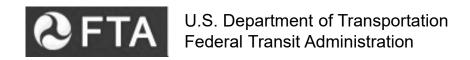

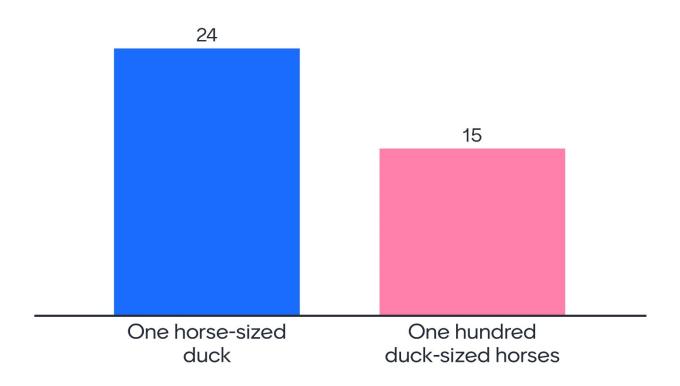

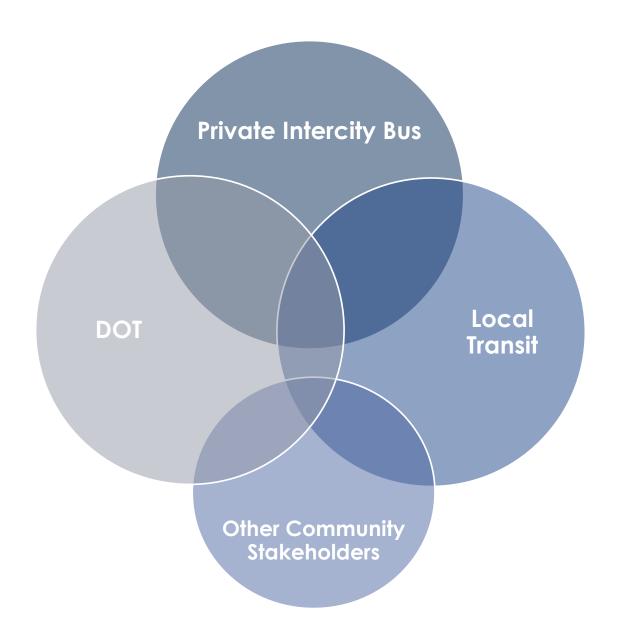
...OR WHY DO WE DO THIS?

History, Purpose, National Objectives
In many states, intercity bus service is a vital link
between otherwise isolated rural communities and
the rest of the nation. Historically, major intercity
bus carriers abandoned less productive routes.
Patronage generated in rural areas, however,
appears to be important to the continuing viability
of the remaining intercity routes.

Objective 1: to support the connection between rural areas and the larger regional or national system of intercity bus service.

Objective 2: to support services to meet the intercity travel needs of residents in rural areas.

Objective 3: to support the infrastructure of the intercity bus network through planning and marketing assistance and capital investment in facilities.



COLLABORATION:

The development of intercity bus service under the FTA 5311(f) program as well as feeder services results from a collaborative effort between Private Intercity Bus carriers, DOT's and local transit, supported by community engagement though MPOs, RTPOs, and other local stakeholders

Implementing a program is not linear, but does follow a certain progression

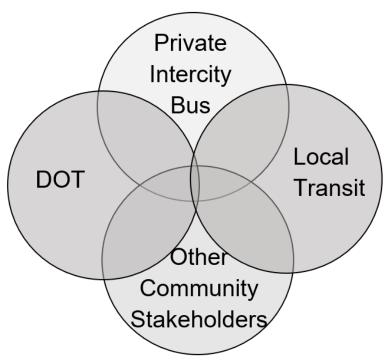

FTA requirement – there are questions about it in the State Management Review

State must conduct every four years if it intends to certify no unmet intercity need

Process can include:

Study of available services and needs

Surveys of intercity bus operators, local/regional transit operators, rural and metropolitan planning organizations

Inventory of Current Services

Survey of Private Intercity Operators: Information requested:

Services provided, interlining, etc.

