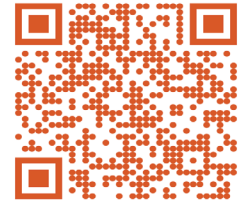

# From Lab Manager to Leader: Jacob Miller Steps into Superintendent Role at Bethel Park Wastewater Treatment Plant

After nearly two decades of dedicated service, **Jacob Miller** has officially stepped into the role of Superintendent at the Bethel Park Wastewater Treatment Plant—a position he's prepared for since 2006 when he first began work there.

"I came to my initial position at the plant from a smaller facility where I was a lab tech and operator," he recalls. "The role at Bethel Park was a more advanced position, and at the time, Pennsylvania was just launching its lab accreditation program. I got our lab accredited right away."

His early work focused on water testing, compliance with NPDES permits, and the microscopic world of "bugs"—the beneficial organisms that help treat wastewater. "It's all about calculations, biology, and making sure what goes back into the stream from our Treatment Plant supports the environment," Miller said. "We don't sterilize the water—it still contains nutrients and organisms that are vital to Piney Fork and Peters Creek."

Now, as Superintendent, Miller is leading a team of nine employees—most with 25+ years of experience. "I've worked here 19.5 years, and I think the team is behind me. They all congratulated me, and I'm grateful for that support."

The Bethel Park Wastewater Treatment Plant treats an average of 4.92 million gallons of water daily, using gravity-based systems, biological tanks, UV disinfection, and digesters to remove solids. "It's a well-run plant," he said. "The previous Superintendent did a great job before me. I'm not planning to make major changes right away, but I'm interested in exploring new testing methods and technologies—AI is a hot topic right now."

Outside of work, Miller is a devoted husband to Amber and a proud father of two daughters, ages 10 and 8. He's also an avid outdoorsman who loves to hunt, fish and hike. "Growing up, I couldn't speak correctly and had therapy to help me. I started college in speech therapy, but after a year, I switched to environmental studies because that's where my heart was," he said.

He credits his grandmother Barbara, who's 98 now, for finding his first internship at the Cranberry Wastewater Treatment Plant that launched his career in the industry. "Our running joke is that I still owe her paycheck!" he said.

From Cranberry, he went on to be a geographical researcher for Flood Zone Determination Services and next a laboratory technician/plant operator for the Chippewa Township Sanitary Authority before coming to the Bethel Park Plant.

Miller's passion for environmental stewardship runs deep. "I really love the environment and doing my best to preserve it. This plant gives me that opportunity. I'm excited about my new position, and the exciting challenges ahead such as new testing methods, permits, and learning more about emerging contaminants like PFAS (*forever chemicals*), and the evolving science of water treatment."

He holds a bachelor's degree in environmental studies from the University of Pittsburgh and is a Licensed Wastewater Plant Operator, Class B, subclass 1 and 2 as well as a Registered Laboratory Manager.

Congratulations to Jacob Miller on this well-earned promotion. Bethel Park is lucky to have a leader who blends technical expertise, environmental passion, and a deep respect for the community he serves.

# TRI-COMMUNITY SOUTH EMS

## A Message from Tri-Community South EMS

Historically we have the most snowfall in February, but Mother Nature starts when she wants. Every year people die of a heart attack during or just after snow removal. So, here are some **tips to keep in mind when shoveling**:

- Wait about an hour after waking up to reach for your shovel. Most heart attacks occur early in the morning.
- Layer up with a few thin layers. This will keep you warmer than one thick layer and you can remove a layer, as needed, to avoid overheating.
- Wear a scarf to cover your mouth, head and neck so that warm air hits your lungs first when you breathe in.
- Be sure boots and gloves are waterproof to avoid dampness.
- Drinking plenty of water helps the heart pump blood to the muscles more easily so your heart doesn't have to work as hard.
- Eat a light meal vs a heavy meal before shoveling. Heavy meals divert your blood from your heart to your stomach.
- Stretch before heading out.
- Pace yourself by shoveling in 10-15 minute clips.
- Try *pushing the snow* instead of lifting it. When lifting, bend your knees and use your legs, not your back.
- Call 911 right away for any unusual signs and symptoms, such as chest pain, dizziness or shortness of breath that may suggest a heart condition.

