloods."

Schmaderer joined the Omaha Police Department in 1996 and has served as chief since 2012, making him the longest-serving police chief among all major cities. Earlier this year, he signed an agreement with the City of Omaha to extend his term as chief another five years.

His longevity is evident by the fact that he

has served as police chief under three mayors – Democrats Jim Suttle and John Ewing Jr. and Republican Jean Stothert. He jokes, "Nobody knows what political party I am."

On Thursday, Feb. 19, Schmaderer has agreed to place himself under "house arrest" when he comes to the Omaha Press Club to be honored as the 185th Face on the Barroom Floor. It promises to be a memorable night, as the OPC recognizes him as the first active police chief ever to become a Face on the Barroom Floor.

(NOTE: Tom Warren had been retired as police chief for 11 years and was serving as president and CEO of the Urban League of Omaha when he and his wife, Aileen, were honored as Face No. 160 in 2019.)

Being a Face means a lot to Schmaderer. "This is the Heisman Trophy of awards in Omaha," he said. "As chief of police, it's the kind of award you don't expect to receive. It's certainly a tremendous honor."

Police work runs in the Schmaderer family. Todd's father, Rich, is a retired police sergeant in the Omaha Police Department, while his younger brother, Brian, serves as an

Sadlemyer says goodbye to KFAB morning show

Gary Sadlemyer's legendary ability to connect with audiences extends from vast numbers of radio listeners and devoted Husker fans to Omaha Press Club members – and all are thrilled to know they've not heard the last from him.

His final show at NewsRadio 1110 KFAB was Friday, Dec. 12, 2025, one day shy of his 49th anniversary working at the station and 53 years in radio overall. Sadlemyer was hired at the iHeartMedia Omaha news/talk outlet in December 1976 after beginning his career at KRGH Grand Island in 1973.

According to a KFAB news release, Sadlemyer hosted the station's first live, daily talk show, anchoring "KFAB's Morning News" for more than three decades and serving several years as the station's program director. His voice is beloved by a generation of Husker fans stemming from his time on the Nebraska football broadcasts from 1980-1995.

It was around 1995 that he joined the OPC. At the behest of longtime member and former club president Tom O'Connor, Sadlemyer became a Face on the Barroom Floor Committee member, a role he still serves today.

As the emcee of numerous Face events, he says, "It's my favorite thing to do. I'd rather be the emcee than a roaster, because you can roast everyone who comes to speak at the podium!" Fondly recalling Sen. Pete Ricketts' Face event, he said of the senator's father, "I even got Joe to laugh – but don't call him Joe. You call him 'Mr. Ricketts!'"

That experience was exceeded by his own honor as the 115th Face in February 2008.

active lieutenant in the OPD. He also has a nephew who is an OPD rookie police officer.

Being behind a microphone and podium is nothing new for Schmaderer, who is known for being in complete control when dealing with media. He's done nearly 100 news conferences in his 13-plus years as Omaha's police chief. He has been featured in national media outlets such as Dateline NBC, CNN, Fox News and Washington Post Live.

"When Todd does a news conference, he runs the room. It's because of his respect and accomplishments, his genuine professionalism and transparency – the media have to be nice and play fair with him," said his fiancée, Carla Liberty, who is business development director for YASH Technologies, a global IT consultant firm. Carla will be one of Schmaderer's roasters at the OPC event.

Schmaderer, who is the 32nd chief in OPD history, has had a distinguished and impactful career in law enforcement. He leads a department of 1,200 employees, including 906 sworn officers.

In addition to pioneering OPD's media strategy, he has navigated the department through a variety of critical incidents, from citywide civil unrest involving the National Guard, police corruption scandals, the arrests of two separate serial killers, officers killed in the line of duty, community-shattering child murders, and high-profile deaths involving in-custody prisoners.

Under Schmaderer's leadership, Omaha has witnessed significant advancements in public safety and police-community relations. His tenure has seen a remarkable reduction in gun violence, with homicides reaching a 40-year low, while achieving a 100% clearance rate for homicides for the last three years, an unheard-of statistic for a major city.

The department also has experienced a notable decrease in complaints against officers, a substantial increase in diversity reflective of the community, and a reduction in officer-involved shootings to their lowest level. Most notably, Omaha recorded no homicides for 120 days in 2019, none the first 133 days of 2023, and achieved a city/national record low of homicides in 2024.

An Omaha native, Schmaderer attended St. Pius X Catholic School and Roncalli Catholic High School, where he was a multi-sport athlete. He received a full-ride scholarship to play football at Wayne State College, in Wayne, Nebraska. He spent one year

playing at Wayne State as a running back/receiver/kick returner, while pursuing a degree in business.

