Entertaining Angels

“Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.” --Hebrews 13:2

We don't know exactly whom the writer of Hebrews is referring to in this text. Perhaps Abraham and Sarah, who saw three men passing by and invited them to stay for dinner. This wasn't a fast-food affair. Not a spur of the moment snack. Abraham corralled an animal from his flock and slaughtered it. A servant carefully prepared the food. Sarah kneaded flour and baked bread over an open flame. It must have taken the better part of the day. All the while, the men rested in the shade of a tree.

Later, Sarah and Abraham learned that these men are not as ordinary as they seemed. They were angels—messengers from God—who bore the news that within a year, Sarah would give birth to their long-awaited child. Sarah laughed it off and who could blame her. Yet, the words of these men came to fruition.

In the gospel of Luke, Cleopas and his friend are walking to Emmaus after the terrible disappointment and apparent tragedy of Good Friday when they are joined on the road by a traveler with whom they discuss those events. The traveler is well-versed in Scripture and helps them see a possibility they never considered: that Jesus' suffering might be part of the good news he came to announce and that the women's report of an empty tomb might be his vindication. Their hearts burned within them. They invited him to stay the night and then, as they began to share the evening meal, they recognized their walking companion as no ordinary person, but Jesus himself—the risen Christ.

You never know. Showing hospitality to strangers in the Bible cracks open dim eyes, despairing hearts, closed minds.

On a recent Sunday at Grace Lutheran Church, two greeters stood at the doors and invited worshippers into the sanctuary. They handed out bulletins and offered warm words of welcome. There were plenty of smiles to go around! The sound of laughter rang out in the narthex. Old friends discussed air quality, introduced children and grandchildren. As the time for worship drew near, the greeters took their places, while Tony and Bill played a prelude. Worship began with the announcements.

Then a few more people entered the building. Not people we knew. There was no one to hand them a bulletin. The doors to the sanctuary were closed. What does that say to a visitor? Thankfully, they were assertive enough to open those doors and come inside.

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Meanwhile, in the far reaches of the sanctuary, in the back pew, I noticed another couple I didn't know, sitting by themselves. While the rest of us sat in our accustomed spots and chatted each other up, their isolation stood out. Thankfully, they, too, were assertive enough to stay the course. Yet, I wonder how they felt there, all alone in their corner.

After worship, the same couple came downstairs for coffee. Most of the tables were filled with people renewing acquaintances with friends. We like each other and it shows! But since I'm often among the last to walk through the serving line, I couldn't help but notice those two were sitting by themselves at the table closest to the serving counter.

I'm sure no one intended to ignore them. It's just that we don't notice. We're busy with our friends and neighbors.

I decide to sit with them and we have a lovely conversation. I wonder if they are angels. Perhaps their presence is a message.

Think of others who have joined us these last few months. People we didn't know. Jeff, Cheryl, Daisy. Have you met them, come to know them, welcomed them?

We appoint greeters for this task, but actually every one of us is a greeter. Existing friendships are important, but just as important is reaching out to people we don't know. Every Sunday at worship and at coffee. This extends beyond the sanctuary into our neighborhoods. And beyond our neighborhoods into the larger community. And beyond the community, to—as Jesus says in Acts—"the ends of the earth."

Don't wait for someone else to greet a stranger. It's your job. Who knows whom you might meet along the way?

Nephi Craig and the National Day of Remembrance for US/Canada Indian Boarding Schools

Coming up in September—September 30—native and non-native people alike will be encouraged to pause and remember the many indigenous children who were taken from their homes and placed in boarding schools throughout the nation, operated either by the federal government or by various churches. On September 30, people across the US and Canada will be encouraged to wear orange, as an expression of support. In these boarding schools, native children were forced to abandon their families, their language, their dress, their culture, and their religion. While the motivation may often have included a desire to help indigenous people struggling to adjust to the dominant North American culture, there were many instances of abuse, physical and sexual, and many native children died. In far too many cases, the location of their graves—and even their names—remain unknown. Native people have struggled to reclaim a positive identity and sense of wellbeing for generations since.

As a Church, we in the Northern Great Lakes Synod have acknowledged and grieve our church's role in the boarding school era and are seeking to renew relationships with Indian people. On a Sunday close to September 30, we will observe the National Day of Remembrance as part of worship. Recently, on NPR's Fresh Air broadcast, Terry Gross interviewed Nephi Craig, a gourmet indigenous cook from the Apache White Mountain reservation in Arizona. Born to a Navajo father and an Apache mother, Mr. Craig grew up on both reservations. While he did not attend a boarding school, he grew up in the LDS Church, since Mormon missionaries converted his family when he was growing up. Hence, the name: (the Mormon prophet) Nephi. He details his life story, how he was affected by generational trauma, the loss of identity, alcohol and drug abuse, and how he was able to enter into recovery and now to serve others as a chef at a treatment center on the reservation, as well as the owner of a restaurant serving indigenous foods. Through his cooking, he's rediscovered his identity and a purpose in life. His is a triumphant and hopeful story, of which a humble spirituality is part.

It is a well worth listening to the July 16 episode at the NPR's Fresh Air website.

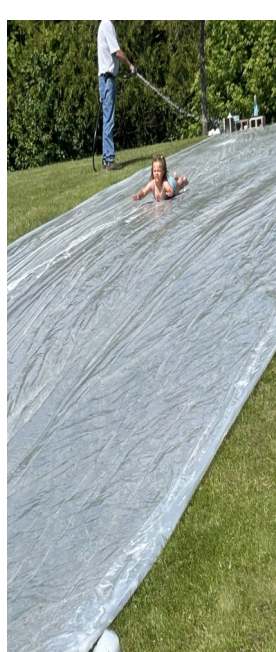

MATTHEW 13:31-32

Jesus put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.

Throughout the fall season, as we remind ourselves that we are stewards of God's gifts, called to share the abundance of everything we've been given, consider again the powerful parable of the mustard seed. That something seemingly insignificant, a very small seed, can nonetheless grow. And by virtue of God's grace, it can grow beyond all reasonable expectations, in time, becoming host and home for the birds.

What does that parable say about your life in Christ? What does it promise us, as members of Grace Lutheran Church? What does it say to our community and to our world?

Listen to some voices from our congregation:

"...a time for every purpose under heaven." Ecclesiastes 3:1

What does this mean for you? Well... we are each granted a specific number of days on this earth, a specific number of hours with each other; learning, loving, giving, and worshiping. Time is precious, we can never obtain more. Time is a joy, a blessing, a gift. When we give of our time, we are giving this gift. Now some of you might grumble and think, "I don't have enough time as it is with work, kids, grandchildren, caregiving, other responsibilities"; trust me – I completely understand this! However, are we as a people truly making the best use of our time, or is there a little wiggle room in our schedule to offer even just 5, 10, or 30 minutes to stewardship? I can almost see your conflicted and confused faces, saying "what would 10 minutes do?" Join a committee, be a coffee server on a Sunday, joining the church's prayer chain, sit with someone you're not very familiar with during fellowship and share conversation, offer suggestions to our administrator, garden or weeding, experience Feeding America distribution, hang flyers around town, or even by sharing our website or Facebook pages... the possibilities are endless, and would be so welcome! "Offering your time" should not be an encumbrance; it should be joyous and come from a place of love and gratitude.
