ADVANCING BRAIN HEALTH

NOW

Palm Health Foundation has launched **The Brain Coast Vision**, an aspiration endorsed by six Palm Beach County brain health and science visionaries who believe that shared vision, determination, science, education, collaboration, and investment can transform South Florida and change the world.

The Brain Coast effort can be compared to President John F. Kennedy's ambitious goals for American space exploration that accelerated Florida's Space Coast. Our region is ready for this spotlight – Palm Beach County is home to significant scientific discoveries that are illuminating the awesome complexity of the human brain and leading to treatments, and even cures, to some of humanity's most challenging brain diseases and disorders, including Alzheimer's, bipolar disorder, depression, and developmental difficulties such as autism.

Life science discoveries benefit the health of our local economy as well, providing over 7,500 jobs and contributing \$1.6 billion in total gross regional product, according to the Business Development Board of Palm Beach County.

Palm Health Foundation's deep roots in our community enable us to build valuable cross-sector partnerships, connecting brain science to community care, leading to more research, innovative brain health interventions, and practical supports for residents of all ages to care for their brains every day.





THE FUTURE

Palm Health Foundation and our donors are proud to be the first to champion The Center for the Resilient Mind at the FAU Stiles-Nicholson Brain Institute. The first of its kind, this Center will bring together collaborative biologists, psychologists, computer scientists, educators, community advocates, and policy makers to support the effort to build more resilient brains, minds, families, and communities.

The Center for the Resilient Mind will be a feather in the cap of South Florida's Brain Coast, adding to growing momentum. **Fueled by innovation, world-class research, community advocates, dedicated health professionals, and passionate philanthropists, we know the future is bright for brain health in our community and beyond.**

BUILDING A CULTURE OF HEALTH

NOW

Palm Health Foundation is stoking a Culture of Health Network in Palm Beach County, which has grown from seeds planted by initiatives like Healthier Together, BeWellPBC, the Palm Beach County NeuroArts Collaborative, and residents dedicated to advancing health across our neighborhoods.

Through our work to establish and guide initiatives, Palm Health Foundation has learned there are two significant cornerstones to the success of community-driven efforts: **the people** and the **flourishing networks** they build to address community needs.

The foundation remains committed to investing in the power of networks and individuals as they pursue better health opportunities for all. In fiscal year 2025, we awarded 21 grants through *The Community Changemakers Fund*, supported by seven local funders that agreed to co-invest in the individuals, organizations, and businesses committed to community change. All grant applicants and recipients formed a network of like-minded changemakers to share project ideas and resources.



THE FUTURE

PalmHealthFoundation continues to support mini grants efforts presented by the American Heart Association and BeWellPBC, Healthier Boynton Beach, and Healthier Glades initiatives – like The Community Changemakers Fund, mini grants put funding directly into the hands of residents with innovative ideas for advancing community health.

This year, the foundation was awarded \$1 million from the CVS Health Foundation to support healthy aging through our Healthier Boynton Beach initiative. This funding allows the foundation to co-create solutions with residents for identifying, coordinating, and connecting health and wellness services for aging community members with brain, heart, and behavioral conditions, as well as their caregivers.

Our work will continue to center community voice in driving solutions for better health.



STRENGTHENING THE HEALTH PROFESSIONS

NOW

Every year, Palm Health Foundation awards scholarships to local nursing and mental health professionals and brings scholars and their supporters together for a special celebration.

In fiscal year 2025, the foundation celebrated the largest group of scholars in our history due to a generous gift from Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network.

Our scholarships not only address a critical workforce shortage but also advance the careers of local healthcare professionals with lived experience and cultural competencies that serve South Florida's diverse population. Their ability to bridge languages and cultures is critical to providing quality care, making our entire region healthier and stronger.






THE FUTURE

Palm Health Foundation funds BeWellPBC, a behavioral health initiative that actively works to build a local workforce pipeline for healthcare professionals, among other priorities. The foundation is highly collaborative in this work – for example, we’re exploring pathways for peers (people with lived experience of a particular health condition or challenge) and community health workers to enter the workforce and blend their unique expertise with formal healthcare practices.

The foundation is also building relationships with larger organizations to access statewide data and learn from effective practices across Florida that can shape strategies to strengthen the workforce here in Palm Beach County, with the **goal to improve long-term sustainability and access to care for our residents.**



FROM IDEA TO IMPACT: Our Experience Creating a Donor-Advised Fund

When Rich and I first started talking about creating lasting impact through charitable giving, I'll be honest, the options felt overwhelming. We knew we wanted to support students pursuing nursing and mental health careers but figuring out the best structure seemed daunting.

We decided to create a **donor-advised fund (DAF)** and the process was more accessible and straightforward than we initially realized.

WHY WE CHOSE THIS PATH

It began with values. We've both seen how exceptional healthcare professionals transform lives: the nurse who provides compassion in a moment of crisis, the counselor who helps someone find hope again. We wanted our giving to grow more professionals in our community.

SHAPING OUR FUND

Once we committed to healthcare education, practical questions emerged. Which students? Which programs? Should financial need matter more than academic merit?

We decided that supporting nursing and mental health students aligned with our values and clear community workforce needs. My advice: set guiding parameters that feel authentic to you but build in flexibility.

THE FINANCIAL FRAMEWORK

We discovered that DAFs offer exceptional flexibility — cash, appreciated securities, or other assets, are generally eligible for an immediate tax deduction. Under IRS guidelines, the fund can be invested over time, allowing resources to grow and be thoughtfully deployed through charitable grants.





FINDING THE RIGHT PARTNERSHIP

You don't have to manage the logistics yourself. We partnered with Palm Health Foundation to manage our DAF. They take care of investment management, compliance, grant processing, and reporting, while retaining final discretion as required by law. We stay focused on the impact, not the paperwork.

EXPERIENCING THE REWARDS

The best part, without question, has been connecting with students. Reading their essays, hearing their career goals, and watching their progress has been incredibly rewarding.

One nursing graduate, now working in a local ICU, wrote to tell us how the scholarship allowed her to focus on clinical training instead of working extra shifts. That note captured exactly what we hoped our giving would do: remove barriers so talented people can thrive.

PALM HEALTHCARE PAVILION

THEN

In 2006, Palm Health Foundation purchased the future site of Palm Healthcare Pavilion. The board of trustees envisioned a place where healthcare professionals and families could collaborate, foster healing, practice cutting edge care, empower, and educate.

This vision was made a reality by the late Mollie Wilmot, whose generous bequest launched the project. The building celebrated its grand opening in 2009.



NOW & THE FUTURE

The Pavilion stands on the St. Mary's Hospital campus as a place of mental, behavioral, and physical healing – more than **100,000** individuals, children and families have benefitted from services provided there, and this number will continue to grow.

Palm Health Foundation provides free rent at the Pavilion to organizations advancing mental and behavioral health in our community: **National Alliance on Mental Illness of Palm Beach County** and **BeWellPBC**. Other organizations providing much needed care and services at the pavilion include:

- **American Healthcare Institute**
- **Center for Child Counseling** - *In 2025, they provided critical mental health care and support to 393 children and families, helping create healthier, more hopeful futures.*
- **Community Health Center of West Palm Beach** - *In 2025, they provided care to 1,443 patients across 5,804 visits.*

Palm Healthcare Pavilion will continue to be a cornerstone of accessible, compassionate care, strengthening the health and resilience of our community for generations to come.


