
Our Lady of the Desert Catholic Church

This Friday is Halloween. All Saints Day falls on Saturday and is not a Holy Day of obligation. All Saints Day falls on Sunday, so All Saints Day will be celebrated at the Saturday Vigil and at the Sunday masses.

Is the Catholic Church OK with our children, and even us grownups, getting dressed up like witches, devils, vampires, and zombies? Some bishops are recommending that children should dress as saints instead of zombies because Halloween is becoming more pagan and commercialized. It is probably in good taste to avoid too much emphasis on evil. But skeletons and skulls may be a healthy reminder of our own human mortality. But evil was not the original purpose of Halloween. Halloween was derived from the phrase "all Hallows Eve" which is a vigil for All Saints Day, a day of obligation in which the Church honors all the saints, known and unknown.

The following day is All Souls Day in which we honor all the souls of those who have died, which may be in purgatory. In purgatory these souls are being cleansed and purified for heaven. We believe that we can help these souls with our prayers, alms, good deeds, and especially in the sacrifice of the Mass.

What about trick or treat? In the Middle Ages there was a superstition that those who died the previous year without being forgiven by us, would rise to haunt us as ghosts. Their appearance would scare us so we would release them by praying and forgiving them, and by giving them treats.

Moving on then, if you had a choice for a Halloween costumes between a Pharisee or a Tax Collector, which one would you choose?

A Pharisee stood up in the temple and prayed about himself: "O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity—greedy, dishonest, adulterous—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income." His attitude was "I have everything, and I need nothing."

His spiritual pride hardened his heart. It blocked the grace and love of God. It caused him to judge and despise the rest of humanity. And his spiritual pride made him blind to his own sins. He refused to admit he was sinner. He asked God for nothing and so he received nothing

In contrast the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed: "O God, have mercy on me a sinner." His attitude was "I have nothing, and I need everything." It was an admission of guilt.

He had no spiritual pride. He admitted he was a sinner. And he admitted he needed God's love and forgiveness. His humility opened his heart to receive God's grace, love, and forgiveness. He had the right attitude. Like Jesus who humbled himself to die on the cross like a criminal for our sins, "the one who humbles himself will be exalted." What does it mean for us? It means God will listen to our prayer only if we live our life in a spirit of humility, repentance, and obedience to God.

Probablemente es de buen gusto evitar el exceso de énfasis en lo oculto. Pero esqueletos y calaveras pueden recordarnos de nuestra mortalidad humana. Pero el propósito original de Halloween no era celebrar lo oculto. La palabra Halloween viene de la frase "Noche santa," que es una vigilia del Día de Todos los Santos, un

santa," que es una vigilia del Día de Todos los Santos, un día de obligación en que la Iglesia honra a todos los santos, conocidos y desconocidos.

El día siguiente es el Día de Todos los Fieles Difuntos en el que se honra a todas las almas de aquellos que han muerto, que pueden estar en el purgatorio. En el purga-

muerto, que pueden estar en el purgatorio. En el purgatorio las almas están siendo limpiadas y purificadas para el cielo. Creemos que podemos ayudar a estas almas con la oración, la limosna, las buenas obras, y especialmente en el sacrificio de la Misa ¿Y qué de trick or treat? En la Edad Media había una su-

¿Y qué de trick or treat? En la Edad Media había una superstición de que los que murieron el año pasado sin ser perdonado por nosotros, se elevaban para perseguirnos como fantasmas. Su apariencia nos asustaba para que los libremos en orar y perdonar, y dándoles dulces. Entonces, si tienen la opción de disfraces de Halloween entre un fariseo y un publicano, ¿cuál de los dos escogerían?

El fariseo, de pie en el templo, oraba de si mismo: "Dios mío, te doy gracias porque no soy como los demás hombres: ladrones, injustos y adúlteros; tampoco soy como ese publicano. Ayuno dos veces por semana y pago el diezmo de todas mis ganancias." Su actitud era "lo tengo todo y de nada tengo necesidad." Su orgullo espiritual le endureció su corazón. Bloqueó la gracia y el amor de Dios. Le hizo juzgar y despreciar al resto de la humanidad. Y su orgullo espiritual lo hizo ciego a sus propios pecados. Se negó a admitir que era pecador. Le pidió nada a Dios y por eso recibió nada. En cambio el publicano, se quedo lejos y no se atrevía a levantar los ojos al cielo. Lo único que hacia era golpearse el pecho, diciendo: "¡Dios mío, ten misericordia de mí, un pecador!" Su actitud era "No tengo nada, y tengo necesidad de todo." Fue una admisión de culpa. No tenía orgullo espiritual. Admitió que era un pecador. Y admitió que necesitaba el amor y el perdón de Dios. Su humildad le abrió su corazón para recibir la gracia, el amor, y el perdón de Dios. Él tenía la actitud correcta. Al igual que Jesús, que se humilló a sí mismo para morir en la cruz como un criminal por nuestros pecados, "el que se humilla será enaltecido ¿Qué significa para nosotros? Significa que Dios escuchará nuestra oración sólo si vivimos nuestra vida con un espíritu de humildad, de arrepentimiento y de obediencia a Dios.

