Stories from the Field...

South Central Medical Home Initiative for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs

I'm a single parent to four children. My youngest child is diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder. I was referred to Family CT by Infoline 211 and a Yale New Haven Hospital Social Worker. At first, I was very hesitant because I did not want another agency, another individual in my life, in my home. My life was very full, with doctor appointments, therapy appointments, and other services to assist me with the best care for my son. Yet after being accepted, and meeting and developing a relationship with my Care Coordinator, I was relieved; It was like a breath of fresh air. We worked together to implement a Care Plan that meets the needs of my son and my family. My Care Coordinator is supportive, has a flexible accommodating schedule and she is compassionate. I'm grateful for this Care Coordination program - it is vital for our community.

What I see that doesn't work is the referral waiting process. I was persistent in calling weekly to inquire whether my son's name was on the waiting list. What can be improved is an overall national concern: more funding.

What I see that works is when you have dedicated workers who are REAL and have a passion for meeting the families they work with right where they are emotionally, mentally, spiritually, educationally, socially, economically, and physically.

I want to say thank you to the Department of Public Health, without whom this program would not help the many families it does on a consistent basis. I also want to say thank you to Family Centered Services of CT.

I would like to leave two quotes to encourage all to take with them as they go into the community daily - and let you know that your services are needed and appreciated - even when it seems like a hectic day.

Stories from the Field...

The Teen Outreach Program

During an ice breaker with my eighth-grade students, a seemingly amiable boy says to me, "I got shot before." When the students around him saw the noticeable disbelief and uncertainty spread across my face, another boy in the class, who had just stated that he hates being black, told his friend to show me the scar. It was confirmed, by the still-purple entry and exit scars halfway between his knee and ankle, that he was shot. By a very real gun.

The shooting took place on a Saturday afternoon, where he had been playing sports with his friends. He is not affiliated with a gang. He was not loitering around or doing drugs past curfew. He was practicing his moves when a bullet, intended for someone else, landed him in Yale New Haven Hospital's emergency department. Someone else in the class, a girl who had overheard the conversation, said that her family is fleeing their house after a recent drive-by shooting occurred and the intended victim ran through their home to escape the bullets. The same boy from before said that his family was moving, too, because his parents had just found out that it was formerly used as a 'trap house' by one of the city's most perilous gangs.

You don't have to spend much time in the Elm City before you are overwhelmed by the magnitude of the disparity. One hundred yards behind Yale's infamous, iconic, breathtakingly beautiful campus lays a book bank that provides free tutoring to local students. On the wait list for these services includes middle schoolers who cannot read the words mat vs. mate. Middle school boys who will ask you on a date, but cannot even spell the word.

We know that the determinants of health, things like your physical environment, socioeconomic status, and exposure to violence and crime, things that you are born into, without a choice, determine your health. I am determined to affect change, for my community, for my students, who don't even believe that change is possible. Because in what world is it okay for a child, who isn't yet capable of growing armpit hair, to get shot?

Jennifer is now working full time as a nurse in a cardiologist's office, and Andi is now three, and registered for preschool. Jennifer is incredibly grateful for the opportunities NFN provided her.