A reminder when calling **911** – be prepared to give your name, gender of the person affected, age, what the issue is and your location – being as specific as possible. Stay on the phone with the **911** personnel until help arrives.

## Tis the Season!

### A Message from Outreach Teen & Family Services

While we mostly think of these days as a time of joy and good tidings, they can also be filled with stress and triggers, especially for those who are already coping with emotional struggles.

Mental Health America reports that 21 million American adults, and another 3.7 million youth (ages 12-17), are affected by major depression each year. Despite the pervasive nature of depression, harmful myths abound that prevent people from seeking support. Increased awareness about depression can help all of us to be more aware this holiday season.

The misconception that depression manifests from a particular cause or always reveals itself as “feeling sad” are myths. In reality, depression is not always a cause-and-effect phenomenon, nor can it be defined simply as sadness. More aptly put, depression is a prolonged state of general malaise and hopelessness that is often accompanied by physical symptoms. Around the holidays, these symptoms can increase and be disguised as your typical holiday blues.

Family togetherness is a common source of tension during the holidays, but it's important to remember that people who don't have family to share the festivities with are vulnerable, as well. The messages we see on social media at this time of year – that everyone is happily shopping for presents, sharing meals together and celebrating – can serve as triggers and painful reminders for those who feel left out.

Similarly, feelings of anxiety and grief can also increase this time of year. It can be hard to reconcile pain and worry with the joyful, happy sights and sounds of the holidays – Feelings of helplessness and hopelessness do not mix well with songs urging us to be “merry” and “bright.” As a result, most

people experience a pressure to conform to the collective emotional norm and may be hesitant to share about their current struggles.

This year, as a gift to ourselves and to everyone near and dear, let's embrace both the joy and the stress that co-mingle – We cannot lose sight of the very real fact that both seemingly opposing feeling states are in fact a normal and healthy part of this time of year. In the spirit of the season, we would do well to remember that being loving to ourselves and others is perhaps the greatest gift of all.

#### Be sure to take care of yourself by:

- Sleeping, eating and exercising as you normally would.
- And just as our bodies need looking after, we must also prioritize our emotional well-being throughout all the hustle and bustle.
- Take timeouts when you need them and put into practice your go-to stress relievers – Meditate, read, watch your comfort show, go for a walk, take a nap.
- Equally as important, pay attention to your loved ones, friends and co-workers – Check-in, ask questions, take the time to make someone else feel appreciated by gifting them with your attention and energy.

This time of year can be uplifting and renewing, but it is also taxing and may evoke stress, sadness and anxiety. Tis the season to remember life is dynamic and ever changing. What we see as a problem today, may be a guideline we use to mark change tomorrow. Best wishes for the holidays and for 2026!

The annual "Shop with a Cop" event at SHV Macy's gave us the opportunity to take a local family on a \$250 shopping spree for new school clothes and supplies.

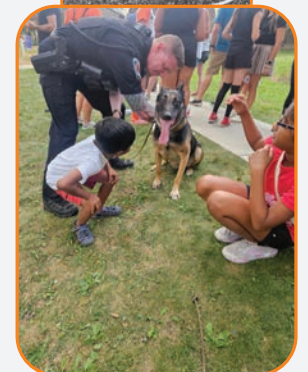
We then "stuffed a bus" with supplies at the BP Farmers' Market to help our local classrooms thrive.

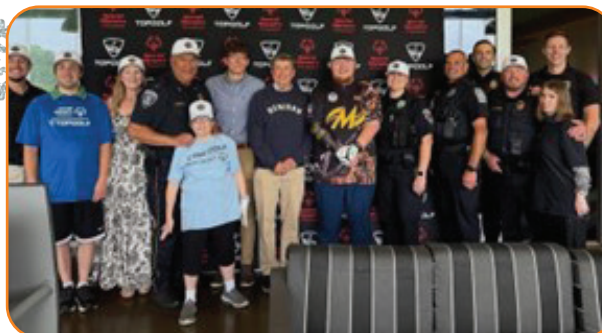

# BP VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY

## Bethel Park Residents to Call 9-1-1 for the Fire Department



As of Nov. 3, 2025, the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company ("BPVFC") is being directly dispatched by Allegheny County 911 for all emergency calls. Allegheny County 911 will handle all incoming emergency calls and directly dispatch the BPVFC. Additionally, the BPVFC will collaborate with our neighboring mutual aid services on a shared channel, which will enhance engagement with other response agencies. The Bethel Park Dispatch Center will continue to operate as a ring-up center, receiving and dispatching police and serving as a local point of contact for residents at the municipal building.