After his first year at WSC, Schmaderer decided to follow in his father's footsteps and pursue law enforcement. He returned to Omaha and earned his bachelor of science degree in criminal justice from the University of Nebraska Omaha. In 2007, at the age of 36, Schmaderer received his master's degree in criminal justice from the University of Cincinnati, one of the leading criminal justice programs in the country. Further augmenting his expertise, Schmaderer is a

graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) National Executive Institute.

Business and the stock market have always been a significant interest of Schmaderer. He and his father discuss market trends and their day trading every morning on his drive to work.

Schmaderer's numerous awards include: Alumni Award for Excellence (2013 and 2017) and Lifetime Achievement Award (2024), all from UNO; Special Achievement Award (2022), Metropolitan Chiefs Association; Distinguished Service Award (2022), Omaha Police Foundation; Omahan of the Year Award (2023), Suburban Rotary of Omaha; and Law Enforcement Champion Award (2024), Special Olympics.

He is affiliated with several professional associations, including Major Cities Chiefs Association, International Chiefs of Police Association, and the Omaha Metropolitan Chiefs Association. He also serves on the board of directors of the Boys and Girls Club of the Midlands. In 2016, Schmaderer – along with Mayor Ewing – participated in Omaha's Dancing with the Stars fundraiser for children battling cancer. He won first place in the event and set a record for funds raised.

In 2024, after 2½ years of writing, Schmaderer authored and self-published his first textbook – "Synergy of Influence: Lead-

ership, Law Enforcement & the Media" – a book shaped by 10 years of reflection on his career as police chief. The book has currently been launched as a textbook resource in multiple curriculums within the UNO collegiate system.

Schmaderer lives in the Elkhorn area with Carla, a New Orleans native, and her 13-year-old daughter, Mina Merwick. Together, they share a blended family that includes three other grown children, who are college graduates with promising careers in Nebraska – Ashlynn Schmaderer, 26, Garret Schmaderer, 22, and Derek Merwick, 22.

The couple first met when Carla came to Schmaderer's office in 2018 as a government sales representative for USCellular to discuss Nebraska's first priority network for public safety. They were engaged on July 6, 2025 on a Gulf Coast trip to celebrate Carla's 45th birthday at one of their favorite beaches in Orange Beach, Alabama.

In their spare time, Schmaderer and Carla enjoy spending time with family, golfing, boating, exploring local dining and new culinary experiences, traveling throughout the United States and abroad – ideally near the ocean – attending sporting events, and relaxing at home or at the family farm in southeast Nebraska.

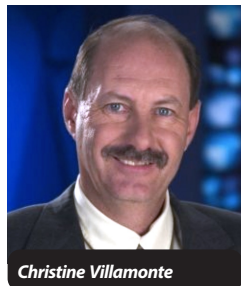

"I was NOT involved in my own selection," he laughed, "and it was such a fun time. My family came in from Minnesota, my kids were there, and the roasters included Sens. Chuck Hagel and Ben Nelson, and Tom Osborne."

Earlier in that decade, Sadlemyer followed longtime Omaha World-Herald columnist Michael Kelly as emcee of the fun-filled, satirical Omaha Press Club Show. His five-year stint began when the show was performed at The Rose Theater and then at the Mid-America Center.

"Jim Fogarty and John Prescott (longtime OPC members) and I would go to the Dundee Dell to write jokes for the monologues," Sadlemyer said. "Fog would throw out a germ of an idea, then Prescott would add the punch line. We laughed our asses off."

A member of the Nebraska Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame, where he was enshrined in 2011, Sadlemyer learned upon his retirement that NewsRadio 1110 KFAB named the station's broadcast studio in his honor.

Per the news release, midmorning talk host and current KFAB Program Director Scott Voorhees has moved into morning drive as Sadlemyer's replacement. He joins Sadlemyer's on-air early morning partners for the past quarter-century, Jim Rose and Lucy Chapman, and KFAB News morning anchor Craig Evans. The show provides news, weather, traffic, sports updates, business news and conversation/opinion on topics ranging from important community issues to pop culture, politics, sports and, as Sadlemyer says, "Lord knows what."

But KFAB listeners haven't heard the last from Sadlemyer. He'll still provide personalized content for station advertisers and periodically hang out or be a fill-in host on the morning show. And with his continued involvement on the OPC Face committee, members are sure to enjoy his wit at future events.

Sadlemyer is looking forward to spending more time with his children and grandchildren, while grateful for his decades-long career.

"The day-to-day work becomes routine," he said. "But then, when you look back on your career and realize you're rich in friends and family, you can say you've had a very good life."

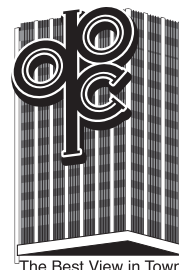
