## Introduction, Role, Scope, and Mission

The Center for Historic Preservation (CHP) at Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) was established in 1984 as the first center of excellence at MTSU and one of the nine original centers at the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) universities. The CHP, as other initial centers, was based on an existing national and international reputation. All were mandated to promote enhanced economic opportunities for Tennessee within or related to a specific field in conjunction with the state's commitment to higher education. The CHP at MTSU was granted accomplished center status in 1989, which it has continued to maintain and, in 1991, it became a full-time research and public service institute. The Center submits an annual report with accompanying assessment information on its activities as required. The Center's five-year plan (the first of the series was submitted in 1989) is reevaluated and adjusted upon submission of the annual report.

As a research and public service institute in the field of historic preservation, the Center for Historic Preservation exists to improve the quality of life and future economic development opportunities for Tennessee. This is accomplished through projects and programs that focus on the identification, research, preservation, protection, interpretation, and promotion of our historic environment. That environment encompasses sites, landscapes, buildings, districts, objects, documents, structures, oral history, and folk traditions. Through its varied resources, the Center responds to the requests, needs, and concerns of communities, individuals, agencies, and organizations, both governmental and not-for-profit, working towards historic preservation goals.

The Center assumes a leadership role in public policy formulation and implementation of historic preservation issues. The work of the Center builds bridges across state, regional, national, and international boundaries reaching for innovative ideas and partnerships. Its primary goal, however, is to support policies and programs which promote an enhanced quality of life and improved economic opportunities, based on the sensitive management, conservation and use of historical resources, for the citizens of Tennessee.

To complement the mission of MTSU, the Center for Historic Preservation also supports undergraduate and graduate instruction through the adjunct teaching of selected historic preservation courses in the Historic Preservation Program in the Department of History and the development and teaching of specialized local history materials and units in the College of Education and in partnership with local schools. The Center offers graduate research assistantships in addition to internships and other employment for both graduate and undergraduate students, providing interdisciplinary and applied working experiences. The research, technical, and computer facilities of the Center are also available to MTSU students in appropriate areas of study and to faculty, preservation professionals, and interested individuals.

The long-range goals and objectives of the Center for Historic Preservation coincide with the general legislative mandates implemented by TBR/THEC when the Centers of Excellence were created in 1984. These are: (1) utilize present educational resources more effectively to achieve a genuine excellence in a specific field; (2) support the economic development of the state; (3) enhance the intellectual, cultural, and social climate for Tennessee citizens; (4) improve the research base of the state; and, (5) encourage institutions to increase support for educational and research activities from external sources.

## I. EVALUATION OF CENTER PROGRESS, 1999-2000

The Center's Five-Year Plan for 1995-2000 outlined the areas of concentration or initiatives that responded to the Center's revised mission statement. These initiatives are (1) **Building Technology and Architectural Conservation**, (2) **Heritage Tourism**, (3) **Heritage Education**, (4) **Information Resource Management**, (5) **Museums and Historic Sites**, and (6) **Town and Country**. In 1999-2000, the awarding of a major planning grant from the Department of the Interior to the Center necessitated the creation, in effect, of a seventh initiative—the **National Heritage Area on the Civil War in Tennessee (NHACWTn)**. CHP staff will continue to carry on the work of the six existing initiatives while the resources, programs, and experiences of these longstanding areas of concentration will also mutually support the work of the NHACWTn as appropriate and needed. The Center's activities of 1999-2000 directed to the initiatives are outlined in the following summaries.

The Center continued to provide services in its growing **Building Technology and Architectural Conservation Initiative**. At the national level, Center staff continues to serve on the Architectural Fragments Committee of the Association for Preservation Technology International (APTI). Building technology projects in the Mid-South region included completion of the Vaughter House report for Stones River National

Battlefield, an advisory report on the slave house of Carnton Plantation, an investigation of log buildings on MTSU's Stark Property, and a historic paint analysis of the East Branch Library in Nashville.

The primary accomplishment of the Heritage Education Initiative in 1999-2000 was the development and publication online of The Heritage Education Network (THEN), an extensive World Wide Web site for educators and heritage-related organizations on the classroom use of local historical resources. Funded, in part, by the National Park Service's National Center for Preservation Technology and Training, THEN provides information, classroom materials, and links to many other related web sites on topics of local history. The first phase of THEN was published on the Internet in July of 1999 and a second phase in March of 2000. Through April it had received 1400 "hits." Announcements regarding this educational resource have gone to all state historic preservation offices, departments of education, and many heritage organizations as well as individuals. THEN flyers have been provided to national conferences and staff was invited to present THEN to the Association for History and Computing at Baylor University in Waco, Texas. With the publication online of THEN, which is the equivalent of a 250-page book with more than 150 color and black and white illustrations, the grant cycle ended and the web site became an ongoing project of the Center's Heritage Education Initiative.

