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## Mayoral debate March 11 at OPC

**F**ive people have announced their candidacy for Omaha mayor, and all five have agreed to participate in a primary election debate March 11 at the Press Club.

**Terry Brewer** has served as a pastor at New Covenant Church of Christ in Omaha for 28 years. He is a Marine Corps veteran and a 17-year steward for Teamsters 554.

**John Ewing** has been Douglas County treasurer for 17 years. Ewing also had a 24-year tenure in law enforcement with the Omaha Police Department.

**Jasmine Harris** is a policy and advocacy director for RISE, a Nebraska non-profit that supports criminal justice reform.

**Mike McDonnell** is a former Nebraska state senator. McDonnell also was a former chief of the Omaha Fire Department.

**Jean Stothert** is the incumbent seeking her fourth term. She is the first woman to hold this office.

The primary election is April 1, and the two top vote getters in the primary will com-

pete in the general election May 13.

The debate is sponsored by the Press Club and the League of Women Voters of Greater Omaha. The moderator will be WOWT reporter/anchor Brian Mastre.

WOWT will livestream the debate from noon to 1 p.m., March 11, on the following platforms: WOWT.com; First Alert 6 News smartphone app; 6 News WOWT Facebook page; and First Alert 6 YouTube channel.

WOWT also will air a recording of the debate the following day, March 12, on COZI channel 6.2 and Cox channel 120 from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

A recording of the debate will remain available indefinitely on WOWT's YouTube channel.

Parking for debate guests is suggested at the DoubleTree garage. It is free for OPC members who should bring their tickets to the club for validation.

The Education Committee presents a one-hour program of various topics to the Omaha community and is most appreciative of KIOS-FM (91.5), as it continues to record and replay our events.

The committee meets the first Thursday of the month, with programs generally scheduled on the third Thursday of the month. 2024 included nine Noon Forums. While attendance remains a concern, the committee continues to strive to bring outstanding programs to our members and the public at large.

During 2024, we were able to continue to provide outstanding programs to the Omaha community and beyond, starting in January with an explanation on the valuation process by Douglas County Assessor Walt Peffer. Don Bacon and Tony Vargas as they competed for Nebraska's 2nd Congressional District in October.

The Education Committee is looking forward to an exciting year ahead, beginning with a presentation by the Omaha Public Schools superintendent, Matt Ray. February featured a presentation by Coach Suzie Fritz, Jaali Winters, and Jordan Larson of the LOVB-Omaha pro volleyball team. 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# Volleyball Shows Omaha the LOVB

*Newest pro team boasts local legends while supporting the community.*

**E**ven in an ice storm, Omahans will find a way to celebrate volleyball.

On Wednesday, Feb. 5, the Omaha Press Club hosted a panel discussion featuring some stars from Omaha's newest professional volleyball team, playing in League One Volleyball (LOVB). Head coach Suzie Fritz was joined by a pair of names familiar to volleyball fans in the state: Jordan Larson and Jaali Winters.

The trio braved the icy roads to share some insights on the new league, the growth of volleyball, and what they're doing to keep that growth on an upward trend.

Larson made her mark on the sport in locales near and far, growing up in Hooper, Nebraska, playing at the University of Nebraska, winning four Olympic medals in London, Rio de Janeiro, Tokyo, and Paris, then playing professionally in Puerto Rico, Russia, Turkey, China, and Italy. Of returning to Nebraska, Larson said, "It's an honor... to come home and be 45 minutes from my hometown. It's really special for me to be back here."

Winters grew up in Ankeny, Iowa before

playing her college games just down the street from the Press Club, for Creighton University, where she was a four-time All-American. She said, "When I graduated, it wasn't even a thought to be able to come back to play in the U.S. I thought I'd be overseas for my entire career."

But it's not just about being close to home. Winters emphasized that she joined LOVB Omaha to play "at the highest level. It's about playing with and against the best, and that really is what our league is offering here."

While Fritz doesn't have the same history with the state as her players, she did say, "There's no better community to [see volleyball grow] than a place like Omaha, Ne-

braska." She also acknowledged that LOVB is focused on giving back to the cities in which the teams play. "We're working hard to serve our community and be a great volleyball team, and have it be bigger than volleyball."