Children and Adults are encouraged to dress as saints. Look them up and learn:

1) ST. MARIA GORETTI (1890-1902)

Known as the patroness of rape victims, Maria Goretti was martyred at age 11. She preferred to die rather than lose her purity. She forgave her attacker before passing away.

2) ST. DOMINIC SAVIO (1842-1857)

A student of St. John Bosco, Dominic Savio stood out for his piety and love of God from an early age. He died at the age of 14 and is known for his quote: "I'd rather die than sin".

3) ST. THERESE OF LISIEUX (1873-1897)

Known as "The Little Flower," Saint Therese of the Child Jesus entered Carmel at age 15 and lived there until her early death at age 24. She is famous for her "Little Way" of love and simplicity.

4) BL. PIER GIORGIO FRASSATI (1901-1925)

Nicknamed "the man of the eight beatitudes," Pier Giorgio was a young Italian passionate about mountaineering, the Eucharist, and charity for the poor. He died at age 24.

5) ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI (1181-1226)

As a young man, Francis abandoned a life of comfort to live according to the Gospel. He is the founder of the Franciscan Order and is known for his humility and love of creation.

6) BL. CHIARA BADANO (1971-1990)

Dying of cancer at the age of 18, Chiara stood out for her joy and dedication to God's will. She inspired many with her unshakable faith amid suffering.

7) ST. JOAN OF ARC (1412-1431)

St. Joan of Arc, the young peasant woman who became a military leader and heroine in France, was martyred at age 19. She is known for her courage and deep faith.

8) ST. CARLO ACUTIS (1991-2006)

Known as the patron saint of computer programmers and youth, Carlo used technology to evangelize. He developed a website cataloging all the Eucharistic miracles in the world. He died of leukemia at age 15.

9) ST. ALOYSIUS GONZAGA (1568-1591)

St. Aloysius Gonzaga renounced noble life to become a Jesuit. He is known for his purity and charity, dying at the age of 23 while caring for victims of an epidemic.

IN THE WORDS OF ST. JOHN PAUL II: "DO NOT BE AFRAID TO BE SAINTS." Like these young saints, we are called to lives of love, service, and holiness. May their stories inspire us to respond to that call with respect, humbleness, courage and joy.

The Catholic Roots of Halloween: Understanding its Origins and Celebrating with Faith

When Halloween comes around each year, Catholics may have questions about its origins and how to celebrate in a manner that befits the faith. As much as today's version of Halloween has become commercialized with costumes, candy, and spooky decorations, its beginnings are no netheless steeped in Catholic tradition.

The very name "Halloween" gives away its relationship to Catholicism, originating from "All Hallow's Eve," meaning the vigil of All Saints' Day, the solemnity which falls on November 1st. The day is reserved to honor all the saints in heaven, both the known and the unknown, those who have lived holy lives and yet do not have a feast day on the liturgical calendar. The word "hallow" means "holy," and Halloween, therefore, originally signified the eve of this sacred feast.

Traditionally, All Saints' Day was on May 13th, when Pope Boniface IV consecrated the Pantheon in Rome to the Virgin Mary and all the martyrs. In the 9th century, however, Pope Gregory III moved the feast to November 1st, coinciding with the dedication of a new chapel in Saint Peter's Basilica that was meant to honor all the saints. The displacement enabled the Church to highlight the Communion of Saints, and the faithful were encouraged to seek the intercession not only of canonized saints, but also of obscure saints. Later, Pope Gregory IV expanded the celebration to the whole church.

All Saints Day is followed by All Souls Day on November 2nd, a day of prayer for the souls of the faithful departed, particularly those still undergoing purification in purgatory. Taken together, the three successive feasts of October 31st, November 1st, and November 2nd constitute a triduum under the name "Allhallowtide" or "Hallowmas," and are also known as the "Days of the Dead" or "Dia de Los Muertes." This triad of days focuses attention on the Catholic vision of the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ, comprising the Church Triumphant (the saints in heaven), the Church Suffering (the souls in purgatory), and the Church Militant (the faithful on earth).

Halloween holds great importance in the Catholic tradition, preparing one for the vigil of this sacred period. The history behind it shows that it was a time of preparation for the feast of All Saints through contemplation of the saints and prayer for souls in purgatory. Wearing costumes and participating in festivities were a few of the customs that developed, originating from paying respects to the dead, warding off evil spirits, and remembering the spiritual combat of good against evil.

We Catholics can reclaim the real meaning of Halloween by stressing its spiritual significance. Families should go to Mass together on All Saints' Day, which is a holy day of obligation, pray for the dead on All Souls' Day, or even host a "saint-themed" party where children dress up as their favorite saints. Not only would that preserve the tradition, but it would also add a deep understanding of our faith.

While Halloween takes on a host of meanings in contemporary culture, its origins are deeply seated in Catholic tradition. By reconnecting to these historical and religious roots, Catholics can celebrate in a manner that honors the saints, prays for the dead, and reminds us of our eternal destiny with God. Embracing the spiritual meaning of Halloween enables us to turn the attention away from the secular and toward the sacred and reminds us of the deeper truths our faith calls us to reflect on during this season.

In summary, Halloween is not merely a secular holiday but a significant part of the Catholic liturgical calendar, deeply intertwined with the remembrance of saints and the faithful departed. It serves as a time for reflection on life, death, and the hope of resurrection.
