Handover Ceremony—April 11th, 2025

Luciano B. Rama Sr. Memorial National High School, Camotes Island

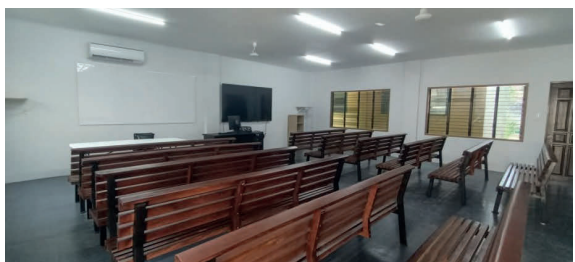
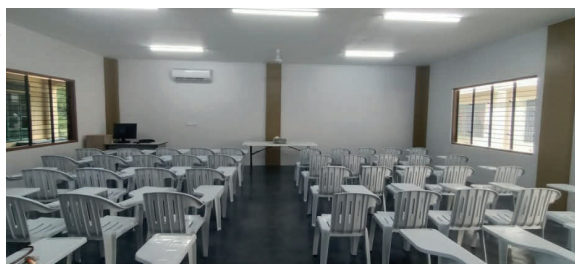
On April 11, 2025, the Rotary Club of Gosford City proudly celebrated the successful completion and handover of the Audio Visual & Collaboration Classrooms at Luciano B. Rama Sr. Memorial National High School on Camotes Island, Philippines. This modern two-room facility—the first of its kind on the island—embodies our shared commitment to *“Igniting the Spark of Learning.”*

The project was delivered in two phases. Phase 1 saw the construction of the building, including foundations, in-ground services, walls, roofing, lighting, and power—completed in January 2024. Phase 2 followed with the full fit-out of furnishings, AV technology, teaching resources, and sustainable utilities to ensure long-term benefit and functionality. The project has transformed not just a physical space, but the entire learning environment for students and teachers in this remote community.

The handover ceremony was attended by Rotarians Peter and Cher Clarke, Monique Cardon, and Friends of Rotary Gary and April Clarke, along with our partners from the Rotary Club of Twin Cities (USA). They were warmly welcomed by students, staff, and local officials who expressed deep gratitude for the life-changing impact of the project.

This initiative was made possible through international Rotary collaboration, including support from the Rotary Clubs of Twin Cities (District 5020), Metro Cebu (District 3860), and Gosford City (District 9685), along with generous donors and friends of Rotary.

Now complete, the classrooms serve as a beacon of hope and opportunity—fostering creativity, digital literacy, and global connection. Through this project, we have truly *Ignited the Spark of Learning* for the next generation on Camotes Island.

## 2024/25 TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT

Our Club is in a sound financial shape. We have met our annual legislative and

compliance reporting requirements (ASIC & NSW Fair Trading).

Again this year the Club made a commitment to only take on joint fund-raising projects with partners of our choosing on the undertaking that we receive 50% of net proceeds, allowing us to continue our strong local community support. Where possible and advantageous to our fund raising, the support of sponsors for events was sought.

This Financial Year we have distributed approx. \$30,000 to various local and international causes and have formed good working partnerships with established community service providers.

The Board made the decision to move to a self-audit practice for the 2020/21 financial year. This practice was continued in the 2023/24 financial year and self audit will again be implemented this year.

Our Annual General Meeting will be conducted in December of this year and will be supported by a full Financial Statement and Audit Report.

