The final spare session gives us some space to extend the discussion as needed and we look forward to our discussions of some fascinating topics.

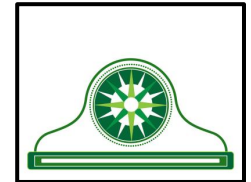
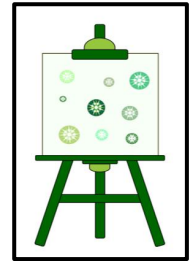

This is the story of how, in just a few generations, Ireland went from a poverty-stricken nation to a global tech-hub.

In this session we welcome Dr Kirsty Lindsay, Associate Professor in Physiotherapy, Department of Sport Exercise & Rehabilitation at Northumbria University.

Low back pain is the leading cause of disability worldwide, with 80% of people experiencing at least one episode of back pain in their life. Back pain is also hard to treat. Unlike our arms and legs, the deep muscles of our spine are only mildly under our control, so exercising them, and rehabilitating them is a challenge.

Space can be used as an accelerator model of aging, whereby changes seen in a 6-month mission to ISS are roughly the same as the changes seen over 10 years on Earth; this means we can use spaceflight to test out new ideas for Earth, helping everyone be healthier and happier.

At Northumbria University they are developing new ways of exercising the deep muscle in the spine, not only in space, but on Earth too. Zoom in to find out more about this research from the comfort of your home, no spacesuit required.

Wagner's Twilight of the Gods: An Apocalypse Like No Other

Last, longest, and in many ways darkest of the operas making up Wagner's Ring tetralogy, *Götterdämmerung* (Twilight of the Gods) exerts a fascination that time has done nothing to diminish. The first of the operas to be conceived but the last to be composed, it draws significantly on the medieval German Nibelungenlied in terms of action and atmosphere, but also embodies material from Eddic lays and the *Völsunga* saga, and ends with a mighty musical depiction of apocalypse that echoes the Ragnarök (Doom of the Powers) of Norse mythology.

In examining this tremendous work in relation to these sources, we'll address the urgent questions surrounding its ending that have always struck audiences. With the ring back with the Rhine Daughters, why do the gods have to die? Why does Brünnhilde immolate herself? Does Alberich survive the final conflagration? And above all: did Wagner expect his audiences to leave the Ring with an optimistic or pessimistic view of the prospects for the future of humanity?

'A' is for Apple: A Guilt-Free Introduction to Milton's Paradise Lost

For over two centuries John Milton's epic poem was considered an essential experience for the cultured reader of literature. But from the sublime language of its opening Invocation, to the density of literary allusions and daunting length, *Paradise Lost* (1667) has rather intimidated generations of modern readers. Yet this classic work remains a dynamic and compelling text which speaks directly to many of the issues which resonate in our own time, including; what is the proper balance between independence and duty to others; how do we discern reliable knowledge from the unreliable; and what – if any – are the differences between the genders.

This short course will offer an inviting way into the epic. Through discussion of key passages, we will encounter the text's major themes, explore its cultural contexts, and grapple together with some of its more searching questions.

17 Nov 'The pinnacle of human expression': Beethoven's Late String Quartets

Beethoven's late quartets are frequently described in quasi-religious language speaking of grace and transcendence, yet these intense, inwardly-searching works by a composer now almost totally deaf also body forth the extremes of purely human feeling: resignation, humour, irony, yearning, anger, intimacy. We'll ponder this paradox while listening to a complete performance of the B-flat quartet Opus 130, including the Grand Fugue, which Stravinsky called 'an absolutely contemporary piece of music that will be contemporary forever'.

24 Nov György Kurtág, Messages of the Late Miss R. V. Trousova

The great Hungarian composer György Kurtág celebrated his 100th birthday in February. Intense, elliptical, fragmented, yet strangely radiant, his music regularly thrills audiences, including at the Glasshouse earlier this year. We'll listen to a pungent solo song cycle of his from 1976–80, featuring an extraordinary array of vocal techniques and effects, along with a colourful chamber ensemble including a favourite instrument of the composer, the cimbalom.

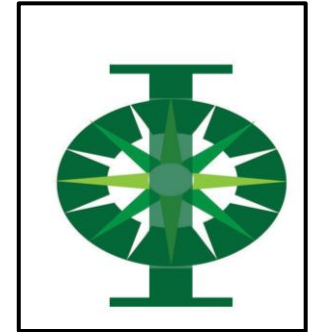
The History of Rome from the Kings to the Emperors

What are 'Screwball Comedies'?

'Screwball Comedies' are fast-talking, romantic farces that first emerged in Hollywood in the mid-1930s at the height of the Great Depression. Combining silliness and sophistication, they mixed escapism with a light social critique, lampooning the upper-classes (and their excessive wealth) as well as the rigid social standards of the time. Importantly, they also helped shape the cultural image of the independent "new woman," informed by women's expanded roles in public life in the aftermath of suffrage.

- 25 Nov Midnight (Mitchell Leisen, 1939) With a script co-written by Billy Wilder, the film stars Claudette Colbert as an out-of-work American showgirl who finds herself stranded in Paris and ends up posing as Hungarian royalty to assist in a complex game of romantic deception ...
- 02 Dec Bringing Up Baby (Howard Hawks, 1938) This film tells the story of a mild-mannered palaeontologist (Cary Grant) who gets caught up in a series of predicaments with an assertive, free-spirited heiress (Katherine Hepburn) and a leopard named Baby...
- 09 Dec The Lady Eve (Preston Sturges, 1941) With a script that managed to circumvent the strict censorship of the time, the film stars Barbara Stanwyck as a con-artist who targets a socially awkward brewery heir played by Henry Fonda...

Midland Writings: Three Genres

The Midlands are a part of England often perceived vaguely, spaces of uncertain boundaries and unclear identities. In this course, we bring this area into focus through three genres of writing. We will analyse Jon McGregor's powerful and compassionate 2017 novel set in Derbyshire's Peak District, *Reservoir 13*. Contrasting with this, we will study the style, and purpose, of a memoir of a Midland childhood in Nigel Slater's thought-provoking and brilliantly structured 2003 work *Toast: The Story of A Boy's Hunger*. Finally, we will be considering the remarkable and radiantly delivered poetry of Liz Berry. Together, we shall hear what three voices have to say from East and West Midland settings.

Reform Without Revolution: British Democracy, 1832-1932

Between 1832 and 1932, Britain was transformed from a state in which fewer than one in thirty adults could vote into a mass democracy with universal suffrage. Yet this transformation was rarely intentional. Time and again, the politicians who extended the franchise did so not necessarily to achieve democracy but rather to manage pressure, neutralise opponents, or to preserve the essentials of the existing order. The result was a political system that changed enormously and yet remained, in many respects, remarkably continuous.

This series traces that paradox across a century of reform. It asks not just who got the vote and when, but what difference it actually made: to the way parliament operated, to the relationship between government & governed, to the policies the state pursued, and to the parties that competed for power. It also asks who remained excluded - women, the Irish, the poorest - and what that tells us about the limits of British democracy. Each talk takes a pivotal moment of political crisis as its starting point, using it to open outward into bigger questions about power, representation and democratic change.
