Change and renew us in the power of your Holy Spirit.



Almighty God, we confess that we have often approached you with outward displays of faith, like fasting or attending services, without truly changing our hearts. We have neglected to show mercy to the poor, to feed the hungry, or to help those in need. We have often prioritized our own desires and comfort over the well-being of others, mistaking outward acts for genuine service to you.

We confess that our hearts have been hard, our eyes have been blind, and our ears have been deaf to the cries of the oppressed. We have often been selfish, greedy, and indifferent to the suffering of others.


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## Prayer after Communion

Affirmation of Faith - from the Confession of Belhar, 10.7

We believe that God has revealed God's self as the one who wishes to bring about justice and true peace among people. God, in a world full of injustice and enmity, is in a special way the God of the destitute, the poor and the wronged. God calls the church to follow God in this: for God brings justice to the oppressed and gives bread to the hungry; God frees the prisoner and restores sight to the blind; God supports the downtrodden, protects the stranger, helps orphans and widows and blocks the path of the ungodly. For God, pure and undefiled religion is to visit the orphans and the widows in their suffering. God wishes to teach the church to do what is good and to seek the right; that the church must therefore stand by people in any form of suffering and need, which implies, among other things, that the church must witness against and strive against any form of injustice, so that justice may roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

### Commissioning Prayer (Adapted from The Book of Occasional Services, 1999)

We are called by God to be the church of Jesus Christ, a sign in the world today of what God intends for all humankind. The call of Christ is to willing, dedicated discipleship. Our discipleship is a manifestation of the new life we enter through baptism. Discipleship is both a gift and a commitment, an offering and a responsibility.

Sisters and brothers in Christ, the grace bestowed on you in baptism is sufficient for your calling because it is God's grace. By God's grace we are saved, and enabled to grow in the faith and to commit our lives in ways that serve Christ. God is calling you to stand by people in the midst of suffering, to witness and strive against injustice, to be repairers of the breach. Show your purpose by answering these questions.

Who is your Lord and Savior?

Jesus Christ is my Lord and Savior.

Will you be Christ's faithful disciple, obeying his word and showing his love?

I will, with God's help.

Do you welcome the responsibility of this service because you are determined to follow the Lord Jesus, to love neighbors, and to work for the reconciling of the world?

I do.

Will you serve God's people with energy, intelligence, imagination and love, relying on God's mercy and rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit?

### I will, with God's help.

Let us pray: Faithful God, in baptism you claimed us; and by your Holy Spirit you are working in our lives, empowering us to live a life worthy of our calling. We thank you for leading the Presbytery of Eastern Virginia to this time and place. Establish them in your truth, and guide them by your Holy Spirit, that in your service they may grow in faith, hope and love; that they may be repairers of the breach, and be faithful disciples of Jesus Christ, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and forever.
