

THE LORD'S LOVE LIFE A LIVING SERMON ON LOVE

On the Sunday before Christmas, we received a sermon none of us will soon forget - and not only because of Rev. Douglas' message from Romans 1:1-7 entitled "The Lord's Love Life," it was unforgettable because God chose to *show* us His love in real time, right in the middle of the service.

As Rev. Douglas was preaching, a man kind of sauntered into the sanctuary. His clothes were worn - his face and demeanor carried the unmistakable weight of a hard life. He first sat behind the choir. Then he moved toward the back, where he opened a beer and made a few comments during the sermon - enough to draw the attention of nearly everyone in the room.

Trustee Willis Brown, positioned himself near the man when he pulled out the beer, leaned over and spoke a few words that persuaded him to put it away. Meanwhile, Kelvin Melton, a young adult who grew up in Zion (and a championship wrestler, by the way), came and sat behind Mr. Brown as he continued talking with the gentleman. After a very short time, the man left, only to return a little while later. Given the kind of events we have all seen in the news these days, you could feel a wave of uncertainty rise among us. Some shifted in their seats. A few glanced around. Most of us simply didn't know what to do - most, but not all.

which Rev. Douglas moved to the front of the line as he explained that when we achieve *agape* love, all the other forms will naturally follow. It was at this moment in the service that the man moved to the second pew - practically right in front of the Pastor, continuing his loud feedback and commentary.

Without missing a beat, Rev. Douglas segued from explaining *agape* love, to showing *agape* love. As the man was talking out loud, Rev. Douglas walked up to him and said, "So let me get you to come on up here." The church applauded as he joined Rev. Douglas who welcomed him with a hug that spoke louder than any sermon.

What happened next felt like holy ground.

Rev. Douglas was nearing the end of his demonstration on the eight Greek words for different types of love, the final one being *agape*. He had invited the youth and several church members to the front, each holding a card with one of the Greek words. One by one, they called out their word, and he explained the meaning behind each type of love. In true husband fashion, he had strategically placed Mrs. Douglas with the word *pragma*, representing enduring love. MacKenzie Saul held the final word, *Agape*,

Pastor whispered a line into the man’s ear - simple truths about how we can be an encouragement and show God’s love to others - and asked the man to repeat each line aloud to the congregation. Every line spoke to how Christians are to treat strangers – a man like our guest. It was as if the Lord Himself was reminding us that love is not a theory to be studied but a life to be lived.

The final line Pastor whispered was, “Pray for people by their name.”

Rev. Douglas paused, looked at the man, and asked gently, “What is your name?” After he answered, Pastor invited the entire church to bow our heads. And then he prayed, calling that man’s name out to the Lord with tenderness and sincerity.

By the time he said “Amen,” tears were streaming down the man’s face. And he wasn’t alone. Many of us were crying too, not out of sadness, but out of the overwhelming realization that we had just witnessed the love of God in action.

It wasn’t a polished moment. It wasn’t planned. It wasn’t comfortable.

It was better. It was the gospel.



And it reminded us that the love Paul wrote about in Romans is not confined to ancient letters or Sunday sermons. It walks into our sanctuaries, sits in our pews, interrupts our routines, and calls us to respond with the heart of Christ.

May we never forget what we saw that morning. And may we be ready - *always* - to love our neighbors in the name of Jesus. Amen

NEW LAWS COMING TO VIRGINIA IN 2026

WASHINGTON - With the new year comes new laws for Virginians. Here's what to expect when January 1, 2026 arrives.

Agriculture: Under the [Baby Food Protection Act, HB 1844](#), manufacturers will be required to regularly test their infant formula to ensure it does not exceed levels of toxic heavy metals established by the [U.S. Food and Drug Administration](#). They must also include that information on product labels and their website. Consumers that suspect high levels of metal in the baby food product they purchased are required to report their findings to Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Commerce: Recipients of unwanted telemarketing notifications will be able to halt those texts by replying to unwanted messages with "STOP" or "UNSUBSCRIBE." When the [Virginia Telephone Privacy Protection Act, SB 1339](#), goes into effect, telephone solicitors must honor the request for at least 10 years.

