A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR...

My mother died on October 3, 2025. Math tells me she lived to almost 99 years. That is quite the long life. And yet it ends.

Mom joined Family of God, even though my parents had been longtime members of Mt Olive Lutheran in Minneapolis. When they moved to Brooklyn Park, it just wasn't possible to attend services that far away on a regular basis, so my father and mother joined our church.

Mom loved Family of God. So many people were so welcoming to her. They would see her and Dad walking up to the front door and greet them as they came in. Some talked to them after the service was over in their pew, so that it took awhile for them to get to the Cornerstone Room for doughnuts. Once there, it seemed she was always surrounded by people. Sometimes Mom would complain that she couldn't remember names very well anymore. But she felt the love, acceptance, and care from our people. I am so grateful to all of you for welcoming her like that.

You might not know that she saw her life's mission as supporting my father's ministry and raising his family. This she did for 67 years and more. At her funeral service the family decided not to have any words of remembrance. Here is one you might find amusing:

Mom and her three children sat together in church as we grew up, and of course Mom couldn't sit with Dad when he served churches, as he was leading the services. Her

method of handling her three kids was to sit close up front so we could see what was going on. I remember when I was four or so, I asked her if I could sit even farther up front by myself. She said okay as long as I behaved myself. Which I did. I lay back on the pew and counted the lights in the ceiling but was quiet and she let me stay there. It was only one time as I remember, but I felt proud to be able to sit (and lie down) by myself.

When I came to Family of God and was being interviewed by the entire council, LaDonna Blackorbay asked me what I thought about having kids in church. I said I like to have them in the service if possible because over time they would learn what was acceptable and non-acceptable behavior. I also said I promise not to give anyone the evil look if their kids were making noise (except my own). LaDonna replied: "You're Missouri-Synod, aren't you?" Everyone laughed because they knew that LaDonna, like me, was raised in that denomination.

I hope you find this amusing. This was the type of life mom committed to—supporting my father in his ministry even if it meant she had to sit in the pew with three kids without him. Mom was proud to be a pastor's wife, even as Dad officially retired. In her eyes, he was always a pastor.

Thank you, Family of God, for your love and care for my mother, and thanks be to God for Marcia C. Burow.



Greetings to everyone at Family of God —

You may have heard that we've been holding discussion sessions about something called "RIC." If you haven't had a chance to participate in any of the gatherings, I want to take this opportunity to share some important information about that with you.

What is RIC? RIC stands for Reconciling in Christ. This is a program that helps congregations fulfill their goals of being welcoming to people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, races, and ethnicities. The program has existed since 1983. A number of congregations in our synod (as well as the synod office itself) are now RIC. We are considering RIC for our congregation now, too.

Why does RIC focus on these groups? Unfortunately, over the years, people in certain groups have not experienced the same welcome that others have in the Christian church. Focusing on these groups seeks to address that hurt. If you remember the parable of the lost sheep, this story helps illustrate how some individuals have different needs that require additional care from the church. Some of our members have expressed that RIC would be a meaningful step in showing that care.

Why is this program helpful? Can't we accomplish this on our own? It is true that the values expressed in the RIC program do align with our congregation. The program itself may help deepen that focus and give us tools to live that out. It can also make us aware of places where we can grow

What would this program require of us? This is a customizable educational program that can be tailored to fit our needs. It can take two years, or seventeen years if that's our preference. We learn together, discuss, and reflect on who we are and where we'd

like to go. Upon completion, we would need to take steps like indicating our full welcome on our website and be open to calling future clergy to serve our church, regardless of their sexual orientation, race, etc.

Who runs the RIC program? ReconcilingWorks is a ministry that has been around since 1974. They advocate for the full welcome and inclusion of the LGBTQ+ community and have incorporated antiracism into their ministry in the years since then. ReconcilingWorks receives no funding from the ELCA but works with both our denomination and the ELCIC (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada).

What does it cost? As it is so customizable, the program requires a "meaningful" annual contribution. There is no dollar amount set. That is for the congregation (or synod, or campus ministry, etc.) to discern.

Why do you need to actually know any of this? We will be voting on starting the program at our annual meeting in January! By the time you receive this, we will have already met twice to talk about it. We will be meeting again on 11/6 and 11/12 at 7PM at church. If you aren't able to make those, please feel free to approach Pr. Paul or me if you'd like to learn more or discuss. You can also learn more by going to reconciling-works.org. It's important to us that everyone has as much knowledge on this as possible so we can make an informed choice at the annual meeting.

Our congregation is called Family of God. I am confident that we can have challenging conversations together, being both bold and loving at the same time. I look forward to what we can accomplish together as the body of Christ on earth. Blessings to you and your loved ones!

"Praise him with the strings and pipe, praise him with the clash of cymbals." Psalm 150: 4-5

Pray Always

"Pray Always" (Luke 18:1) was highlighted on the FOG bulletin cover for October 19th. Emblazoned in yellow, the words made an impact. This quote also reminds us of First Thessalonians (5:16-17): "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing."