LOVB Omaha is taking that approach not just in the community, but also in its practice gym. Larson credited Fritz with fostering a caring culture: "We do this thing every day, which I fell in love with. It's called Love Share." She explained that for 15 minutes before each practice, an athlete or coach has an opportunity to talk about anything they want. "It allowed us to get to know, not just the athlete, but the person."

League-wide, LOVB connects with its local LOVB junior volleyball clubs, establishing an integration that sets up the sport for long-term sustainability. And while the inaugural LOVB season features teams in six markets, Fritz has no doubt the league will expand: "I don't think there's any question it'll get bigger from here."

Omaha plays home matches at a pair of local sites, either Liberty First Credit Union Arena or Baxter Arena, with the regular season ending in early April. Most matches can also be streamed online. For more information, visit [lovb.com](http://lovb.com).

# Mastre will succeed Knicely as WOWT evening co-anchor

**O**maha learned in early February that one of the nicest, longest-serving news anchors is retiring — and by mid-February, they learned that another familiar face will come through their TV sets at the anchor desk.

John Knicely — the 50-year TV news veteran who co-anchors the First Alert 6 newscasts at 5, 6:30, and 10 p.m. — announced his retirement Feb. 1. On Feb. 21, Brian Mastre was named his successor.

Mastre has been a reporter and anchor since graduating from Southwest Minnesota State University (then Southwest State Uni-

versity) in 1991 — and he's spent all but six of those years at WOWT.

He has been known in the community as a trusted journalist, and has excelled at writing, and airing, hard-hitting investigative reports that expose health or business problems, highlight government dealings, and bring people news they need to know. One such story aired on Christmas Eve 2024, when Mastre reported on Kevin Fair, who won a U.S. Supreme Court case over \$588 in overdue taxes but soon after suffered further financial hardships when he had a stroke and needed a wheelchair ramp.

Mastre's attention to detail and investigative skills have been noted by his peers, as he has received two Heartland Emmy Awards and several Regional Edward R. Murrow

Awards. A highlight of his career was being the first Omaha broadcaster to win a National Edward R. Murrow Award for Outstanding Journalism, for a story on a senior softball league in south Omaha.

Mastre is also involved in the Omaha Press Club, where he is known as the moderator for political debates, such as the mayoral debate scheduled at noon March 11. This event is hosted by the OPC and the League of Women Voters in Omaha.

With this promotion, Mastre will co-anchor with Erin Sullivan the evening newscasts on First Alert 6 Sundays through Thursdays, starting March 16.

Also selected for induction at the NBA convention in La Vista are radio legends Dave Wingert of Omaha and Dale Johnson of Lincoln, and Dennis and Kathi Brown, husband-wife owners and operators of Chadron radio stations KCSR-AM and KBPY-FM.

McKnight joined WOWT-TV in 1977. He has received regional Edward R. Murrow Awards and an Eric Sevareid Award, as well as numerous awards from AP, the NBA, Omaha Press Club, among others.

A one-man watchdog team, McKnight has taken on big business, government agencies, sketchy contractors, and others with a knack for gathering evidence and righting wrongs with professionalism and integrity.

The Hall of Fame honor also recognizes

McKnight for being on the ground floor in establishing courtroom camera access in Nebraska.

With an on-air resume covering 60 years and still counting, Wingert has touched numerous radio audiences with his energy, wit and infectious personality.

While his career includes stops in Kansas City, Seattle and 10 years in national syndication as "Dave 'Til Dawn," Wingert made Omaha radio his home through his presence on KQKQ, KGOR and KLTQ before becoming the morning host in 2016 on "Boomer Radio" — KOBM-FM — where he continues to entertain "Wingy" fans.

In a Nebraska radio career spanning 51 years, Johnson spent his early years as an announcer in Holdrege, Kearney, Omaha and Grand Island, then Johnson moved to Lincoln where he was KFOR news director for 38 years. He joined Nebraska Public Me-





dia in 2023, where he currently serves as morning host and news reporter.


