## Discussion Questions for "Overlooked Wisdom: Confronting Evil"

1 Kings 18 (Reading: 18:20-29), Pastor Tom Olson, Weekend of October 18th & 19th

## Sermon Outline

Scene 1: The rain hasn't come (vv. 1-16).

• There are faithful believers serving God in wicked and lonely places.

Scene 2: The fire doesn't come (vv. 17-29).

- The godlessness of all other gods.
- The foolishness of worshiping other gods.

Scene 3: The fire does come (vv. 30-40).

- The LORD is God.
- Worship and follow the LORD God.

Scene 4: The rain does come (vv. 41-46).

• God sends rain on the just and the unjust.

## **Sermon Questions**

- 1. Obadiah is such an interesting person to meet in 1 Kings 18:1-16.
  - a. What catches your attention about him?
  - b. Is there anything we can learn from his brief appearance?
- 2. What does Elijah mean by "limping between two different opinions" in verse 21?
  - a. Do you ever see this kind of thing happening in our world?
  - b. Do you ever see this kind of thing happening in your own heart?
- 3. Think of Elijah's comment in verse 27:
  - a. Why is he so *firm* in describing the foolishness of Baal's prophets?
  - b. Why do we, too, need to personally feel the weight of his words?
- 4. The LORD proved that He's God by sending the fire (verse 38). Further, Jesus proved that He's God by His resurrection.
  - a. What other ways has God proved in the past that He's God?
  - b. What other ways is God still proving in the present day that He's God?

- 5. Continuing to mull over the fact that "The LORD, He is God" (verse 39)...
  - a. Why are we tempted to quickly skim through this truth?
  - b. Why can't we quickly skim through it? In other words, what's the practical impact of this truth *for you? For your friends, family, co-workers, classmates, etc.*?
- 6. Read Matthew 5:44-45.
  - a. What connection is there between these words of Jesus and 1 Kings 18?
  - b. What does this connection say about the way you and I should live our lives?
- 7. Any other takeaways from this passage or message?