### What do you as a resident need to do?

Individuals and businesses who have a fire alarm system currently monitored by the Bethel Park Dispatch Center and wish to have it connected directly to the Allegheny County 9-1-1 Center should contact their alarm company and update the dispatch number to **412-473-3370**. The quickest way to get the fire department through your alarm company is to change the number the alarm company calls to the 412-473-3370 number. It is important to note that updating your fire alarm number to the County 9-1-1 Center is not a mandatory requirement. You retain the option to continue using the existing number, **412-833-2000**. If you choose this option, our Bethel Park Dispatcher will continue to receive your alarm calls and relay them to the county for dispatch.

### What changes will residents notice?

Other than calling 9-1-1 for fire department response, residents should experience no difference in services. The move was seamless and will improve overall fire department operations.

# A Message from the Fire Chief: Dave Gerber



Last year we did not experience many snow storms, but I would like to thank the residents who took it upon themselves to shovel out their neighborhood fire hydrants. I would also like to ask that other residents do the same this year as it will save firefighters drastic time searching for hydrants that may be needed if your house is on fire.

In November, everyone changed their clocks, so **you should have also changed the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.** If you have not changed your batteries, be sure to take the time to do so now! As you are changing the batteries, check to see if there is a sticker on your detector stating the date of manufacture. Smoke detectors are typically good for 10 years and carbon monoxide detectors are usually good for 7 years. A detector older than that may not be reliable.

Below I have also included several safety tips to help keep you safe this winter. Many of these are issues that we encounter in this community every year.

## WINTER FIRE SAFETY TIPS

### Candles



Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires – and home fire deaths. **December is the peak month for home candle fires.**

Over half of home candle fires start because the candle is too close to something that will burn. More than one third of candle fires begin in the bedroom. Avoid using candles in the bedroom or other areas where people

may fall asleep. The majority of candle fires result from human error and negligence.

Following these simple tips could help save your life.

- If you do use candles, ensure that they are in a sturdy holder and placed where they cannot be easily knocked down.
- Put candle holders on a stable, uncluttered surface.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down – put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
- Set a good example by using matches, lighters and fire carefully.
- And NEVER leave burning candles unattended!

### Carbon Monoxide

Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely.

In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide. A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. **Test CO alarms at least once a month and replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.** If the CO alarm sounds, immediately go outside to fresh air and keep your windows and doors in the house closed. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for, call the fire department and wait outside for them to arrive.

During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.

If you need to warm a vehicle, be sure to remove it from the garage



immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open.

Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO also so they should only be used outside. Other ways to prevent CO conditions from occurring is to have your heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in.



## HOLIDAY DECORATING

Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious. Almost one third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems. A heat source too close to the tree causes more than one in every five of the fires.

*Have a safe and happy holiday*

*season by following these safety tips!*

### Trees

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.
- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green; needles are hard to pull from branches and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.
- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and radiators. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to check the stand daily to ensure it is filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of walkways and do not block doorways.

### Lights

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, which indicates conformance with safety standards.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections, and throw out damaged sets.
- Always follow manufacturer's recommendations as to how many sets can be plugged in together.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples, not nails or tacks, to hold strings in place or run strings of lights through hooks or clips (*available at hardware stores*).
- If you want to be especially safe, turn off all lights when you go to bed or leave the house. This eliminates the risk of lights shorting out and starting a fire.
- For added electric-shock protection, plug outdoor electric lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCIs can be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.

### Heating

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths?

With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

Chimneys and vents should be cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional every year. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 ft. away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Never use your oven to heat your home!

Portable space heaters should be plugged directly into an outlet and not an extension cord. Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.

Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

If you are a renter, your landlord is legally required to provide a dwelling temperature of at least 68 degrees Fahrenheit when the outside temperature is 10 degrees or above, or at least 61 degrees when the outside temperature is below 10 degrees. If they refuse to do so, call the Allegheny County Health Department at **412-350-4046**, who will ensure they comply with County law.