How is this even possible? It is possible because we always have God with us and experience an interior dialogue with the Almighty. Martin Luther also saw prayer as a fundamental command and advocated a continuous approach to prayer.

Regarding prayer, one Ruth Circle member said, "I believe in the power of prayer. So many times, I have prayed, and God has answered me. When I was 14, a childhood friend was really sick, and I prayed so intensely, my prayer was answered." Another Ruth Circle member shared that many of her most intense prayer experiences occur during service, especially before, during and after the meal of Holy Communion. Another member said that she prays in situations where she is out in nature, doing the laundry, or while walking on the track at the fitness club.

Though we may feel at one with God while praying at church or experiencing

the beauty of nature, one of the many beauties about prayer is that it requires no particular

setting, equipment, or uniform. It can occur anywhere. A few iconic situations do come to mind, however, when we consider prayer. "Grace" by Eric Enstrom and "Saying Grace" by Norman Rockwell are paintings depicting their subjects speaking to God before partaking of a meal. We often see illustrations showing a child saying nighttime prayers while kneeling at bedside.

Poet Alfred, Lord Tennyson, wrote, "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of."

Whenever a friend or relative says to me, "I am praying for you," that is the greatest gift and source of solace that I can ever receive. Even though the people who pray for me may or may not be acquainted with Tennyson's words, they are perfectly attuned to his belief.

Martin Luther said it best: "To be a Christian without prayer is no more possible than to be alive without breathing."

Dear Sponsoring Congregations:

This will be the last newsletter from Jim and Carol Sack, as we have finally officially retired from being missionaries with the ELCA on July 31, 2025. Our journey began in September of 1982 when Jim graduated from Luther Seminary and was ordained earlier in June of that year. Carol and Jim both accepted a call to be missionaries in Japan.

After arriving in Japan with our 10-month old son Jonathan, we began two years of Japanese language studies in Tokyo. Those days were filled with many challenges, exciting learnings and a continual life of blessing given to us by God. We were then assigned to go to Saga, in western Japan, where the Lutheran Church began. We served there for four wonderful years, and had the opportunity to be part of establishing "Rainbow House," a bakery for the mentally and physically challenged children in Saga. Rainbow house still exists and has expanded to now include a home where up to about 9 children can live and work. This gives these children meaning in their lives and also provides some income for them. We are thankful to God that this ministry is going full-steam ahead.

Our daughter Bethany was born in Saga. Soon after that Jim was asked to return to the States for further study in counseling, so that he could teach at the Japan Lutheran College and Seminary. After spending four years at Luther Seminary again in St. Paul, we returned to Tokyo and Jim became director of the "Personal Growth and Counseling Center" at the college/seminary. He also taught for 33 years (1992-2025) at the undergraduate school, the graduate school and the seminary in the areas of Clinical Psychology and Pastoral Care and Counseling. Our youngest, Emily was born in the States just before our return to Japan in 1992.

Later from 2000 until 2002, Carol was provided the opportunity by the ELCA to study Music Thanatology in Missoula, Montana. Upon returning to Japan once again, was asked to start a program for training of Japanese in the area of using voice and harp at the bedside of the sick and dying. The 2 year program was called Lyre Precaria, and she trained 38 students over a 12-year period (six 2-year classes.) Five of her graduates are now teaching others them-

selves and the ministry of Pastoral Harp is expanding in Japan.

Even though Carol and Jim were in different areas of ministry, for the last 10 or 15 years or so their paths crossed again and they often worked and taught together in the area of "End of Life." They dealt with death and dying, grieving, as well as ministry to the dying and their families.

We have decided to remain in Japan after retirement and have purchased a very old traditional Japanese thatched-roof farmhouse in Nagano Prefecture. It has taken 2 ½ years to reform the 150-200 year-old home. They will actually be doing some farming in their later years of life.

We want to thank you all for your many, many years of supporting us as missionaries here in Japan. Some of our congregations have been with us since 1992, over 40 years. WOW, what dedication and generosity we have been privileged to receive. From the depths of our hearts, we want to thank you all for making our ministries in Japan a possibility!!!! We certainly have been continually blessed by God through our relationships with you all. Hopefully some of you will think about having a new missionary to sponsor in the future. It is only by being "sent" that missionaries can have ministries throughout the world.

Once again THANK YOU, and may you be supported and blessed in your lives, by our gracious God.

My usual greeting to Marcia was, "And what shenanigans are you up to today?" Marcia would chuckle and we would talk about being raised on a farm, country school, working in the veggie garden, living in NH, and liking cows, plus enduring outdoor toilets in winter!

On a very recent Sunday, we were talking as I walked Marcia to the church door and, somehow, the subject of swearing came up. Marcia stated, "I've been known to let loose with a swear now and then!" I laughed and said, "Well, my father used to swear when the cows got unruly in the barn and frustrated him. When I was little, I thought 'Jesus Christ' was one of our cow's names!" Marcia stopped in her tracks, with a hearty laugh she said, "That's the best one I've heard!" Then she took my arm again, raised her face and said, "Thanks for that laugh today!"
