A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR...

With our November snow storm and cold snap, it began to look a lot like Christmas even earlier this year. Kroger is a giant grocery store chain in the south with 2700 stores. These stores will be open on Thanksgiving Day, and no doubt it will be the same at Christmas. This is great if you need some more cranberry sauce or an extra pie, but I am glad I don't work there.

There are several ways to think about the issues of changing cultural mores regarding the winter holidays.

One is to bemoan the fact that it isn't the way it used to be. Thanksgiving was sacrosanct, so was Christmas Day (even for Scrooge), and no one would dream of opening stories and violating the spirit of the day. If only legislators and companies would find a way to forge an agreement and agree on common sense rules for keeping employees home and giving everyone an appropriate day off.

Another approach is to see that this is actually good for our economy. The growth of e-commerce has been so difficult on bricks and mortor stores they need to find any edge they can to compete and make their sales targets for the year. A successful Black Friday or after Christmas sale actually helps to employ people and improve their lives by offering employment, which is good for everyone. Adding another open day or two can make or break their bottom line.

A third approach is to see that the old informal alliance between government, commerce, and the church have eroded away. During much of the 19th century and long before, these three pillars of society worked together to maintain certain standards regarding holidays and other long held practices. Since we live now in a post-Christian world, where religious faith are no longer given a significant voice or preference in culture, government, or the marketplace, it is too much to expect that it can ever be the way it was again.

No one forces us to go shopping on Thanksgiving Day or Christmas Day. The marketplace is very responsive to demand. Even if my little choice to not shop then has lit-

tle effect on the masses of consumers, it still doesn't have to affect me. I can stay home and enjoy Thanksgiving and Christmas with no pressure to go out and be the first in line to get a deal after the holiday dinner.

Living in a post Christian world is actually more like the ancient church of the Book of Acts and the first several centuries which followed the birth, death, and resurrection of Christ. And somehow the Church survived. Perhaps it became even stronger, because the message of Jesus was no longer convoluted and watered down by the forces of culture who had other priorities.

At best, living in a post Christian culture helps us to focus on what's really important this time of year. There are many things to like and treasure, like meals, family time, a day off, gift giving, football, family games, great desserts, lights and trees, seasonal songs, snow, and yes, Christmas worship.

The best treasure of all is our Lord Jesus Christ, made flesh at Christmas, to become a servant, live the lives we do, show us the way God always intended for us, and to accomplish our eternal salvation.

"Sacred infant, all divine,

What a tender love was thine.

Thus to come from highest bliss

Down to such a world as this."

Our congregation has experienced a number of deaths this year, so I hope those of us who need comfort will find some during this service. Blue Christmas will take place at 7PM on 12/21, which is also the solstice and darkest day of the year.

You have likely heard about our emergency food drive this month. Even though SNAP has been reinstated, many members of our community are still struggling. We will collect (parents and other caregivers) can drop them food into the month of December. A list of especially-needed items is in the narthex, along with a QR code to donate to CEAP (the local food shelf) directly. We are also doing other drives like the mitten tree, so please look around the narthex or read the bulletin for info on that.

Family of God Memorial Garden


The cross that was hidden in the pine trees in the front of the church has been repaired, repainted, shortened and moved to become the focal point in our new memory garden.

Be Still and Know That I Am God



While driving on Douglas Drive in Crystal recently, I spotted a church marquee displaying the words, "Be Still and Know That I Am God," (Psalm 46:10).

Coincidently, this was the Bible verse quoted by a Ruth Circle member as one of her favorites. She spoke of her relignce on these words when life seems to be overwhelming with multiple demands being made in her daily life. These words, on a refrigerator magnet no who healeth all thy diseases; less, are her refuge when she is feeling overwrought.

Another Ruth Circle member noted John 3:16 as a favorite verse. It reads. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son so that everyone who believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." These lines from scripture were among the first she memorized in Sunday School, and which are always with her.

There were further thoughts on memorization from another member. "When I was about 10, my brother and I, as soon as school was out for the summer, would go to our grandpa and uncle's farm. We were often there when my cousins were scheduled for VBS, so we 'got' to go too. They did memory work! And I had to memorize Psalm 103! We never had to do memory work in my Sunday School back home. I struggled and remember sitting at my grandpa's

rolltop desk trying to memorize the lines (and) crying. Well, I guess I did okay and Psalm 103 is still my favorite today."

"Bless the LORD, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless his holy name.

Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forgot not all his benefits:

Who forgiveth all thine iniquities;

Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with loving-

kindness and tender mercies;

Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things, so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's."

(Psalm 103: 1-5, KJV)

FAMILY OF GOD RUTH CIRCLE KITCHEN GUIDELINES

When you enter the kitchen, turn on the dishwasher. The on/off button is located on the right hand panel near the bottom. The dishwasher will run a quick rinse right away.

Turn on the coffee system.

COFFEE

- See instructions on how to make coffee and clean up. They are located in the drawer under the coffee maker system.
- > To fill the air pots', please use a glass carafe. Then pour the coffee into the air pots.
- Rinse out all air pots', coffee baskets and the carafes that are part of the coffee maker system.
- Be sure you shut off the system before you leave.

DISHWASHER

- Remove trays from dishwasher
- Use the flat tray for silverware
- See photo on front of dishwasher to load properly. Dishes will not come out clean if not loaded correctly.
- Be sure to wash all dishes that have been laid out, whether used or unused.
- Remove all food into the waste basket. Then thoroughly rinse the dishes, using a colander to catch any more food particles. Load dishwasher according to instructions above.
- Use one scoop of dishwashing soap, located on a cart by the dishwasher. Put the soap on the dishwasher door.
- Close the door and press the wash cycle button, located on the top right of the dishwasher panel It's a blue round light.

REFRIGERATOR

- Be sure to take all leftovers home.
- If you spill something, please wipe it up.

CLEAN UP

- Wash all dishes from your event, whether used or unused, in the dishwasher
- Wash tables and kitchen countertops
- > Sweep the floor, if needed. The brooms are located in the closet beside the refrigerator.
- Take any leftover food home. DO NOT leave any leftovers in the kitchen or refrigerator.
- Take out all garbage and recycle. Separate garbage from recyclable items. The dumpsters are located behind the church. You may use the Sunday School entrance
- Replace garbage bags in baskets. Extra garbage bagfs are located in the drawer under the pass-through counter.
- Take soiled towels/aprons home and launder them. Please return them to FOG as soon as possible.