And finally, **TEST YOUR SMOKE ALARMS MONTHLY!!!**

While embracing generosity, we must also prioritize safety. The holidays come with unique risks. It is important to be aware of the dangers to help protect yourself and your family.

### Home and Property Safety

- Secure all doors and windows even if leaving home briefly.
- Avoid displaying gifts near visible windows to deter theft.
- If you are traveling, ask a trusted neighbor to collect your mail or have your mail held by the post office.
- Timers for lights are a good idea to make your home look occupied.
- Fire safety is another key consideration. Throw away any damaged light strands and never leave candles unattended.

### Travel and Driving Precautions

- Check your vehicle before hitting the road. Inspect brakes, tires and fluid levels.
- Double-check that all of your lights are working correctly.
- When you are planning your route, monitor the weather and allow extra travel time if needed.
- For longer trips, pack an emergency kit with essentials like a flashlight, jumper cables, a blanket and a basic first aid kit.

### Shopping and Public Awareness

- When shopping during the holiday season or any time of the year park in well-lit areas and avoid walking to your car alone at night.
- Keep valuables and packages out of sight; ideally in the trunk.
- Be cautious of online scams. Avoid clicking on suspicious links in emails or messages, as these could lead to phishing attempts or malicious sites.

### Hosting Parties

- If you are hosting a party monitor alcohol consumption and supervise children and pets.
- Never let impaired guests drive; arrange transportation or accommodations as needed.

The holiday season is a special time of the year to connect with friends, neighbors and the community.

Through generosity and being mindful about safety, we can improve the quality of life for others and ourselves.

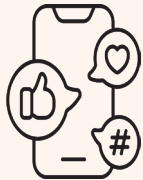

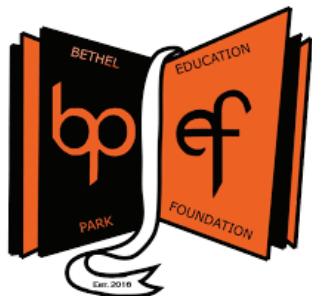

## HOW TO REGISTER

**Register at least one week before the start of the activity unless otherwise stated.**

It is important to pre-register for any activity found in this publication because an activity may be canceled when there is insufficient registration. **Never plan to attend the first class without pre-registering.**

**Individual telephone calls will not be made confirming registration.** The only time you will be notified is if there is a change or cancellation

fees are set for each activity and should be paid accordingly upon registration.

## REFUNDS: PLEASE READ

Refunds will only be given upon written requests received in the Recreation Office prior to the beginning of the second class or practice session for a grouped session. For a one-time class or session, a 24-hour written request will be required. Phone requests will not be accepted, nor does failure to attend a class constitute notification of intent to withdraw from a class.

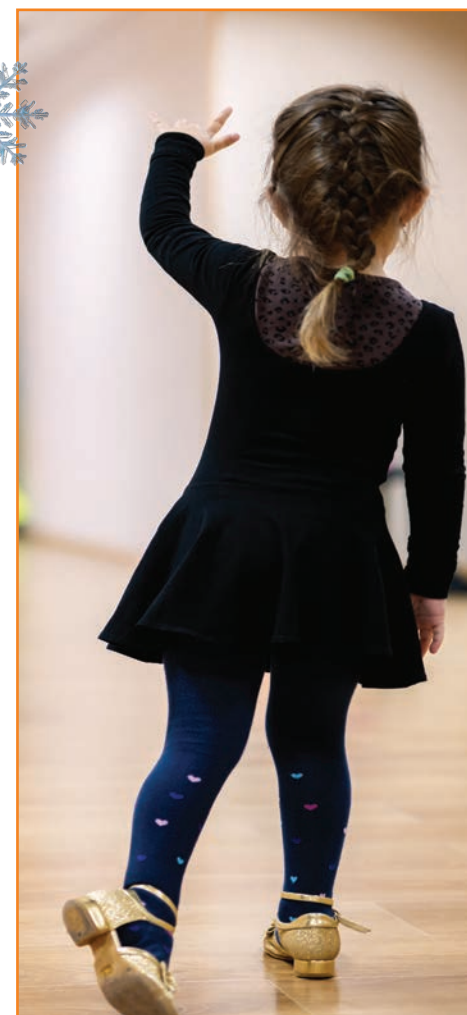

RENTAL PROCEDURES

Reserving a room at the Bethel Park Community Center for your next event is a simple, straightforward process and may be done up to six months in advance. However, it is recommended that you reserve your space early as dates fill up quickly!

