Believe the Truth, Reject the Lie - Psalm 4

Important to Note: Psalm 3 sets the stage; Psalms 4 and 5 continue the trouble, and Psalm 7 recounts what happened with Shimei—all tied into Absalom and the fallout of that situation.(2 Samuel 15–17)

Evaluation of the False

Read through 2 Samuel 15–17.

- What are a number of lies David is being told?
- What are a number of lies being said about David that he probably overheard?
- What are some of the implicit lies that David is probably believing, whether he realizes it or not?
- How does he respond?

Reminder of the True

Examine **Psalms 3–5** (and related passages).

- What are the truths David is trying to remind himself of?
- How does this play into passages like Romans 11:28–12:8?
 (Hint: Believers can be "enemies" in moments of rebellion yet "beloved" through election—leading to lives of awe-filled service.)
- What's the basis for our knowing that God loves us?
 (e.g., Romans 5:8—God demonstrates His love in Christ's death while we were still sinners.)
- What's our confidence that none of this is out of God's control? (e.g., God's sovereignty as shield and sustainer.)
- What's our reaction to situations around us since we can be assured of these things?

(e.g., Be still, trust, offer righteousness, and serve with awe.)

Rehearse the Truth

- He prays (though weeping) (2 Sam. 15:31, against Ahithophel)
- Accepts his part in all this (2 Sam. 16:10–12: "Perhaps God sent this")
- Strategizes with spies (2 Sam. 15:32–37)—he's not going to just "lie down and die." If God is against him, God will frustrate his attempts to fix this.

Verse-by-Verse: Psalm 3

- 1. What have you done for me (not "what have you done for me lately") (vs. 1) (see 2 Sam. 12:13)
 - You've enlarged me (I'm not straitened)
 - You've given me righteousness (I'm not condemned)
 - You've been merciful (I don't get what I deserve)
 - You hear my prayers (I get access into Your presence)
- 2. What are the other people like? (vs. 2)
 - They shame me.
 - They love empty things.
 - They go after lies
 - Lie: "I've been abandoned; I receive only wrath from God; I can't be forgiven; I am worthless."
 - Truth: "God still hears my prayers." (Philippians 1:6) "God loves me." (Rom. 5:8)
- 3. Selah (vs. 2)
 - Which voice dominates the mind right now?
- 4. How does God respond? (vs. 3)
 - Sanctifies (sets apart) those who set Him apart.
 - Listens to those who serve Him.
- 5. How should we respond? (vs. 4)
 - Be in awe of Him both His judgment and His kindness.
 - Examine yourself in the quiet moments.
 - Be still.
 - Lie: "God doesn't hear; serving God is pointless; I only receive grief from the Lord."
 - Truth: "God still hears my prayers, as long as I am not ignoring His truth" (Psa. 66:18); "prosperity doesn't mean God's blessing" (Psa. 37:35-38)
- 6. Selah (vs. 4)
- 7. How then should we live? (vs. 5)
 - Offer appropriate things to God righteousness to a righteous God.
 - Trust in Him.
- 8. What else are you going to hear? (vs. 6-8)
 - "Who will be good to us"
 - "Go to another source for your gladness"
 - "You won't have peace with God."
 - Lie: "It's pointless to trust in God"; "God has abandoned me"; "Serving God is miserable."
 - Truth: Reread 6-8 for the heart attitude of a man who was living with all these lies, yet encouraged himself in God.

David is being lied to constantly—by himself and the people around him. He has to **consciously choose** to listen and rehearse the truth, not the lie.

Recount the Lies

- "All Israel follows Absalom—your cause is lost" (2 Sam. 15:13)
- "Mephibosheth plots against you" (2 Sam. 16:3; false disloyalty)
- "You're a murderer! God repays your evil!" (2 Sam. 16:7–8)
- "You're doing a bad job; I could do better!" (2 Sam. 15:4–6)
- Self-loathing: Your sins disqualify you forever (echoing Nathan's sword prophecy, 2 Sam. 12:10)
- "God has forsaken His anointed" (Psalm 3:2)
- "Trust no one—betrayal defines your relationships with others" (Absalom, Ahithophel, Mephibosheth, Shimei)

Sidenote: Psalm 119 - David's Spiritual Growth

David experienced **spiritual growth**. While not perfect, he understood that you can start from the bottom and begin to **grow and grow**.

Each 8-verse segment of Psalm 119 shows him growing more and more—until he has that **blessed assurance** of the truth of what God says. We see a mature man, living in the ravages of his own sin, who can still **cling to the promises** of that faithful God.

We can't depend on muscles we haven't exercised. Faith is the same way. Choose truth today—rehearse it, live it, trust it.