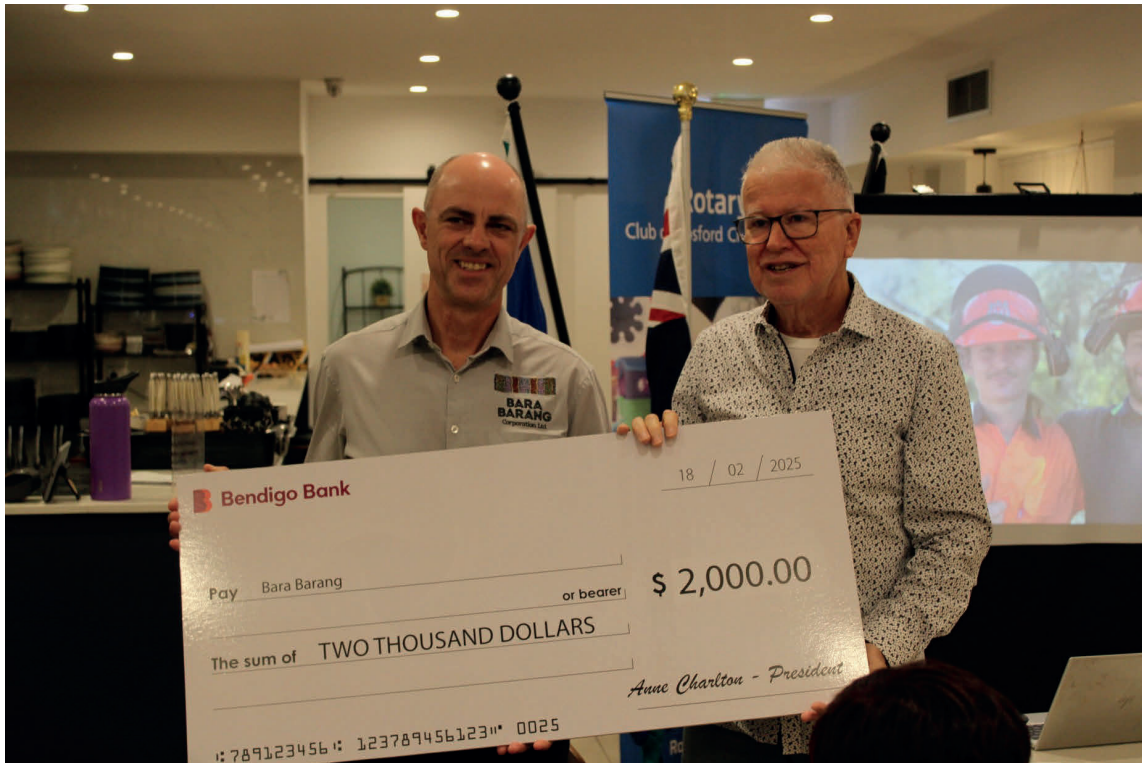

We had a fantastic lineup across the year, interspersed with Club Assemblies and other events. Here are some of the highlights from 2024-25.

## 24 July 2024 – Mel and Jerry, Films4Change

Mel and Jerry inspired us with their work at Films4Change, a social enterprise using documentary and narrative storytelling to spotlight complex social issues. Their films engage and educate communities, prompting action around homelessness, addiction, and youth mental health. Their passion was contagious and their work remarkable.



## 6 November 2024 – Kyleigh Holland Quinn, Coast Shelter

Kyleigh shared how Coast Shelter's social enterprises—Coasties on the Move and CS Espresso—are changing lives by offering supported employment to vulnerable youth. These programs offer confidence, life skills, and employment pathways. Her uplifting stories showed real transformations among young people.



## 13 November 2024 – Kylie Hopkins, Wyong Neighbourhood Centre

Despite tech hiccups, Kylie's passion shone through. The Centre, with hubs in Wyong and Gosford, supports vulnerable locals with youth services, food aid, financial counselling, and emergency relief—all with minimal funding and just five permanent staff. Their impact is immense.



## 11 December 2024 – Alex and Caoimhe, India Immersion Trip

Kyleigh shared how Coast Shelter's social enterprises—Coasties on the Move and CS Espresso—are changing lives by offering supported employment to vulnerable youth. These programs offer confidence, life skills, and employment pathways. Her uplifting stories showed real transformations among young people.



## 19 March 2025 – Andrew Malloch, Bara Barang

Andrew outlined Bara Barang's programs for Aboriginal youth, including Dream Builders and Make Tomorrow, plus mentoring and employment support. The highlight was Raspberry Fields—an on-country initiative offering cultural immersion and sustainable income. Our Club proudly donated \$2,000 from the Spring Drive.



## 26 March 2025 – Dr Lan-Hoa Le

Lan-Hoa shared her journey from war-torn Vietnam to Australia as a child. Her story of resilience, integration, and becoming an anaesthetist was heartfelt and inspiring. She honoured her mother's influence and the kindness shown by strangers on their journey.

## 2 April 2025 – Adam McArdle, Arc Ento Tech

Adam captivated us with a revolutionary waste solution using black soldier fly larvae. His Somersby-based company turns food waste into insect protein, fertiliser, biofuel, and synthetic coal. A Hawkesbury pilot plant is in the works. A game-changer for waste management.