- Requests for rentals must be requested through our RecDesk software. The RecDesk portal can be found on **[bethelpark.recdesk.com](http://bethelpark.recdesk.com)**. There will be a requirement of an electronic signature required for all forms necessary.
- Within five business days, you'll be able to see if your request was approved via the RecDesk online portal.
- If the space is available and approved, you'll be sent an invoice for the amount that is due via the RecDesk online portal.

PAYMENT SCHEDULE

- Rental payment in full is due as soon as the rental is approved and invoice is provided.
- A refundable security deposit of \$100 per area rented (*cash or check only*) in case there is any damage and room layout is due 15 days prior to your reservation.

\*\*\*Please note that while we want your event to be a success, failure to meet any payment or layout deadlines may result in rental cancellation. Fees paid will not be refunded. (*Refer to Cancellation Policy/Fees.*)

CANCELLATION POLICY/FEES

If you need to cancel your event, your request **MUST** be submitted in writing to the Bethel Park Community Center at **[recreation@bethelparkpa.gov](mailto:recreation@bethelparkpa.gov)**.

- Cancellations received in writing more than 45 days prior to the scheduled date will receive a refund of rental payment, less a \$35 processing fee.
- Rental fee will not be refunded if written cancellation is received less than 45 days prior to event.

OTHER RENTAL NOTES

- Any use of the Community Center which requires Municipal staff to stay after the scheduled closing time shall be charged an additional \$40 per hour for any portion of an hour that may be needed. This fee needs to be paid the day of the rental.
- Should your event need an alcohol permit for 150 persons or more, as a requirement, there will be additional security personnel fee. (*\$60 per hour*) Rental rate includes the set-up of tables and chairs.
- Renters will be responsible to submit a layout 15 days in advance of their event to sign-off on all seating/room arrangements.
- Rental rate includes setup of tables/chairs.
- Your rental space only includes the specified area listed in your rental agreement; use of additional amenities requires prior authorization.

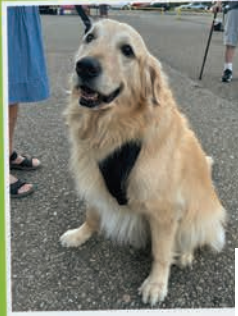
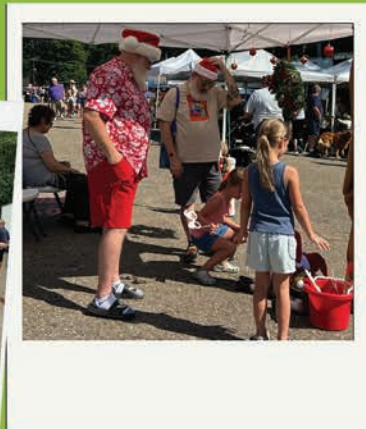

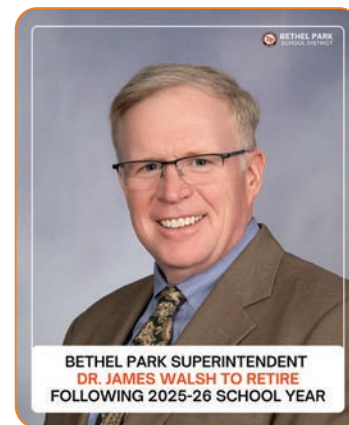
School Board President **James Modrak** praised Walsh’s leadership during a time of major change.

# Parenting in 2025-26: Guiding with Presence in a Changing World



Parenting has never been simple, but raising children in 2025 brings both fresh opportunities and unique challenges. Amid all this, one truth remains constant: children need love, guidance, and connection more than anything else. So how can parents today best support their children? ## Relationships Come First

The most valuable gift a parent can give isn't the newest device, the best clothes, or a packed schedule of activities. It's time. Even ten uninterrupted minutes a day of truly listening to your child can strengthen their sense of security and belonging.

