Leading authority Lindsay Allason-Jones looks at the area south of Hadrian's Wall to demonstrate how recent excavations are beginning to reveal the social landscape wrought by the Roman invasion. The talk uses recent work on the sculpture from the region to shed light on the changes experienced by the inhabitants of the area, whether military or civilian, in their religious and cultural lives.

Reading Wittgenstein 3

Tutor: Ian Ground

Wittgenstein's Philosophical Investigations is acknowledged as one of the very greatest philosophical works of our culture. It is, in many respects, an enjoyable read, free from jargon and technicalities, full of striking remarks, strange stories, and rich examples. But at the same time, it can seem oracular, deeply puzzling and even frustrating.

In this course, we will continue our close reading of the text, moving beyond the early remarks to tackle Wittgenstein's investigations into the private language consideration and his reflections on the meaning of psychological concepts. We will do our best to follow Wittgenstein's advice and go, in philosophy, slowly and not spare the trouble of thinking for ourselves. Newcomers are welcome as the first session will present a recapitulation of the earlier themes.

Participants are advised to have a copy of the text. The more recent translation by Hacker is preferred but the original Anscombe is fine too.


Culture & Society Course: 3rd to 31st October

A History of Ireland 2 - The Age of Conquest: the Normans to the Stuarts

In this Series, we will explore the long, drawn-out process of the conquest of Ireland.

From the rise and fall of the Norman Lords, "more Irish than the Irish themselves", to the Wylde Yrishe causing dissent at Oxford, from tentative Tudor colonisation to the calculated Stuart Plantation of Ulster, it is in this period that we find the roots of the modern Troubles, Anglo-Irish relations, and many identities of the peoples of Ireland.

Recent Developments in Astronomy and Cosmology

In this 5 week series of talks we will be looking at a variety of different topics in astronomy and cosmology. We will include an update on space missions currently exploring the solar system - including the Mars rovers Curiosity and Perseverance, as well as ongoing missions to several asteroids.

The most exciting development of the past year must be the long awaited launch of the James Webb Space Telescope - as I write this in mid-2022 the telescope has been perfectly focused and the various instruments are being extensively tested. This instrument could revolutionise astronomy in the same way that the Hubble Space Telescope has done over the past 30 years. Hopefully by the Autumn there will be many interesting observations to report.

Also in the news recently was the publication of the first image of the supermassive black-hole at the centre of our galaxy - this achievement has been one of the 'holy grails of astronomy' for many years - we will discuss the importance of this image and how it relates to the study of stars and galaxies, as well as helping to refine our fundamental theory of gravity.






Evolution: Is Darwinism Enough?

The early Earth was a completely lifeless place. Today there are millions of species, one of which is our own – Homo sapiens. How did all these species arise, apparently out of nothing?

Humans have been thinking about this question for thousands of years. The early answers lay in the realms of superstition and religion. One of these is provided by the book of Genesis in the Christian and Hebrew bible. But in the last couple of centuries, we also have answers that lie in the realm of science. Some of these have been insufficiently detailed to be of use. Others have had more detail but turned out to be wrong. Just one has been sufficiently detailed to be useful, and has been widely accepted as correct – Darwinism. But is Darwinian natural selection really enough to explain the origin of all species?

In this short course we scrutinize this question, and possible answers to it.

Classical Chinese Poetry: An Introduction

Tutor: Michael Ayton

Format: These sessions will be delivered Face-to-Face

Classical Chinese poetry represents the largest and longest continuous tradition in world literature, its finest poems unsurpassed in their imaginative force and beauty. Nevertheless, faced with an unfamiliar script and the sheer superabundance of texts, readers can struggle for a way in. This course aims to provide just that, with no prior knowledge or reading required.

Beginning with the remarkable *Shih Ching* anthology whose origins are lost in time's mists, we'll consider the famously enigmatic *Tao Te Ching* (compiled C4 BCE) before turning to a magnificent series of individual poets starting with T'ao Ch'ien (365–427 CE) and encompassing the great T'ang writers Wang Wei, Li Po and Tu Fu as well as later Sung poets like Wang An-shih and Su Tong-p'o, much of whose poetry is intimately connected with landscape and the natural world – an eco-poetry many centuries *avant la lettre!* In reading these wonderful poems in a variety of English versions, we'll consider different approaches to translation as a vital part of the poems' modern reception, as well as exploring how ancient Chinese poetry has intertexted excitingly with modern poetry,

especially that of the US 20th century.

No prior reading required. Reference texts will be provided nearer the time.

Literature Course: 26th October to 9th November

How Meaning is Constructed in Films

Tutor: Roger Mitchell

Format: These sessions will be delivered Face-to-Face

Time: 10.30-12.30



The aim of these three sessions is to consider how meaning is created in three very different types of British film. Among other things, we will study the use of setting, lighting, camera-work, editing and sound and assess how these elements both individually and collectively convey a film's narrative.

