

THE NOVEMBER FEASTS

Dear friends in Christ.

As I write this on Friday, it is All Hallows Eve otherwise known as Halloween. Halloween has its origins as the eve of the Solemnity of All Saints, this important day when we remember all the countless men and women who have reached our ultimate homeland of Heaven. This year we will celebrate All Saints Day only on Saturday Morning. There will be two Masses, 9 AM at Holy Innocents in Duvall and 9 AM at St. Jude in Blessed are those who have died in the Lord; **Redmond.** While this year there is no obligation to attend the Holy Day Masses, it is none the less an important feast to celebrate and I hope you will plan to come and celebrate the victory of All the Saints and ask their intercession on Saturday.

THE SOLEMNITY OF ALL SAINTS

Pope Benedict beautifully explained the importance May their souls and the souls of all the faithful of this feast in just a few words:

This, then, is the meaning of today's Solemnity: looking at the shining example of the Saints to reawaken within us the great longing to be like them; happy to live near God, in his light, in the great family of God's friends. Being a Saint means living close to God, to live in his family.

....Consequently, the more we imitate Jesus and remain united to him the more we enter into the mystery of his divine holiness. We discover that he loves us infinitely, and this prompts us in turn to love our brethren. POPE BENEDICT

NOVEMBER 2, THE FEAST OF ALL SOULS, THE COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED.

This year, All Souls Day falls on a Sunday and in the Saturday Vigil Mass and the Sunday Masses we will offer up prayers all our deceased loved ones. Our prayers matter and really do aid them. All Souls is the day for the rest of us, all those who though dying in a state of grace, need a little clean-up in purgatory before entering the heavenly banquet. Scripture tells us "It is a good and praiseworthy thing to pray for the dead." As Catholics, we have a 2000 year tradition of offering prayers for our deceased, that they might quickly

enter into the joys of heaven. So let us remember all of our beloved dead, in the hope and promise of the resurrection.

Finally, I want to encourage you to visit our cemeteries during this month. Let us remember and pray for our loved ones. Here are some prayers which can be offered at the grave:

A PRAYER FOR VISITING A CEMETERY

have mercy on all who are buried here. (In particular, we pray for N. and N.) Bring them into your kingdom of light and peace and let them share joy with you and with all your saints. We ask this through Christ our Lord. R. Amen.