Consumer Protections: Social media platforms will have to use neutral age screen mechanisms to determine whether users are under the age of 16 and, if they are a minor, limit their usage to one hour per day. This will all take place under the [Consumer Data Protection Act, SB 854](#), where parents can consent to increase or decrease their child's daily time limit.

Criminal Procedure: If a defendant is convicted of a crime or violation and has to pay fines, they will be able to submit a written or electronic request to the court clerk for a clear breakdown, as required by [HB 1665](#). As time goes on, defendants will be able to continue asking for updated statements of their outstanding balance.

Insurance: [Virginia's HB 1828/SB 1436](#) will require health insurance companies to no longer charge patients extra for breast examinations like mammograms, MRIs and ultrasounds. Patients ordered to undergo those screenings will not have to pay out-of-pocket for them. Instead, insurance providers will have to cover those costs.

As mandated by HB 2097/SB1314, prostate cancer screenings such as blood tests and rectal exams will be covered by insurance carriers as well in the new year. This law requires exams to be up-to-date and reflect [American Cancer Society](#) guidelines and findings.

Labor & Employment: Minimum wage will have a minor increase from 12 dollars and 41 cents to 12 dollars and 77 cents per hour, according to the [Department of Labor and Industry](#).

Workers that lose their jobs will receive a larger weekly benefit to provide more financial stability during unemployment. [Virginia's HB 2401/SB 1056](#) will add 52 dollars to the current weekly compensation amount.

THE FRUIT OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Fruit of the Holy Spirit is a biblical term that sums up nine attributes of a person or community living in accord with the Holy Spirit according to the Epistle of the Galatians chapter 5. The fruit of the Spirit is: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

The Fruit of the Spirit is the outcome and expression of a relationship with Christ and the Holy Spirit which dwells within us. The nine Fruit of the Spirit result from true repentance, turning away from our sinful ways toward love for God and neighbor.

Love: This is the foundational and greatest fruit. God gives agape love – the perfect love. It is a spirit that compels Christians to exude self-sacrificial love, compassion, kindness, forgiveness and mercy. This love is rooted in a spiritual connection that helps us find meaning and purpose in our lives. 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 says, “Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things and endures all things”.

Joy: Joy gives a deep sense of contentment and gladness that comes from a relationship with God. James 1:1-2, says, “Consider it pure joy my brothers and sisters when you face trials of many kinds because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance”.

Peace: The work of the Holy Spirit is in your heart and mind. John 16:33 states, “I have told you these things that you will have trouble but take heart – I have overcome the world”.

Patience: “Be slow to anger and show forbearance toward others – even in challenging situations”, Galatians 5:22-23. The Holy Spirit empowers Christians to withstand challenging situations with perseverance and endurance, 1 Timothy 1:16.

Kindness: Kindness is the quality of being friendly, generous and considerate toward others – putting the needs of others before your own. Roman 2:4 states “God’s mercy and grace should lead us to repentance, not judgement”.

Goodness: This quality signifies moral excellence and integrity in character and action. 2 Thessalonians 1:11, “With this in mind, we constantly pray for you, that God may make you worthy of His calling, and that by His power He may bring to fruition your every desire for goodness and your every deed prompted by faith”.

Faithfulness: This virtue relates to loyalty, reliability and trustworthiness in one’s commitments and relationship. Faithfulness means unfailingly remaining loyal to someone or something and putting that loyalty into consistent practice regardless of extenuating circumstances. John 1:9 says, “If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness”.

Gentleness: This virtue shows meekness, humility and compassion toward others. Gentleness is powerful because it is Godly. He tells us to “take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls”, Matthew 11:29. Be completely humble and gentle, be patient, bearing with one another in love. In your hearts, set apart Christ as Lord.

Self-Control: This last virtue helps us to resist temptation and avoid conforming to the things of the world. It guides our decisions and correlates with how we show the other fruits in our lives. Proverbs 25:28 says, “A man without self-control is like a city broken into and left without walls”. This verse illustrates the vulnerability and chaos that can result from a lack of self-control. Self-control allows us to keep our minds focused on God while avoiding the temptation of our desires.

So, let the Holy Spirit lead you and make a conscious effort to walk in God’s love each and every day!