Unmet service needs-route, frequency, schedule changes, possible connections-service expansion

Vulnerable existing services- potentially subject to abandonment

Facility/capital needs

Marketing/information

Other issues

Provide opportunity for one-on-one meeting or interview to discuss unmet needs and issues without all competitors present

Group "consultation" meetings may be more appropriate when solicitations/applications or RFPs are issued

STUDY/ CONSULTATION

Consultation Process— Stakeholder Surveys

Local/regional version of process is best practice, ex. regional on-line meetings

Use of advisory/steering committee

Involve RPO/MPOs

Link to coordinated plan process?

Other organizations—veterans, tribal, etc.

STUDY/ CONSULTATION

Consultation
Process—
Stakeholder Input

Include in study reports

Document results - memo or report

Reflected in grant solicitations or RFPs

If state certifies no unmet needs, justification for not responding to consultation input or rationale for partial certification—have ready if requested!

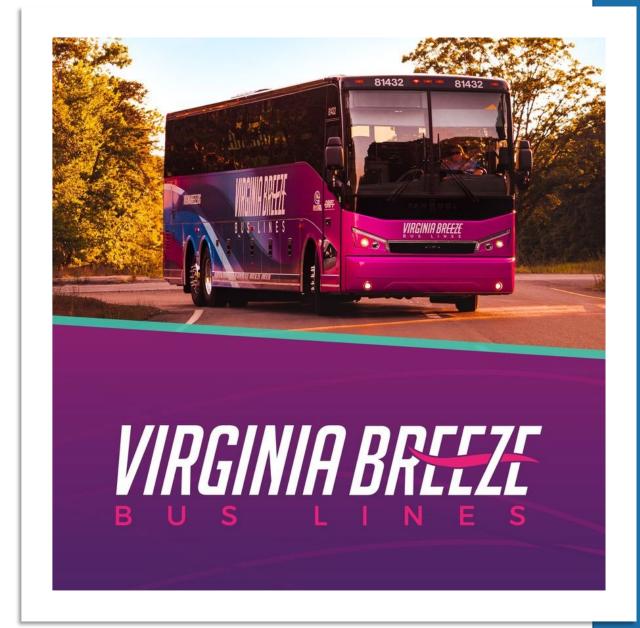

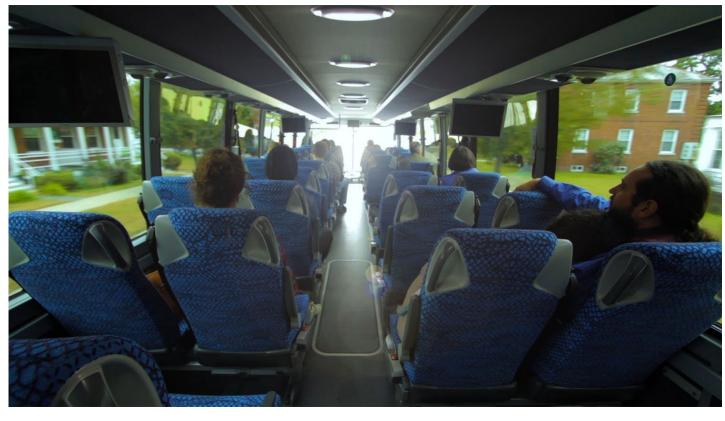






Vermont Public Transit Intercity Bus Program

Current Transit Program in Vermont

Approximately \$36 million annual budget - **68%** from state funds or "flexed over" from FHWA funds.

7 providers serving 255 municipalities from 15 facilities with 616 employees. Approximately 15,900 riders per day.

Our budget allows for some investments and innovations that would not be possible without the legislative and admin support. Our Trip Planner, Statewide AVL, and Job Access program are examples. ICB service, too!

ICB Services Subsidized Routes: Boston - Montreal Burlington — Albany White River JunctionSpringfield, MA

