ENVIRONMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

- 139 community visits.
- Our Environmental Public Health Officer conducted 26 inspections this quarter, which included 22 inspections of community care settings and food establishments, 4 housing units and 2 new septic system installations.
- During this period, 8 boil water advisories were issued and 8 were rescinded.
- Our team notified 94 food, health and Important consumer recall notices/warnings to all communities we service.
- The team compiled an Annual Water Quality report on each community that contained supplementary information. 9 out of 10 of the communities were provided this report.
- Our team continued to provide supplies for all 10 First Nations community water operators for in-house testing.
- There was 4 community group projects this quarter.

- To acknowledge the efforts of the community COHI aides, the COHI team celebrated the holiday season by hosting a Christmas luncheon at La Place Rendezvous with the aides on November 30, 2023. We were grateful to have Lavana Fox join us for a traditional opening and lead us through a dream catcher making workshop.



INDIGENOUS MIDWIFERY HIGHLIGHTS

• Four families have been supported in traditional Midwifery care since contracted services to Anishinaabe families and communities in Southern Treaty #3 started in August 2023.

In December 2023, we celebrated the birth of the first baby to be supported by the Indigenous Midwifery program at Giishkaandago'lkwe Health Services.

Words from Elaine Ross, Anishinaabe Elder Midwife:

Juanita wanted to know more about my services and asked if I could be her midwife. She presented me with asema as this is Anishinaabe way of asking and I accepted. We continued on with texts and visiting while letting me know her interactions with her Doctor. We spoke about her challenges and how to overcome or address them with diet and exercise. I was also able to provide her with raspberry tea leaf to help her through.

I helped advocate for services through her band and to assist while she was sent to Fort Frances, 1.5 hours away from her home during Christmas. I too stayed in Fort Frances during Christmas to be close if she needed and for delivering. We were in constant contact during this time as her body started to show signs of labor. We were able to see the Doctor and make hospital visits to check her progress. She was very excited but concerned and I continued to encourage her while in labor. We were able to have her family at the hospital which seemed to help so much. It was amazing how quickly she was able to progress and deliver her son. I sang welcoming song and stood back so the family could celebrate and embrace their new son. I am always so impressed with this moment and feel truly blessed with this ceremony of birth.

LAND BASED COUNSELLORS HIGHLIGHTS

- Land Based Program has delivered land based programming within communities, at Behavioural Health Services, as well as collaborated to support services at the Mino Ayaa Ta Win Healing Centre clients during treatment and with after care planning and support services.
- The Land Based Counsellors have worked to support Cultural Community Support Worker led initiatives and broader agency initiatives.
- The Land Based Counsellors have responded to specific community requests to deliver programming in community such as:
 - Canoe Support, Land-Based Wellness Walks, CFN Canoe Training, RRFNS 150th Celebration Canoe Trip, Community Networking, Community Networking, Overdose Awareness Walk, Manoomin Harvest (Ricing), Smoked Tea Gatherings, Hunting (workers only)/Gathering and Cedar Bath Ceremonies (September 18, 19).
- At Behavioural Health Services, Land Based Counsellors supported Full Moon Ceremonies, Women's Drumming, Men's Drumming and supported preparation for the Sweat Lodge Ceremonies coordinated by the Cultural Community Support Worker.
- Both Land Based Counsellors Supported the Let's Talk Recovery Gagizhebaa Wiisinidaa
 Breakfast Buddies Program delivered July, August, and September.

SOCIAL EMERGENCY COORDINATOR HIGHLIGHTS

- Fire Prevention Week: The Social Emergencies program provided a total of 220 Smoke Detectors throughout each of the communities.
 - Each included a Fire Escape Plan template and Smoke Alarm safety tips (220 total).
- Winter Readiness Campaign: Social Media posts were shared to raise awareness about winter hazards.
 - o 10 Vehicle Roadside Safety kits were provided to each of the 10 communities (100 total).
- Maamawi' Wiiji'ididaa Addiction Awareness Summit: The summit was held in Couchiching
 First Nation and Rainy River First Nations with 368 participants. The event brought together
 community members, elders, individuals in recovery, those struggling with active addiction
 and service providers to share stories of addiction and recovery.
 - Naloxone Kits, Fentanyl Testing Strips and Personal Hygiene products were provided to those in need.
- Distribution of Automated External Defibrillator: 11 AED's were supplied to communities in need by the social emergencies program.
 - These AED's were placed in buildings currently without and/or to replace existing broken machines.

MEMENGWAAWAG ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING HIGHLIGHTS

- Labour Trafficking Presentation and Mobile Clinic:
 - The Memengwaawag Program brought in the FCJ Refuge group for a Service Provider Training and Mobile Clinic for migrant workers.
- International Day to Eliminate Violence Against Women:
 - The Memengwaawag Program hosted a Women's Sharing Circle with an Elder and Women's Hand Drummers in attendance.
- Community Outreach:
 - Supports and resources were offered at two local locations that are known to have a high traffic of vulnerable and at-risk individuals. Personal Hygiene Supplies, Food and Human Trafficking Resources were provided to over 20 current and/or potential service users.
- Outreach Christmas Dinner:
 - 45 hot Christmas Dinners were delivered to The Family Center where transient individuals attend for shelter. Guests received a full Christmas Dinner, Crafts, and a specialized Christmas card with the signatures of the BHS Staff. Our Cultural Coordinator Carla Sutherland attended and set up a smudge table for all guests to utilize.
- Development of Supportive Documentation:
 - A Human Trafficking Full Assessment was created and developed for all service users to receive training on assessing victims of Human Trafficking.
