How will sessions be delivered? There are various types of delivery method and some sessions use more than one format in combination:

Live Zoom Sessions - these sessions are online sessions using Zoom to create a live classroom environment remotely with a tutor and 'audience'/members actively attending the session. After Rome: Between the Romans and the Normans

Abandoned by Rome, told to look to their own defences by the Emperor, the Romano-Britons turned to various mercenaries to help defend their lands against raiders and invaders. Within a few generations, these peoples had become the dominant political group in much of Britain.

Taking influences from Christian Rome, the Irish, and their own mythologies, they created a new and distinct culture.

Beyond the borders of these new peoples were Irish colonisers in Wales, the emergence of the Welsh identity itself, the union of Gael and Pict in the far north.

It was an era of great kings, the struggles between Christianity and paganism, of the foundational myth of the English people.

This was Britain after Rome.

The Geology of Mars

After Earth, Mars may be the most hospitable planet for life in the Solar System, so despite being further away than Venus, it has attracted much scientific attention in recent years. This short course explores the latest findings & stunning imagery coming from our near neighbour.

03 Oct Background

We'll start with a comparison of the geology of Venus, Earth and Mars. From a geological perspective they are very similar, even if their current surface conditions are very different. What do we know about their evolution as planets? A traveller's guide to Mars.

- 10 Oct A Historical Perspective on the Exploration of Mars.

 Next we'll look at the search for life and successful missions and failures. Why have so many
 - missions failed? We'll consider landing in a thin atmosphere, Martian weather, issues with dust etc.
- 17 Oct & 24-Oct Current NASA / ESA Missions and their Findings.
 In this session we'll cover InSight (Interior Exploration using Seismic Investigations, Geodesy and Heat Transport), Mars Atmosphere and Volatile Evolution (MAVEN), Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter, Mars Science Laboratory (Curiosity), Mars Express and Mars Odyssey
- 31 Oct The future Colonisation of Mars.

 What will it take for humanity to establish a permanent base on Mars? We'll

conclude by looking at plans for visiting The Moon in the next few years, thinking about the Moon as a stepping stone on the way to Mars, Elon Musk's ambition to get to Mars and SpaceX's incredible progress.



Understanding the effect of arts participation on cognitive ability, flexibility & longevity, especially at a time when arts funding & education is at risk, is key to properly valuing the impact of musical experience in society on a much broader scale.

Ryan Gray, researcher from Herriot-Watt University specialising in music and Neuroscience, will introduce us to a new project exploring the relationship between musical instrument engagement and singing experience, and the effects these activities have on thinking skills in older age.


Science Course: 14th November to 5th December

Recent Developments in Cosmology

In this series we will be considering a variety of topics of current interest in astronomy and cosmology.

We will begin by giving an update on the various space missions currently exploring the solar system - including the Mars rovers Curiosity and Perseverance, the Juno mission at Jupiter and its moons, as well as the missions to several asteroids.

I have previously shown some of the exciting new images from the long awaited James Webb Space Telescope, and next I will endeavour to give a summary of the latest results and discoveries and how they fit into our current understanding of the wider universe.

In the light of the first image of the supermassive black hole at the centre of our galaxy we will review the history of our understanding of our galaxy - the Milky Way - and look at the latest research allowing us to see its structure better than ever before.

We will also look at some of the latest images of other, more distant galaxies from telescopes around the world.


Tyneside and Italian Unification, 1848-61

A blue plaque in Tynemouth draws attention to the presence of the Italian freedom fighter Guiseppe Garibaldi on Tyneside in 1854. While heavily overselling this business trip to the Tyne, as captain of a coal ship, as an act of political internationalism, it correctly highlights the engagement of the Northeast with wider European freedom movements in the 19th century, including Italian unification.

This short course will provide a brief overview of this, covering the connection between bricks, bombs and biscuits.



Covid in Newcastle: A Photographic Record

Prior to his retirement Tom was a senior director at Newcastle City Council. As such he was closely involved with the city's response to the Covid-19 epidemic and oversaw several of the council's responses.

He therefore had unique access to some of the things that were going on to keep residents safe. As a keen amateur photographer he started taking his camera into work and trying to record what he could.

Once the lockdowns were lifted, he was able to widen this to record something of other organisations responses including, with tightly controlled access, the Hospital Trust.

Over the next two years this built into a unique record of Newcastle's response to Covid and has now been published as a photo book with proceeds going to charity.



The 2021 Teesside Crab Deaths: Why did they happen? Why should we care?

Tutor: Dr John Bothwell

In the autumn of 2021, a large number of dying and distressed crabs were washed ashore along the coastlines of County Durham and Teesside. Initially dismissed as a toxic algal bloom, a re-investigation suggested more complex causes.

At the time of writing, it remains unclear whether the deaths were the result of legacy pollution from Teesside, a novel shellfish disease, or some as-yet-unknown factor.

One of the academics involved in the re-investigation, Dr John Bothwell, phycologist at Durham University and author of 'Seaweeds of the World' (Princeton University Press) will explain the science with which the deaths are being investigated.

He will also explain why the deaths matter, looking forward to think about how the fates of Northumbrian shellfish are forcing us to think about the UK's relationship with the seas and sediments that surround us.



Brian O'Nolan (1911-66) was one of the most significant and mercurial figures in 20th century Irish literature, and a man of many masks. As 'Myles Na Gopaleen' (or na gCopanleen when writing it in Irish) he was the author of a brilliantly satirical column in *The Irish Times*, under which guise he also wrote the Irish language novel, *An Béal Bocht (The Poor Mouth)*. But he is best known for the novels he wrote in English using the pseudonym 'Flann O'Brien'.

The Third Policeman (written 1939-40) is one of his most intriguing works, a strange combination of dreamscape and comic nonsense world, part Lewis Carrol, part Franz Kafka, part James Joyce... and yet with a voice all its own.

It would be helpful if you could read the first two chapters of the novel before the first Session. Text: Flann O'Brien (2007) *The Third Policeman* New York: Harper Perennial. This is available in paperback and kindle and also on Audible.

We will start with *Letter to Brezhnev* (Chris Bernard, 1985), a social-realist film set in Liverpool, which depicts the resilience of a young woman who is determined to escape the devastating effects of Margaret Thatcher's economic policies.

Our second film will be *Atonement* (Joe Wright, 2007), which has been widely hailed as a masterpiece and recounts a crime and its consequences over the course of six decades, beginning in the 1930s.

Our final film will be *Becoming Jane* (Julian Jarrold, 2007), a controversial biographical period drama based on the early life of Jane Austin. Importantly, the film depicts a number of pivotal events in Austen's life - which were largely unknown until relatively recently - and how **Face-To-Face**



During the Enlightenment philosophers, lawyers, and reformers challenged the harsh sentences and tortures by which medieval and early modern rulers punished sinners and criminals. In this period 'classical' criminology appealed to common humanity to deter and, hopefully rehabilitate offenders but what if the criminal resisted reformation?

In the 19th and 20th centuries biological, sociological, and psychological theories would try to explain the 'born criminal', the juvenile delinquent and the insane or psychopathic offender.

More recently, attempts have been made to predict and pre-empt crime before it is even committed.

In following this development, we will explore the changing boundaries of crime and 'normal' behaviour and ask, where do we draw the line between safety and surveillance?