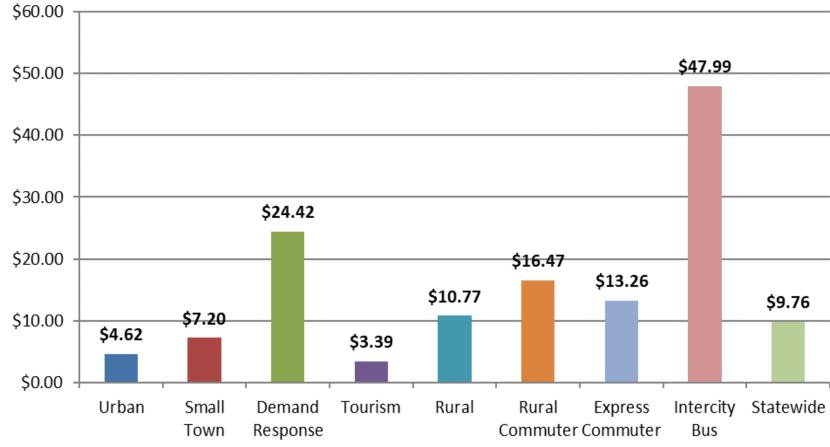

Using Greyhound's Feeder In-Kind Miles for Non-federal Match

> 15% of CARES Act and ARPA funds are obligated for ICB

ICB Issues



- > 5311(f) minimum of 15% of Ops going toward ICB
- Using Greyhounds Feeder In-Kind Miles for non-federal Match
- Additional 5311 Formula funds (Reauth) may change the budget percentages/needs
- Multi-modal Connectivity

ICB Plans



- Restarting ICB (and Amtrak) on July 19th.
 - Improved service along our Western Corridor.
 - Not restarting an underperforming route.
 - Boston-Montreal restarting once the border opens.
- Preparing for changes due to market changes, Re-auth, etc.

- ▶ 15% of 5311 formula No State Funds
- Operating / Intercity are mixed in the application and they choose the % split
- We confirm the miles allocated to Intercity Bus

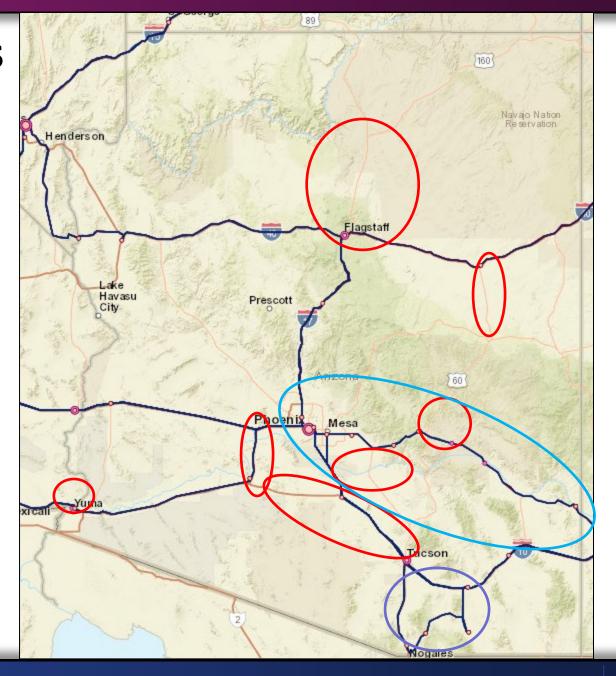

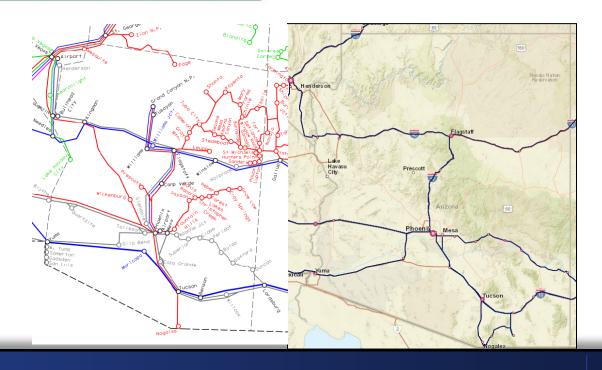

Working with 3rd party contractors was a key issue for me

From Kaycee: For DRPT: was the I-81 corridor served by any providers prior to the launch of your service?

Through our competitive grant application solicitation process, statewide coordinated planning and studies

We meet with all of our contracted providers both individually and as a group at least quarterly and as issues arise. When we conducted our 2019 Intercity Bus study we did a lot of community stakeholder outreach as well.

Does anyone know of resources on the design of ICB?

Sara-I had question about how other states manage ICB networks and funding so thank you for sharing!

We reach out to the Intercity Operators. We have called private providers and emailed and set up outreach, we have set up meetings individually and also together.