Make space for small rituals: sharing three good things that happened at dinner, taking a short walk after school, or creating a bedtime routine that's more than brushing teeth.

Children won't remember the busy family calendar. They'll remember the moments when they felt seen and heard.

## Technology: Lead by Example

Screens and social media are woven into childhood now, and while they bring opportunities to learn and connect, they also carry risks. The best approach is not to ban technology but to teach balance. Set limits, yes, but also model healthy use. Show your children how to use technology to create (*not just consume*), to learn (*not just scroll*), and to connect (*not just compare*). Most of all, let them see that you, too, know how to put the phone down when someone in the room needs your full attention.

## Resilience Matters More Than Perfection

We all want our children to succeed, but the path to success is paved with setbacks. Instead of shielding kids from failure, help them see mistakes as steppingstones. Celebrating effort as much as (*or more than*) results. When children learn that it's okay to stumble, they also learn to get back up, and that skill will carry them further than any test score.

## The School-Home Connection

Children thrive when families and schools work together. Parents can stay engaged by asking good questions, attending events, and keeping communication open with teachers. But just as important is giving children the chance to speak for themselves, solve problems, and advocate for their own needs. That balance: engaged but not overbearing sets the stage for independence.

## Don't Forget Wellness

Sleep, nutrition, exercise, and downtime are not luxuries; they are essentials. Kids need unstructured time to rest, play, and imagine. And parents need to model wellness, too. When children see adults making time for joy, balance, and health, they're more likely to do the same.

## A Final Word

Parenting in 2025 may look different than it was a generation ago, but the fundamentals haven't changed. Presence matters more than perfection. Children need steady anchors in a world that sometimes feels unsteady. At the end of the day, what they'll remember most is how you made them feel: valued, supported, and loved as they found their way toward independence.

# Bethel Park's Ryan Petras Making an Immediate Impact at Duquesne

Freshman wide receiver **Ryan Petras**, a 2025 Bethel Park High School graduate, is already making waves at Duquesne University, showing promise as one of the school's next standout receivers.

Through his first eight games, Petras had collected more than 100 yards this season with four receiving touchdowns and a solo rushing touchdown. He made an immediate impression in Week 2 against Lincoln University, scoring on both his first collegiate reception and first rush. Against Stonehill, Petras caught three passes for 83 yards and two touchdowns, both team highs.

"I'm just trying to make the most out of what I can do and the few opportunities I have," Petras said. "Whether that's catching touchdowns or blocking for my running backs, I feel like that's the biggest part."

Petras' high school career was marked by early challenges, including injuries that limited his varsity play as a freshman and sophomore. Once healthy, he emerged as one of Pennsylvania's top wide receivers. He also

excelled in baseball, earning national attention as the state's No. 3-ranked shortstop and initially committing to Northwestern to play baseball before ultimately focusing on football.

"I love the coaches here. Coach Schmitt was super nice," Petras said of choosing Duquesne. "The campus was amazing and so were the people around it. I really liked the setup here."

Despite joining a crowded wide receiver room featuring upperclassmen like fifth-year player **Joey Isabella**, Petras has already carved out meaningful playing time. With several top receivers set to graduate over the next two years, Petras could take on a larger role soon, but he has proven he can contribute immediately.

Bethel Park and Duquesne fans alike will be watching closely as Petras continues to develop his collegiate career.



# New School Cell Phone Policy

A new cellphone policy at Bethel Park High School is changing classroom dynamics — and educators say it's for the better.

As part of a statewide trend, BPHS now requires students to place their phones in wall-mounted pouches during class. The move aims to reduce distractions and improve student engagement.

"It's weird... we're so used to always having our phone in our hand while we are talking," said senior **Joanna Little**, who admitted the adjustment took time to get used to.

Assistant Superintendent **Dr. Joe Villani** said the change is designed to help students stay focused on learning. “There is a time and place students need to have access to cellphones,” he said. “One of those times they don’t is when they are supposed to be focused on instructional goals.”

While district leaders initially expected pushback, Villani said the response has been largely positive. “Students have admitted, ‘I’m less distracted, I’m focusing more, [we’re] talking to each other,’” he said.

Students agree that the classrooms feel more connected. “I feel like everyone is speaking to each other more,” said Little. “In the past we were talking, but maybe not quite listening.”

