Advance Reading "<u>An Immense World</u>: How Animal Senses Reveal the Hidden Realms Around Us"

Ed Yong's 2023 book takes us on what Marcel Proust called "the only true voyage . . . not to visit strange lands, but to possess other eyes." It provides an elegant, accessible and compelling survey of work on the sensory worlds of other creatures and fertile ground for philosophical reflection on fascinating issues in metaphysics and the philosophy of mind.

In this course, we will discuss 3 chapters, which highlight the more striking and unfamiliar cases.

Chapter 1: Smells and Tastes Chapter 7: Surface Vibrations Chapter 12: Uniting the Senses

Participants should acquire a copy of the book from their preferred bookseller (eg <u>Hive</u>, <u>WorldofBooks</u>, <u>Waterstones</u>, <u>Blackwells</u>, <u>Amazon</u>) It would be very good to read the whole book before the course starts (you may find it hard to put down!) but at a minimum, participants should ideally read the Introduction before the course starts and then a chapter before the relevant meeting.

Art History One-Off: 29th April

William Bell Scott's Screen: A Pre-Raphaelite Romance

Tutor: Emily Learmont

Venue/Format: This session will be delivered live via Zoom

Time: 12.30 to 13.30



In this session, we will learn about this fascinating piece and its history, 'The King Quair', a beautiful and ornately guilded folding screen and the subject of Emily's 2023 book published by the National Galleries of Scotland.

Inspired by a 15th Century poem attributed to James I of Scotland (featuring his imprisonment at Windsor Castle and relationship with his future wife and queen) the intricately decorated and embellished screen has a fascinating history as an object itself.

Emily Learmont is a Collaborative Doctoral Partnership candidate at the University of Edinburgh and National Galleries of Scotland researching the Edinburgh-born artist, William Bell Scott (1811–1890). She studied Fine Art at the Glasgow School of Art and the Royal Academy Schools, and History of Art, Theory & Display at the University of Edinburgh where she is also now a Teaching Fellow at the Centre for Open Learning. She has exhibited at the Royal Academy and Royal Scottish Academy and has written articles for The British Art Journal. She is also a gallery educator for the National Galleries of Scotland.



Once described as "England's greatest film ever", this Powell and Pressburger war-time satire starred Deborah Kerr and Roger Livesey.

Popular, despite official disapproval, it examines what it means to be English in a time of national crisis.

07 May Gordon Dalton Painting Solastalgia: Depicting the Changing North East Coast through Contemporary Landscape Painting

> The North East coast and its communities have been shaped and heavily influenced by both natural & industrial developments, both bearing their scars and benefits. Gordon will discuss his painting practice and current PhD research into the cause & effects of solastalgia on four sites along the coast in North Yorkshire & Teesside. The concept of solastalgia is described as "the homesickness we feel while still at home. It's the pain and longing we feel as we realize the world immediately around us is changing, with our love for that world serving as a catalyst for action on its behalf."

14 May Joanna Whittle Engaging Archives

Joanna's paintings explore transient rituals concealed within landscapes, creating rich, seductive small-scale paintings, drawing viewers into an uneasy, unpeopled world. The temporary structures depicted sink into flooded land, fragile ruins of the recent past with lights illuminated and the unsettling sense of a recently departed presence. Her shrine works, often painted on to copper, explore themes of memorial; unseen & repeated rituals conducted as acts of mourning. We'll talk about engaging with archives & collections as part of her practice as a painter & ceramicist, discuss projects with the Welbeck Estate, National Fairground & SESSIONS

'Walking Cheerfully': a Brief History of Quakerism in Britain

Quakerism arose from the turmoil of 17th Century England and was a radical Christian movement even for those times. Quakers placed above all other teachings the importance of personal spiritual experience: not Church, nor Scripture, but the 'Light within'. To hold such beliefs was both liberating and dangerous.

Since those first days, the Quakers have met in silent worship, have focused on the testimonies of Truth, Equality, Simplicity and Peace – and have got into serious trouble on occasion. Over the centuries Quakerism has evolved into a liberal and much theologically wider set of beliefs.