The Center continues to supply educators and historic sites with materials and assistance by more traditional methods (mail, in-service

workshops, publications) as it has done since 1984. For example, opportunities for teachers and students to use the Underground Railroad in Tennessee were the focus of a workshop for Tennessee geography teachers in the summer of 1999.

The Heritage Tourism Initiative emphasizes the wholeness of our historic past through buildings, landscapes, above and below ground archaeological historic sites, urban and rural communities. It further provides an opportunity for increased public understanding of the role of historic and cultural resources to enhance and support economic development in Tennessee. The continuing focus of projects is the sensitive protection and promotion of the state's rich and varied heritage.

The primary emphasis was to secure funding (\$250,000.00) to develop a compact and master plan for a National Heritage Area on the Civil War in Tennessee as approved by Congress, the Center for Historic Preservation, which developed the original proposal for Tennessee, was designated as the clearing house. In this program, forty-one states sought national heritage area designations and eight were initially designated including the Center's proposal for Tennessee. The scale of the heritage area project is such that it has been designated a separate Center initiative which will integrate all Center initiatives in supporting a comprehensive heritage tourism and economic development strategy.

A project was begun, through the Rutherford County Chamber of Commerce, to develop a unique countywide visitor support and information

signage program. The Center assisted in the planning for the project and in the development of a three-part funding strategy. The program was completely funded, at \$425,000.00, in 2000.

The Center continued to improve its Information Resource Management Initiative through acquisition of three new staff desktop computers and six new GRA desktop computers to serve the Center's growing research needs. These computers are expected to play a major role in the extensive research involved in the NHACWTn initiative.

The Center completed a major new exhibit project as part of its Museum and Historic Sites Initiative in October 1999. Installed at Bradley Academy in Murfreesboro, this permanent exhibit interprets the history of Murfreesboro and Rutherford County from 1800 through 1900. The Center designed, fabricated, and installed all exhibit elements, including panels, support structures, and façade structures. Additionally, the CHP designed and helped to furnish the period Heritage Classroom at Bradley. The grand opening of the exhibit in March of 2000 saw a wide cross-section of townspeople as well as local, state, and federal officials tour the rehabilitated facility. The CHP has been associated with and contributed hundreds of public service hours to the Bradley Academy project over the past decade.

Other museums, historic or cultural sites, and not-for-profits assisted under this initiative include the Tennessee Trust for Historic Preservation (statewide), the Tennessee Main Street Association (statewide), the Fly Cultural Center (Bedford County), the James D. Vaughan Museum of

Southern Gospel Music (Lawrence County), Trinity Episcopal Church (Franklin County), and Columbia Academy (Maury County). Text and visuals for a brochure on the Rutherford County Courthouse were developed and provided to the Murfreesboro/Rutherford County Main Street Association.

In 1999-2000 as evidence of the CHP's continuing commitment to provide services based on the latest existing technologies, the Center designed and published web pages for Bledsoe's Lick Historical Association (Sumner County), the Bradley Academy Historical Association (Rutherford County), and the Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities (statewide).

In 1999-2000, the Town and Country Preservation initiative at the Center for Historic Preservation was involved in completing one grant project and continuing its innovative program of assistance to communities through the process of the National Register of Historic Places, including partnership projects with the Tennessee Historical Commission and the Tennessee Wars Commission.

In November 1999, Center staff submitted all required reports and nominations for the successful completion of the Chickamauga-Chattanooga Sites Assessment Project, a partnership between local, state, and federal agencies, along with interested private property owners. Funding for the Center's work came from the Tennessee Historical Commission, through a grant from the American Battlefield Protection Program of the National Park



Service. The various documents received positive review from the American Battlefield Protection Program and the National Register office of the National Park Service. Final and revision of the reports and nominations will take place in the summer of 2000 and be placed on the agendas of both the State Historic Preservation Review boards of Georgia and Tennessee in early 2001.

In addition to these major projects, the Town and Country program provided assistance to the Tennessee Humanities Council for its “Barn Again” pamphlet and exhibit project, which focused on the state’s agricultural history. At the request of local governments and private individuals, it also carried out various research projects for properties to be placed in the National Register of Historic Places, such as First Baptist Church, Lauderdale and the Mid-South Coliseum in Memphis, Shelby County and Fort Hill in Waverly, Humphreys County. At the request of the Tennessee Historical Commission, Center staff also prepared a National Register nomination for Cheekwood, Nashville’s Museum of Art and Garden, in the spring of 2000.

Several National Register and historical survey projects reflected the program’s shift to Tennessee resources associated with the National Heritage Area on the Civil War in Tennessee. A key part of the interpretive plan will be representative case studies of important local resources, selected from all three Grand Divisions, of the pre-war, wartime and postwar eras. To date, research and analysis has been directed at properties in the following

counties: Carter, Giles, Greene, Hamilton, Humphries, Loudon, Maury, Obion, Overton, Shelby, Sullivan, Washington, and Wilson.