Senior **Caleb Bush** echoed that sentiment, saying, “There’s a lot more conversation. It feels a lot livelier and less everyone just staring at their phones.”

The policy appears to be working from the teachers' perspective as well. AP European history teacher **Chelsea Casagrande** said she noticed the impact almost immediately. "Being able to disconnect from cellphones has allowed everyone to reconnect socially," she said. "Students are more engaged

in the classroom. It's not that people don't want to talk — it's just when you have another option, the phone in front of you, you choose that."

Across Pennsylvania, more districts are implementing similar policies following national efforts to curb cellphone use in schools. While the state has not mandated restrictions, it strongly encourages local policies that promote student focus.

At Bethel Park, cellphone access varies by grade level: middle school students may use their devices only at lunch, and elementary students must keep them in lockers throughout the day.

Administrators say the early results suggest the effort is paying off — creating more engaged, focused, and connected classrooms across the district.

## Stay Informed: How Bethel Park Notifies Families About Delays and Cancellations



Bethel Park School District is committed to keeping families informed when school delays or cancellations are necessary due to inclement weather or other emergencies. To ensure timely communication, the district utilizes multiple platforms to notify families of schedule changes.

The primary method is through the ParentSquare School-to-Home notification system, which sends alerts via phone and email to all registered families. Notifications are also posted on the district's website, local television news stations, and Bethel Park's social media platforms, including Facebook, Instagram, and X (*formerly Twitter*).

To receive these notifications, families are encouraged to review and update their contact information in the parent portal of their eSchoolPlus account.

This information syncs with ParentSquare to ensure that the district has the most accurate contact details. Parents can select which phone numbers they would like to use to receive alerts about delays and cancellations.

For the latest updates during inclement weather, parents can also check the websites of local television stations KDKA-TV (CBS), WPXI-TV (NBC), and WTAE-TV (ABC), where Bethel Park's schedule changes will be posted.

Six Bethel Park High School seniors have been recognized as Commended Students in the 2025 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The honorees are **Timothy Burt, Charlotte Gaston, Samuel Hoppe, Grace Peroziola, Kuon Verbosky, and Parker Walton**. They are among about 34,000 students nationwide honored for their exceptional academic promise.

Commended Students placed among the top 50,000 scorers of over 1.3 million juniors who entered the competition by taking the 2024 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). About 16,000 of those high performers were named semifinalists



earlier this month. While Commended Students will not continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships, they remain eligible for special scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses.

The National Merit Scholarship Program, founded in 1955, is among the nation's most prestigious academic recognition programs.

"We are very proud of the students who achieved this national recognition," said Bethel Park High School Principal **Mrs. Racquel Sutton**. "It is reflective of their hard work and dedication to learning."

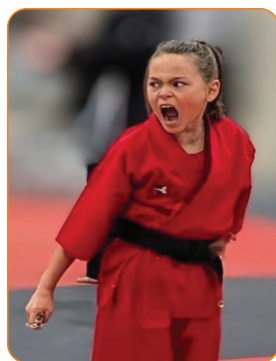
The ceremony included heartfelt remarks and a symbolic ribbon-cutting with red, white, and blue ribbons—symbolizing celebration, growth, and community.

# Bethel Park School District Adopts New Brand Guidelines

The Bethel Park School District formally adopted new brand guidelines at its September voting meeting, including an updated primary athletics logo and an entirely new secondary athletics logo.

The district's official colors remain Black and Bethel Park Orange, a bold red-based shade first used by the district in the 1960s.

The athletic logos were designed by **Noah Knerr** and the Pro Knitwear design team, following a process similar to the district's 2022 institutional branding effort, which incorporated feedback from staff, students and community members and design expertise from **Nancy Kavinsky** of Creative Zip, Ltd.

"Our brand is much more than a logo. It is a visual representation of everything the school district believes in, stands for, and promises to our stakeholders," Walsh said. "This process was designed to reflect our all-around standard of excellence in academics, athletics and all other officially affiliated district programs. It also serves to reinforce the core essence of our school pride, accomplishment and spirit."

Athletic Director **Laura Grimm** said she expects the new logos to resonate with students, fans and alumni.