These lectures will attempt to outline those beginnings and trace the movement towards Quakerism in Britain as it is today.

Time: 10.30 to 12.30

These four interactive sessions explore life through the rituals involved in the ancient Greek world, using objects from the Shefton Collection of Greek Art and Archaeology. They will provide participants with the opportunity to handle and learn about objects that are not currently on display, and to produce creative responses to the handling experience, led by Dr Sally Waite and Dr Emma Gooch, specialists in Greek Art and Archaeology from Newcastle University.

Inspired by the 'Gods and Goddesses' display case in the Shefton Gallery of the museum, each of the sessions focuses on an object or small group of objects related to divinities and rituals held in the Shefton Collection. Each session will include an introductory presentation about the objects and their collections history, opportunities for handling the objects, and an optional creative activity inspired by them. Absolutely no artistic talent or prior knowledge is required!

The course can be attended as a whole, or each session on a one-off basis.

The Fantastic Filmic Worlds of Karel Zeman (1910 – 1989)

A pioneer in the fields of animation and special effects, Zeman was not only one of the most significant Czech filmmakers of the 20th century, but was admired by the likes of Picasso, Chaplin and Dalí. His award-winning work & techniques, particularly his combination of live-action footage with animation, are still highly regarded and studied at film schools throughout the world. Incorporating a consistent anti-war theme into his films, Zeman's aesthetics have inspired and influenced numerous filmmakers.

- 12 Jun Invention for Destruction (1958) Credited with inventing the steampunk genre, it evokes several works by Jules Verne and tells the story of a gang of pirates who attempt to obtain a secret weapon for an evil Count who wants to attain world domination.
- 19 Jun The Fabulous Baron Munchausen (1962) An absurdist comic-fantasy based on a real person who compulsively exaggerated his own military prowess, making him a figure of fun among the German nobility. In this film, Zeman evokes engravings of French artist Gustave Doré.
- A Jester's Tale (1964) A bold black comedy following the adventures of a ploughboy and a mercenary, press-ganged into service on the battlefields of the devastating Thirty Years' War of 1618-1648. A startlingly inventive film, it is a satire on war, human nature and of the way we perceive history itself.



A Selection from Melville's Piazza Tales

Tutor: Tim Crocker

Venue/Format: These sessions will be delivered live via Zoom

Though best known for his epic masterpiece Moby Dick, Herman Melville also created some of the most original and challenging shorter fictions of the 19th century.

Melville's early novels, Typee (1846) and Omoo (1847) were very popular, but Moby Dick (1851) that extraordinary experimental leviathan regarded by many today as the great American novel, bewildered readers of his own time. Sales of its successor Pierre (1852) did not even cover his advance. And thus it was that, short of money and hoping to restore his place in public taste, for his next venture the writer of epic turned to the smaller canvas of magazine fiction. The tales written for Putnam's Monthly, later collected as The Piazza Tales (1856) would be amongst his most original and challenging.

We will read three: 'The Piazza' (of a house with a view) 'Benito Cereno' (what an American sealer found when it came across a Spanish slave ship) and 'The Encantadas' (a mysterious set of sketches about the 'enchanted' isles: the Galapagos.)

The Piazza Tales can be accessed for free at Project Gutenberg. For a modern annotated edition, you might prefer Herman Melville (2016) Billy Budd, Bartleby and Other Stories with additional text by Peter Coviello.

Please Note: These texts, written before the abolition of slavery, employ language of their time, including some terms that are offensive today.

Elizabeth Bowen wrote that the short story 'is at an advantage over the novel, and can claim its nearer kinship to poetry, because it must be more concentrated, can be more visionary, and is not weighed down (as the novel is bound to be) by facts, explanation, or analysis.' In this session we will consider Bowen's theory by looking at her use of the shortstory form to depict charged moments of vision. We will consider a range of her works, including her war stories of the 1940s and her much-celebrated ghost stories.

Heather Glen, Oxford: Oxford University Press is recommended.
