Questions:

1. What stood out to you most from this week's sermon, and why?
2. Psalm 11:3 asks, "If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?" When you look at injustice in the world today, what situations make you feel this question most deeply? How does Micah 6:8 help answer that question?
3. Many people experience injustice personally, such as being treated unfairly, lied about, cheated, or overlooked. Have you ever experienced a situation where you were treated unjustly? How did you respond, and how might Micah 6:8 shape the way a Christian responds in those moments?
4. The sermon emphasized that before responding to injustice in the world, we must first repent of our own sin before God. Why is personal repentance an important starting point when confronting injustice?
5. Micah 6:8 calls us to "do justice and love kindness." What is the difference between doing justice and loving kindness? Can you think of practical ways you could practice both in your everyday life this week?
6. The sermon emphasized that the command to do justice and love kindness is primarily directed to individual believers, not just institutions. How has God uniquely positioned you, in your family, workplace, or community to live out Micah 6:8?
