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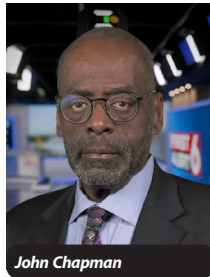


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Veteran WOWT-TV reporter, John Chapman, to be honored April 24 as Face on Barroom Floor

Every newsroom needs a John Chapman. For the past 39 years, Chapman has been a fixture at WOWT-TV (Ch. 6). On April 24, Chapman will be recognized for his stellar career when the Omaha Press Club honors him as the 181st Face on the Barroom Floor.

"John is beloved in the newsroom," said Mike McKnight, president of the Omaha Press Club and a reporter at WOWT for 49 years. "He has an infectious laugh. When things are most serious in the news world, you always can count on John to break the tension with his laugh."

Chapman said the Face recognition was a "total surprise" to him. "I was shocked," he said. "I didn't expect it at all. I'm very honored."

A native of Danville, Illinois, Chapman migrated west to Sioux City, Iowa to attend Morningside College on a football scholarship. He played wide receiver for four years and also participated in basketball and track for one year.

Morningside, a small private school, was a member of the North Central Conference at the time, competing against much larger schools such as the University of Nebraska Omaha, North Dakota and North Dakota State, South Dakota and South Dakota State. "We fought hard," he said. A career highlight, he jokes, was that he was able to run his pass routes in practice against a Morningside cornerback, who went on to earn all-conference honors. "I liked to tell him that I made him who he was," Chapman said.

Following college, Chapman landed his first reporting job at KMEG-TV, the CBS affiliate in Sioux City. He later moved to KTIV-TV, the NBC affiliate in Sioux City. He wore several hats at KTIV, serving as a "one-man band" reporter/videographer, filling in as anchor on the news and sports desks, working as weekend assignment edi-

tor and even delivering the weather when needed.

In 1986, opportunity knocked and Chapman was hired by Steve Murphy, the legendary WOWT news director who was honored in 1990 by the OPC as its 44th Face on the Barroom Floor.

During the 1990s, Chapman split his time between the general assignment reporting duties and the weekend sports anchor desk. He covered the Nebraska football team during the dominant years when the Huskers won back-to-back national championships.

As a general assignment reporter, Chapman has covered everything from parades to politics. He played a role in covering the recall of an Omaha mayor, the fall of the scandal-laden Franklin Credit Union, historic floods and storms that changed the lives of thousands of area people, as well as the

College World Series to celebrate 75 years in Omaha

Jack Diesing set up the unique challenge of his presentation at the start of the March 20 Noon Forum.

"It's kind of difficult to fit 75 years into 20 minutes, but we're going to do our best," he said to the gathering, introducing the discussion of College World Series of Omaha, Inc. The nonprofit is a unique operation, a board dedicated to bringing businesses and community leaders together to ensure the success of Omaha's signature collegiate sporting event.

"It allowed the business community to cost-effectively support the event and also get involved," said Diesing, the CWS chairman, president and treasurer. Founded in 1967 by Jack's father, CWS of Omaha, Inc. was a one-of-a-kind solution to collaborating with the major players in delivering and executing the baseball championship event.

Throughout its history, the operation oversaw a number of facility upgrades to Rosenblatt Stadium, commissioned and installed the iconic Road to Omaha statue and created the opening festivities for the series.

The 2007 decision to move the event to North Downtown and the new ballpark brought changes for the group, resulting in the hiring of paid staff to the nonprofit. Diesing called the move a major challenge, but one that he feels has been validated by the tremendous success the event has seen since.

"We used to have 10 percent of people say they were disappointed we moved downtown," he said. "Now, it's 99.9 percent that think this is the greatest idea we could ever make. We took it to the future, we're downtown where all the activity is."

A true family affair, Jack Diesing took over as chairman from his father, John Diesing Sr., in 1989. His daughter, Lisa, now serves on the board, working with CWS of Omaha, Inc. staff to ensure the event's sustained future and success in Omaha, despite the constantly shifting landscape of college athletics.

"The NCAA is going through a lot of changes. Baseball is going through a lot of changes. All sports are going through a lot of changes," Lisa said, alluding to the possibility of a post-NCAA future. "We have to start thinking about, if the NCAA isn't our partner after 2036, we want to make sure we have the relationships elsewhere. So, if it's not the NCAA Men's College World Series, we're hosting the Men's Baseball Championship."

Lisa mentioned the CWS team's efforts to build and maintain relationships with various athletic conference directors, fostering partnerships with leaders like SEC Commissioner Greg Sankey and ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips.

The Diesings were joined at the Noon Forum by Amy Hornacker, CWS of Omaha Inc. executive director, who took the opportunity to share the group's vision and plans for celebrating the event's 75-year anniversary in Omaha this summer. Competition is scheduled from June 13 – June 22/23.

"The 75th anniversary has a lot to do with the event's relationship with the community," Hornacker said, promising colorful signage, sidewalk logos, and a free celebratory event for the public to attend. "It's a really cool year, and we're really excited to celebrate."

Jack Diesing told the room he's proud of the community's support for the College World Series, praising the event's interconnectedness with the city.

"Louisville is synonymous with the Kentucky Derby. Augusta is synonymous with the Masters. Omaha is synonymous with the College World Series," Jack said. "If you think about it, that's pretty good company."

Correction:

John Diesing Sr. was chairman and president of the College World Series from 1964 to 1988 and in 1967 founded CWS of Omaha, Inc. Ed Pettis was the first CWS chairman when the event moved to Omaha in 1950 and served until his death in 1963. The CWS leadership sequence was stated incorrectly in the February and March newsletters.

invasion of violent street gangs to the metro area.

Chapman also covered many stories of positive community events and touching personal stories of triumph and perseverance. "John is well connected, especially in North Omaha," McKnight said. "He always has an eye on the North Omaha community."

In 2022, Chapman was inducted into the Omaha Press Club Journalists of Excellence Hall of Fame. He also has won numerous awards for his reporting.

Now in his mid-60s, Chapman has no immediate plans to retire. He joked that he hopes his career will last "as long as Mike McKnight's."

Chapman married his high school sweetheart, Nancy Collins. They have three children and five grandchildren.

Roasters set for Chapman Face event

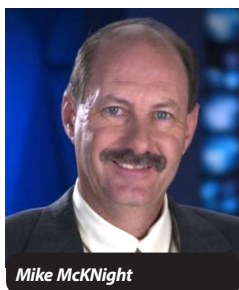
Four people with strong connections to WOWT will serve as roasters.

DOUBLETREE GARAGE: YOU MAY PARK IN THE GARAGE ON 16TH AND DODGE STREETS, NORTHEAST CORNER.

AFTER PARKING, TAKE THE GARAGE ELEVATOR DOWN TO THE G (THE GROUND OR OMAHA PRESS CLUB) LEVEL.