"We have a proud athletic tradition at Bethel Park, and we wanted to honor that legacy while creating logos that reflect who we are in 2025 and beyond," she said. "These designs unite our community and embody the pride, strength and resolve our teams and fans carry into every competition."

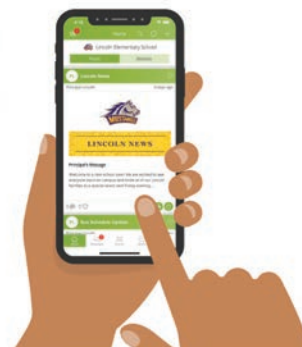

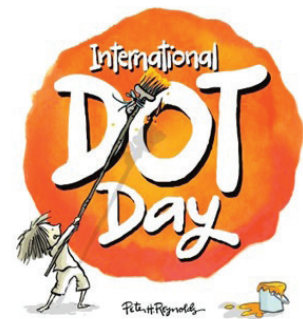
## Students 'Make Their Mark' During International Dot Day Celebration

# Bethel Park Students Promote Water Safety, Honor Late Teacher Through Scholarship Project

Bethel Park High School students **Cami Fisher** and **Nora Welch** are turning tragedy into action through a DECA Community Awareness Project aimed at promoting water safety, honoring the memory of a late teacher, and supporting the Big Heart Scholarship.

The project began last spring in collaboration with fellow DECA members **Laura Casaldi** and **Samira Gorman**. Over the past year, the group — known as the Big Heart Team — has focused on three primary goals: keeping the memory of the late **Jon Gentile** alive, raising awareness of the dangers of low head dams, and raising funds to sustain the Big Heart Scholarship.

Gentile, a former Bethel Park High School teacher, died in a kayaking accident in 2022 caused by a low head dam — a river structure that creates hidden, recirculating currents and can be extremely dangerous. The students have worked to educate their peers about water safety and advocate for increased signage at low head dams through PA House Bill 961, a water safety bill being sponsored by State Rep. **Natalie Mihalek**, R-Pittsburgh, which has worked its way through the legislative process and appears to have widespread and bipartisan support.

The team's initiatives included visiting high school kayaking classes and Intro to Marketing classes, traveling to George Washington Elementary School to engage younger students with interactive safety lessons, and hosting a LEAD session with **Claudia Huber '20**, a legislative aide, Bethel Park alumna, and Gentile's niece. They also encouraged the community to contact district representatives in support of House Bill 961 and related resolutions.

To raise funds for the Big Heart Scholarship, Fisher and Welch organized raffle baskets, promoted donations through flyers, and directed proceeds from select items in the school store, The Bean, to the scholarship. They also shared information at college fairs and promoted the scholarship through the district's Instagram page.

"I can't think of a better way to make a difference and to keep Mr. Gentile's legacy alive than promoting water safety and supporting the scholarship made in his honor," Fisher said.

Fisher and Welch will present their project at the state DECA conference in February, where students from across Pennsylvania showcase business and community initiatives that demonstrate leadership, innovation, and real-world skills in marketing, finance, hospitality, and management.

## Bethel Park Hosts Record-breaking South Hills College & Career Fair

Bethel Park High School hosted the largest academic event in its history on Tuesday, Oct. 7, as the South Hills College and Career Fair brought together 160 colleges, universities, and trade schools from across the country.

Open to students in grades 9–12 from Bethel Park and neighboring districts, the fair offered thousands of students a chance to meet admissions representatives, explore academic programs and career paths, and make connections to guide their future. Participating schools included local schools like Carnegie Mellon University, and Duquesne University and schools from all across the country like University of Arizona, Florida Southern College, Purdue University, Vanderbilt University, Syracuse University, North Carolina State University, University of Miami, Texas A&M University, and Wake Forest University.

The event was a collaborative effort between Bethel Park and area schools including Baldwin, Upper St. Clair, Peters Township, Mt. Lebanon, Keystone Oaks, Canon-McMillan, South Park, and South Fayette. Classrooms, gyms,

and cafeterias were filled with information sessions, displays, and interactive activities designed to help students plan for college and careers.

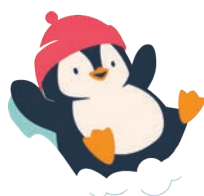
## Neil Armstrong Sixth Graders Try their Hands at Healthcare in Interactive Medical Simulation
