Wittgenstein's Philosophical Investigations is acknowledged as one of the very greatest philosophical works of our culture. It is, in many respects, an enjoyable read, free from jargon and technicalities, full of striking remarks, strange stories, and rich examples. But at the same time, it can seem oracular, deeply puzzling and even frustrating.

In this course, we will continue our close reading of the text, moving beyond the early remarks to tackle Wittgenstein's investigations into rule-following, meaning and mind. We will do our best to follow Wittgenstein's advice and go, in philosophy, slowly and not spare the trouble of thinking for ourselves. Newcomers are welcome as the first session will present a recapitulation of the earlier themes

Participants are advised to have a copy of the text. The more recent translation by Hacker is preferred but the original Anscombe is fine too.

10.30-11.30 Symbols of Imperial Authority & Extravagance (Ming Dynasty 1368-1644) - Dragons, Phoenixes and other Mythical Creatures

This talk considers the deployment of mythical creatures as indicators of the highest status within the nobility and bureaucracy. Through the examination of surviving examples of textiles indicative of rank and status we will explore the symbolism of power. In contrast the talk will discuss a small group of rare textiles that celebrated key festivals within the Lunar Year and date from the late 16th Century. These textiles are rarely displayed and images come via access to one of the World's finest private collections.

12.00-13.00 The Emperor Yongle (1402-1424) - China's 'Globalist' Emperor

This lecture explores the achievements and legacy of the greatest emperor of the Ming Dynasty, and one of China's most visionary rulers. We will trace Yongle's brutal accession as emperor, the establishment of his total authority, through to his considerable contribution to China's Imperial legacy. In particular consideration will be given to his creation of Beijing as China's Imperial Capital with The Forbidden City at its core. In addition, the epic voyages of The Ming Treasure Fleets under Admiral Cheng Ho will be explored as well as Yongle's role as a Patron of Imperial contemporary art and the

collection of Imperial Artefacts.



In this series, we will explore the unique and complex Irish legal system, the byzantine histories of the major dynasties, the myths of the great saints (such as Patrick), and the impact of the medieval Irish in Britain, France, and Central Europe.

Ireland may have been a most distant shore in the medieval world, but it was deeply connected to the wider intellectual and political trends of the time; the art, culture, and people of this age echo into the modern in ways you might not expect.


Evolution on Earth and Elsewhere

This short course consists of three sessions. The first involves questions about extraterrestrial life. The second examines the key features of evolution on Earth. The third considers which features of evolution here might also be expected to apply on other inhabited planets.

As well as considering evolution from the conventional perspective of adult body forms, which preserve most readily as fossils, we also take an 'evo-devo' perspective, involving the evolution of embryogenesis. This necessitates asking the question of whether development itself is likely to occur broadly in parallel on other planets to the way it occurs on Earth.

Examples include the Biblical epic King of Kings (Nicholas Ray, 1961), which dramatises the life of Jesus Christ; Cold War science fiction film The Day the Earth Stood Still (Robert Wise, 1951); and crisis-of-faith drama Winter Light (Ingmar Bergman, 1963). Taken as a whole, these films underline both the compulsion of humankind to ask itself the eternal questions and the paradoxical power of a visual medium to capture the intangible.




Joseph Campbell and the Hero's Journey

In this course we will look at Campbell's ideas about the 'hero's journey', their huge impact in popular culture, and their philosophical background and implications. We will also look at some of the ways Campbell's work has been questioned, challenged and critiqued.



Mary Wollstonecraft is best known today as pioneering feminist – the author of *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman* (1792) – and as mother of Mary Shelley, author of *Frankenstein*. But one of her richest works is less well known - her travelogue, *Letters written during a Short Residence in Sweden, France and Denmark* (1796) - a milestone both in the history of travel writing and in the movement we now call 'Romanticism'.

In these two sessions we will consider where this account of the adventures of an independent female traveler in remote and sublime Northern landscapes sits in relation to Wollstonecraft's life and work – at the same time uncovering the extraordinary story of what led her to undertake this arduous journey in the first place - a mission involving silver bullion and an arms-running scam!

Advanced reading is not expected, and a pdf of selections of texts will be provided. However, those wishing to do some advance reading will find the text on Project Gutenberg.