We will begin with social realism and analyse the film Fish Tank (Andrea Arnold, 2009), a coming-of-age drama about a young female who is desperate to escape from the housing estate where she lives.

The second session will concern historical dramas and will concentrate on the Oscar-winning film The King's Speech (Tom Hooper, 2010), which recounts the story of how King George VI was helped by a speech therapist to overcame a severe speech impediment.

The Third session will concern action films and will focus on the James Bond film Skyfall (Sam Mendes, 2012).

How do poets capture a sense of place or space within a few lines or verses?

This course will offer the chance to do some comparative readings of a wide range of poems that aim to represent a particular kind of place or space.

We will consider how poets use a variety of forms and techniques to capture experiences in different places: on the road; in houses and rooms; in the classroom; travelling by train and in the suburbs of England.

We will cover works from poets such as Philip Larkin, John Betjeman, Gwendolyn Brooks, Ted Hughes, Derek Mahon, Robert Frost, Carol Ann Duffy and Louise Erdrich.

Texts will be supplied nearer the time.

The Polish Jewish writer Bruno Schulz (1892-1942) is sometimes compared with his near contemporary Franz Kafka, but his surreal stories have a wit and pathos all their own, and the short story, 'The Street of Crocodiles' (1934) is a good introduction to his work.

He was also an artist and illustrator and we would also consider some examples of his drawings during the presentation. Sadly, he was a victim of the Holocaust, murdered whilst confined in the Drohobych ghetto.

What shapes our choices? How much control do we have over them? What function does this theme have within the text? How is it explored and portrayed? What do the choices the authors themselves make as writers tell us about their values and society?


Reading Ovid's Metamorphoses in English

Time: 10.30 to 12.00



Written in 15 'books' (or papyrus scrolls) this is a wickedly witty, yet also moving poem with a host of mythological stories, many familiar (Narcissus, Pyramus and Thisbe for example) others not so (Cyparissus for example). Although it is easy to focus on individual stories as if the poem were a mythological compendium, yet it has a some degree of unity from a roughly chronological narrative (from the creation to Rome and Augustus) and especially from the central theme of changes.

Reading three 'books' each week we will explore the poem, looking at the genre, the way in which the myths are incorporated into the narrative and how each metamorphosis is described. Most of all, Ovid's 'wonderful speeches and stories' (Robert Lowell) are here to be enjoyed.

There are a number of easily available translations, but recommended for this course: Ovid Metamorphoses, Translated by David Raeburn, Penguin 2004

Taking the Waters—A History of British Spas

We will be looking at the history of spas in Britain, from Roman baths, pre-Christian and medieval holy wells to the development of fashionable bathing places from the seventeenth century. We'll look at their peak of popularity in the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, how they dealt with competition from seaside resorts, and how they have adapted to modern times.

Examples will range from famous centres like Bath and Harrogate to small regional resorts like Dinsdale on Teesside and the inpropitiously-named border spa of Deadwater.

A connected series of discrete sessions about seminal moments in criticism, when one writer or critic's reading of another signals a major insight or change – sometimes particular to themselves, sometimes encapsulating a much wider cultural shift.

So we might have a session on Wordsworth reading Thomas Gray (signaling a whole new approach to poetry we now call Romanticism), then session 2 on Virginia Woolf's scathing demolition of Arnold Bennett in a manifesto of her own brand of modernism before finishing with D.H. Lawrence reading Thomas Hardy – an exercise which says a lot more about Lawrence himself than Hardy, but is a fascinating insight into a writer in the process of thinking.



(Please read Katie's full text <u>HERE</u>) Representations of historical figures and events reflect the concerns of the societies who created them rather than current archaeological and historical research. History lessons taught in the 1950s and 1960s may not always equip those now in their 60s and 70s to make accurate historical analogies between past and present issues! Often, the past is presented in binary, divisive ways and claims concerning historical identity and origins have been used to support a number of stances, some with devastating results.

How should we be educating children to move away from fixed perspectives and stereotypes, to provide more nuanced versions of the past and encourage more critical thinking and tolerance of difference? How might we challenge those entrenched adult understandings of the past that are used to support divisive political views, and present more balanced accounts and multiple perspectives?

We will take a close look at a specific period, from the Iron Age to the end of the Roman Period in Britain (c. 800 BC – AD 400) and consider how the period has been presented over the last. How do our impressions of the past influence our understanding of current political issues such as invasions, empires, borders, identities, and nationalism? Whose side are you on?

What did the Romans really do for Britannia? Was Boudica a heroine or a mad barbarian?

And what does Star Wars have to do with any of this?
