Sermon Outline

God's persistence (1 Kings 20:13, 28).

- Tests our hearts.
- Encourages us to pray.
- Calls us to salvation.

God's mercy (1 Kings 21:28-29).

- Doesn't eliminate all of sin's consequences.
- Honors imperfect repentance.
- Surprises us.

Sermon Ouestions

- 1. Briefly, to set up your discussion, try to add up all the ways that God sought to prove Himself to King Ahab from 1 Kings 16 to 1 Kings 21.
- 2. Does it bother you, at all, that God is so persistent with a wicked king like Ahab? Why or why not?
- 3. Is there anyone whose salvation you've been praying about for a *long* time?
 - a. Would you be willing to share who?
 - b. Has it been difficult or easy to keep praying?
 - c. How is God's persistence in today's passage an encouragement to you?
 - d. (Take some time to pray, as a group, for the people you mention before your time together ends today!)
- 4. Why is God being *merciful* when He allows us to experience *some* of the consequences of our sin?
 - a. Have you ever experienced this first-hand? What were you doing? And why was it kind of God for Him to let you experience the consequences?
 - b. Have you ever had to do this with a family member or friend letting them learn the hard way by experiencing the consequences of their actions?

- 5. Why is it also merciful of God to honor imperfect repentance, as He does with Ahab?
 - a. What would be the problem, for us, if He didn't?
 - b. How does His honoring of *imperfect* repentance draw us into *deeper* repentance?
- 6. Take some time to praise God for how He's been merciful to you. Try to think of some *surprising mercies*, in particular.
- 7. Any other takeaways from this passage or message?