## 26 March 2025 – Trish Skehan, Author

Trish discussed her book *\*The Secrets of Anzac Ridge\**, based on WWI veteran Jim Armitage's diary and other first-hand accounts. Her vivid storytelling and historical insights brought Flanders Fields to life. The book was released 26 March 2025 by Hachette.

## 30 April 2025 – Kelly and James Drover, Feel the Magic

Kelly and her son James, fundraising for Feel the Magic by trekking Kokoda, shared their passion for supporting grieving children. Their enthusiasm and courage were evident, with James shining as a young speaker. A powerful presentation with heartfelt purpose.



## 7 May 2025 – Amy B, Matchmaker & Co

Amy introduced her unique dating agency offering a curated, personal approach to finding love. No more swiping or awkward first dates—just thoughtful matchmaking. Her Central Coast-based business is gaining traction and bringing romance back into fashion.

We thank all nominators, sponsors, and attendees for supporting this important initiative and look forward to



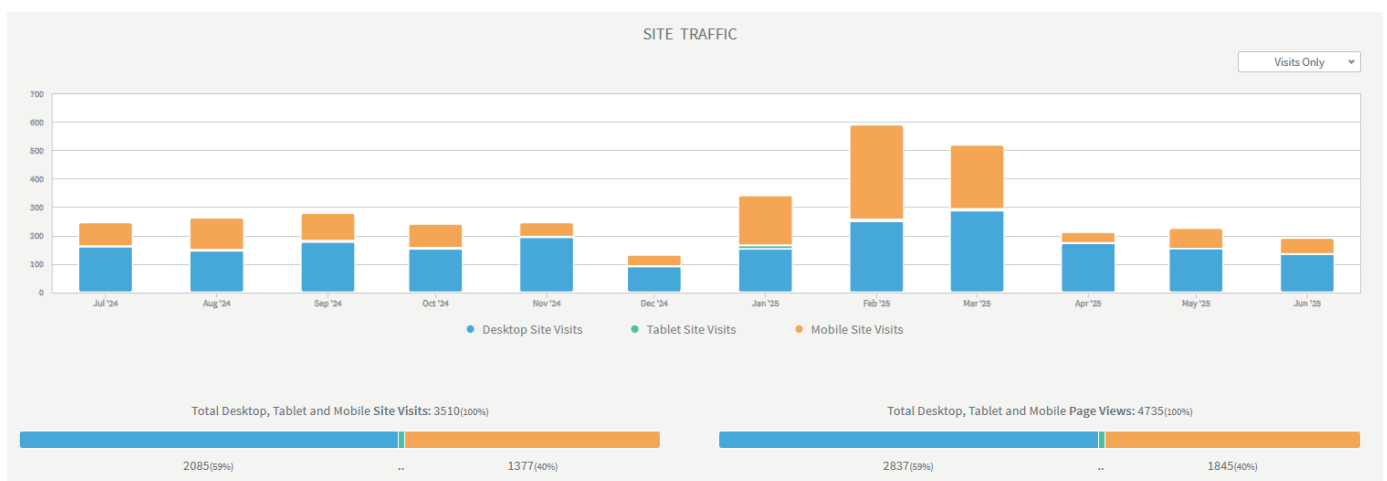
# COMMUNICATIONS

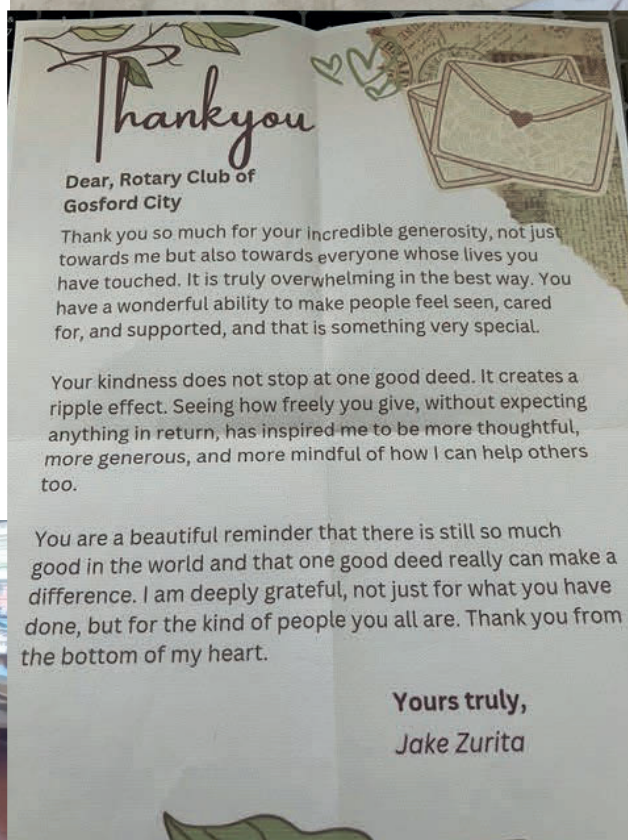
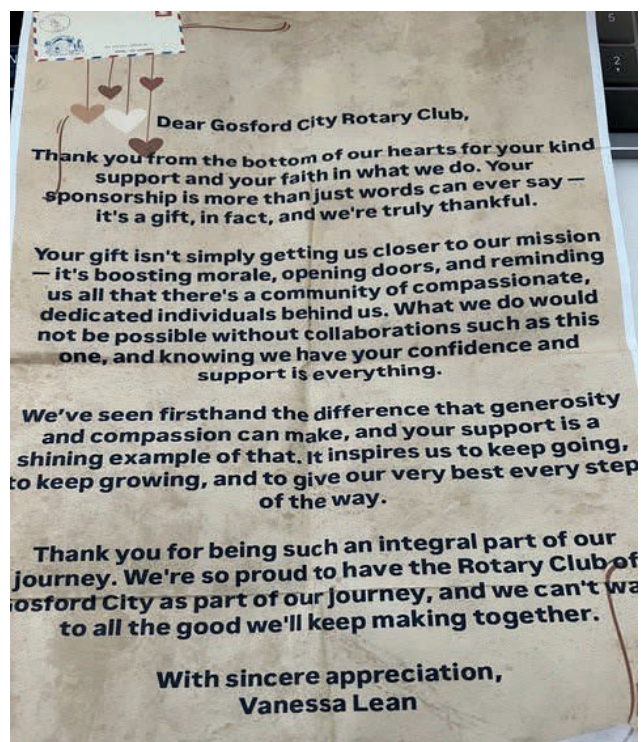
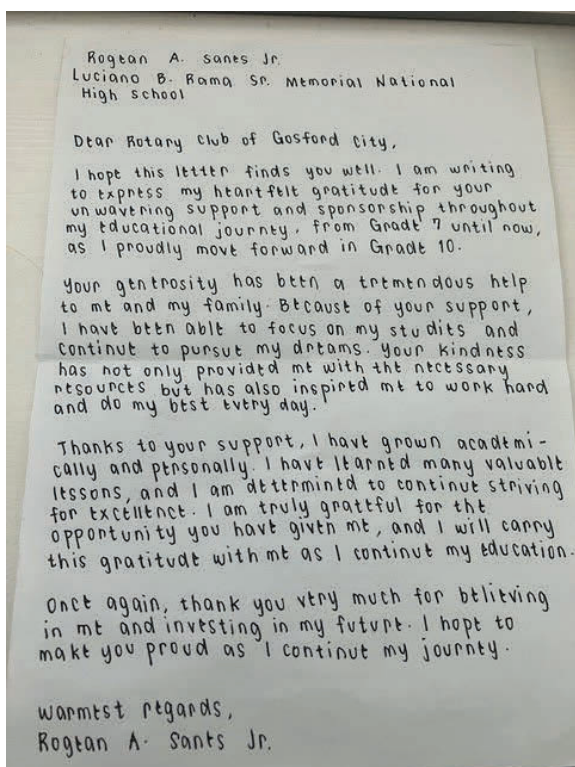
President Anne mentioned earlier our Philippines Classroom Building Project which culminated in the AVR Handover Tour. A Resounding Success.

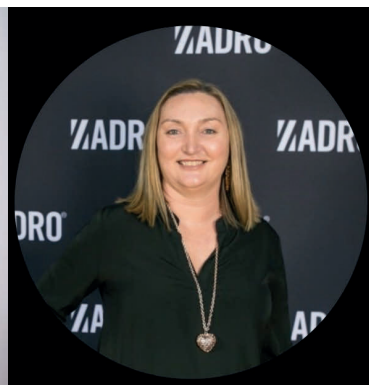
