
## Welcome, Laura!

## Stories from the Field

When I tell most people that I work with 8th graders, or thirteen and fourteen year olds, people generally cringe and question my sanity, or on a good day, tell me that I'm brave and must have the patience of a saint.

For some reason, this particular age group has gotten somewhat of a bad rap, but hormones aside, I would argue that they are the best to work with for the two simple reasons: that they are old enough to be trusted with some independence, but are young enough to still be so impressionable.

It's been only one week since our students have successfully completed the Teen Outreach Program, or TOP, and have graduated the 8th grade. This specially designed positive youth development program helps at-risk kids learn to navigate the sticky, "rite of passage" situations that arise in middle school and high school, as well as address some of the other challenges that are unique to living in urban cities like Bridgeport and New Haven.

The insurmountable success that has happened from the beginning of the school year until now can be measured in many ways. For some students, it's as simple as showing a smile, or making eye contact during a friendly conversation. For other students, it's staying after school or giving up a Saturday morning to work on a community service learning project - something that was once strongly detested, but is now loved. And then for the students that will always hold a special place in my heart, it's feeling supported enough to speak candidly about those challenges that I had previously mentioned, and brave enough to ask for help.

Some departing words from my students include things like, "Every Wednesday and Thursday, you came to our school with a smile on your face and a kind word for us," or, from my student who graduated with a multitude of medals and a most improved award, but without a single family member to witness him, "Thank you to all of my teachers for always trying to push me to become a better person. You guys are my role models and I wouldn't be who I am today without you. You made me ready to face any challenge, and I can't thank you enough for being there when I needed it."

My students' resiliency is inspiring and humbling, and I am forever grateful to work for a program that truly makes a difference in the lives of kids.