During 1999-2000 the Center began its official activities associated with the National Heritage Area on the Civil War in Tennessee (NHACWTn). As designated by the enabling federal legislation, the Center is the “clearing house” or management entity for the project. The project, which is intended to promote enhanced heritage tourism as a part of its mission, will focus on a variety of Civil War and Reconstruction themes rather than exclusively on military aspects. Among these topics or themes will be the home front, changing agricultural landscape, role of women, the road to freedom for former slaves, veterans, and the industrial and technological revolution, precipitated by the war, that occurred during the latter part of the nineteenth century.

With federal master plan funding of \$250,000.00 for the two year master planning period, and in cooperation with federal and state agencies and not-for-profit organizations, the CHP began work on this project that may ultimately involve every Tennessee county over the next decade. The project is authorized at up to \$1,000,000 annually for ten years at a 50/50 match (with the Center providing the largest portion of the match). To accommodate the introduction of this multi-layered project to Tennesseans, CHP staff developed several public relations pieces including a poster and web site. In April a series of news releases to the media announced the

project and series of statewide public forums were planned for May and June of 2000.

To accommodate the myriad of obligations of the NHACWTN, the Center began a transition period that included rearranging and refocusing existing and future priorities, staff assignments and responsibilities, and negotiations for increased space and staffing. Programs within existing Center initiatives were appraised for possible ways to support this new initiative. For example, the National Register program, the Century Farm program, Rural African-American Church project, the industry and technology components, and the heritage education web page projects will begin to focus on topics and properties related to the period from the origins of the conflict to Tennessee's readmission to the Union.

As one of the components of the NHACWTN, Center staff created an extensive archive of inter-related vertical files and computerized data designed to systematically store incoming data covering many topics. These include transportation systems, military materials production, extractive and manufacturing industries, and early information technologies. This data, along with information related to the preservation and interpretation of surviving technology heritage resources, will support the Center's NHACWTN "clearinghouse" function.

As part of the overall NHACWTN web site (accessible at [www.mtsu.edu/~tncivwar](http://www.mtsu.edu/~tncivwar)), staff created pages dedicated to Civil War technology and industry information. Because railroads (perhaps the

definitive product of the Industrial Revolution) so heavily impacted the course of the war in Tennessee, staff decided to focus on Civil War railroads as a pilot project that could demonstrate the development of an effective research model that can later be applied to other Civil War technologies and industries as well as other primary themes to be explored by the NHACWTN. The NHACWTN initiative promises to be one of considerable challenge and exciting opportunity in the coming decade.

On campus this year, Center staff responded to a request from the Provost to draft the proposal for MTSU's application to be considered for a planning grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities for its new program of Regional Humanities Center. Tennessee was part of the NEH's designated "Delta" region. In this effort, the Center received the cooperation of several departments across the university as well as the support and assistance of Tennessee State University and Fisk University. However, in December 1999, the university received notification that the two available awards in the south would go to the University of Mississippi and Tulane University. University officials and Center staff already have discussed the possibility of continuing the grant partnership on an independent basis as an important way to encourage cooperation and scholarship on the heritage and culture of the Tennessee valley.

In addition, the Center is represented on the advisory committee for the Jennings B. Jones Chair of Regional and Urban Planning.

In Murfreesboro and Rutherford County, Center staff is now in the eighth year of a leadership role for such completed projects as Bradley Academy, the Stones River Greenway, the Lytle Creek Greenway, and the Rutherford County Courthouse. Continuing assistance is being given to the third phase of the greenway system and the countywide visitor wayfinding program. Bradley Academy has already been discussed earlier in this report.

Statewide, Center staff is involved in the development of such organizations as the Tennessee Cultural Heritage Association and the Tennessee Trust for Historic Preservation. Center staff also served on two TBR/THEC distance-learning task forces.

Nationally, Center staff continued two key national leadership roles for the White House and Congress, and for the Department of the Interior through continuing appointments on two federal boards. One has led to legislation currently in the Congress to fund a comprehensive program to rehabilitate some 5,000 historic neighborhood schools over the next five years and return them to their original uses as schools. The other has developed a report on stewardship of federally owned properties and recommends a plan of action which includes a proposal for a federal executive order. Reports on these two national millennium projects are scheduled for presentations at international millennium year conferences in England and Italy later in 2000, and a millennium capstone conference in 2001.

## II. ASSESSMENT OF CENTERS PROBLEMS, 1999-00

At the time of this report, last year, the most serious challenge faced by the Center was how to accommodate the additional personnel and other resources promised by the funding for the National Heritage Area Project. By early 2000, with the considerable support and leadership of the Provost's office, significant additional space in the proximity of the Center's offices was identified and the financial sources committed to insure the availability of the additional space by Summer, 2000.
